Marie Smith." A divorced woman who wants to resume her maiden name may, under some circumstances, have it returned to her by court order.

If you do not provide for the proper defense of all who are accused of crime, then the innocent, when falsely accused, have no way to prove their innocence. So, under our law, we look on a man as innocent until he is found guilty under proper court proceedings.

From this, it follows that all of us have the right to be represented by a lawyer. Since the lawyer has a duty to represent you, much criticism of him for doing so is uniust.

Should a lawyer defend persons in court if he knows or thinks they have done the acts of which they are accused? Yes, the worst criminal has a right to a fair trial. This he can't have unless a lawyer sees that he has a fair jury and that it hears only lawful evidence against him.

Still practicing law but more active with the management of his business properties was a man who had been elected county judge by the Populists in the 1890's. At the age of 75, he negotiated a thirty-year lease on one of his buildings and was highly elated, evidently forgetting the fact that he could not hope to reap the benefits for more than a few years.

Another lawyer, who likewise did little practicing but managed his landed holdings, was a Sacred Harp singer and he and his colleagues sang at funerals. The music was extreamely doleful, so much so that, as one irreverent individual remarked, "It would re-concile a fellow to being dead because then he can't hear it."

Dean of the Eastland bar was a man so slender that it would seem a puff of wind could blow him over. Yet, 30 years later, he was still practicing law and was able to comment, with a dry chuckle that he had been refused insurance a long time ago but had outlived the agent and the doctor who rejected him.
