Physical Fitness Tests Completed

On March 16, Merkel Elementary School students completed their first physical fitness tests.

The Amateur Athletic Union of

the United States Physical Fitness Tests were used as a standard for grades one through eight.
Of the 511 children taking the tests 363 passed the minimum age. The national average for this test is 51 per cent. The AAU Tests set a higher standard of achievement than does the program outlined by President Kennedy.

Not long ago I got off the train and hailed a taxi at Grand Central Station, New York City. As we drove downtown, the cabby said Sunday was the only day fit to drive in the city any more. I agreed that traffic on weekdays was

"You know," said the cabby, wish we had a union. Then I'd be getting mine. I wouldn't kick if the head man grabbed twice as much as Hoffa. Look at those electricians. Working half my hours for twice my take. They got it made."

"All they're doing is pushing prices up," I answered. "Soon the carpenters will demand more; then the bus drivers, then cooks, then barbers, then everybody. More wages for higher and higher. Pretty soon your dollar won't buy much.

"Your dollar don't buy much of anything in this town," the

driver said.
"It doesn't buy much of anything in any town," I returned. "And if everybody goes on looking for more money for less work, imagine what it'll be like in five or ten years. Everybody getting twice the pay for half as much work. That would make today's dollar worth just two bits. It's just like a spotlight on a stage. One spot makes an actor stand out. A dozen spotlights and nothing is spot-lighted. The whole stage is flooded."

"I don't know anything about spotlights," the driver

"All I see is everybody grabbing and I want mine!"
