Richard Rogers of Lubbock will be the speaker. He is married to Barbara Jane and the couple has four children and five grandchildren.


Rogers holds a Bachelor's degree from The Theological University of America and attended Abilene Christian and Florida Christian Universities.

# Another Victim At Friona Crossing

For the second time in just over two weeks, a fatal accident happened at the Santa Fe Railway Crossing about 1.4 miles southwest of Friona last Friday, October 30.

Ben Marquez, 52, of Bovina, an employee of Parmer County, was killed when he backed his road grader onto a track and was struck by a Santa Fe train.

Marquez was pronounced dead at the scene at about 2:30 by Frances Euler, justice of the peace.

Two locomotives and about 20 train cars were derailed on the eastbound train. The train was about 70 cars long. Santa Fe work crews had cleared the tracks by Saturday morning so that train traffic could be resumed.

The collision occurred about 2:22 p.m. Friday on a dirt road near Parmer County Implement Company.

According to Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, Marquez was working in the area when he apparently backed the 1991 Caterpillar onto the crossing. The train was traveling at 40 miles per hour. It smashed into the grader and knocked it about 100 feet down the tracks, Williams said.

"He apparently never did see the train," Williams said. Several containers on flatbed cars broke open during the collision. The cargo was designated as "mixed freight," but did not contain any dangerous chemicals, Williams said.

It was the same crossing at which Gary Dale Green, 39, was killed on October 14, 1992, when his tractor-trailer rig was struck at about 11 a.m. by another east-bound freight.

Tuesday's turnout was an alltime record in Parmer County, as a total of 3,098 people went to the polls. This was approximately 80 per cent of the total registered vote.

Early voting also set a record, with a total of 534 people casting their ballots during the special period and at special booths in Friona and Bovina. This was more than twice the number that voted early in 1988.

The Bush-Quayle ticket was the winner in every one of the county's voting boxes, as well as in the early voting box.

Geries won only the Farwell and Oklahoma Lane boxes, and those by a 59 per cent margin. Williams won the other seven county boxes, plus the early voting box, by a combined 66.8 per cent.

Although Stover was able to win only one voting box, Rhea, 1988, only about 70 per cent of the with his write-in campaign (31-24), registered voters took part in the he managed to stay close in several others. He received 45.7 per cent of the vote at Oklahoma Lane, and 43 per cent at Bovina.

Parmer County voters joined those statewide in supporting Barry Williamson in his win over appointee Lena Guerrero in the Railroad Commissioner race. Williamson received 1886 vote in the county, 66.2 per cent.

Local voters also went for Craig Enoch in his victory over Oscar Mauzy, with 1704 votes, 64.3 per cent. County voters also supported former state senator Jack Hightower in his win over John Montgomery, 1422-1323, and supported Amarillo's Morris Overstreet, first black elected to a state office, over Sue Lagrade, 1413-1233. That was 53.4 per cent for Overstreet.




James sings of real-life experiences as a husband, father, friend and a child of God. "A friend once told me not to say one word on stage that I didn't live at home,"






