Farm Facts

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that farm real estate taxes were three times higher in 1960 than they were in 1942. In fact, the rise in these taxes in the United States (not including Alaska and Hawaii) has been uninterrupted in the past 18 years.

Because the acreage of farmland in private owner-ship has changed little since 1942, taxes per acre have increased in the same proportion as total farm real estate Farm real estate taxes in

the 48 states totaled \$1,284 million in 1960. This was 8% more than the total for 1959. They increased in every state except Delaware, where they remained the same as in 1959.



The District Director said that another phase of the campaign calls for an audit of Highway Use Tax returns to assure that taxpayers are correctly reporting their use tax liabilities. This audit will be aimed at seeing that all taxable trucks and busses are reported in the returns and that they are reported in the correct taxable categories






