"My wife and the children are fine," he said, "but my father has been in and out of the hospital for the past two years, and now my mother is seriously ill.

He said he had not only spent his savings-close to \$2,500-for his aged father's hospital and medical bills, but had also been forced to borrow money and to dip into the fund he had set aside for his son's education.

"The truth is," he said, "I'm broke. My wife and I will manage somehow, but it's my son I'm worried about. He wants to be an engineer. I can no longer afford to send him to college.

Then he asked, deeply trou-bled, "What am I supposed to do? Forget I have parents? Neglect them? Forget I love them? Forget what I owe them? What's the answer?"

Fortunately for him and for so many others like him, there is an answer. President Ken-nedy provided it when he proposed a Health Insurance Plan for the Aged through Social Security.

The President's plan will help the whole family, as well as benefit those over 65. It is a plan for "family security." It ill enable us more easily to carry out our responsibilities to our parents, to our children and to ourselves and, at the same time, lessen the drain on the family budget.

I will tell you more about how this "family security plan" works and about the legislation now before Congress after I explain why it is needed-and why the time has come to do something about it.



A new insecurity is gripping our old folks and affecting the

lives of younger members of their families. How can they pay the rapidly mounting costs of hospital care for the elderly -costs that have gone up faster than any other necessities of life, and far more than retirement incomes.

A look at the figures bears out their fears:

Hospital costs have more than tripled in the past 15 years. The bill for an aged person now is close to \$500 for the average hospital stay. To add to this gloomy picture, statistics show that 9 out of 10 persons reaching age 65 this year will need hospitalization in their remaining lifetime, most



of younger people. Who must pay these hospital bills? Surely not our old folks. Half of them have less than \$1,200 a year. This is scarcely enough to cover their food, housing, and a few other essential

Private health insurance pol-icies? Some old people have them, but premiums for policies in this age bracket are too expennive and protection woefully o late or, in desperuin to their children for

responsibility of raising and educating their own families and can't carry the full burden of costly hospital care. Do they -now in their thirties or forties-exhaust their own savings, mortgage their homes, borrow from friends or relatives? Many do. Too often, however, it is the

grandchildren who suffer most, and it is their future which is at stake. Today there are some 75 million children in this coun-try who are under 21. By 1970, this figure will rise to 95 million. None of these children should be deprived of the educational opportunities to which he is entitled. Who, then, will pay the major

hospital costs of our parents? Under President Kennedy's program, it would be the 75 million wage earners who, in the course of a year, contribute to their own retirement benefits through the Social Security system. For only \$1 a month for the average worker and an equal amount from his employer, these persons not only would make it possible for their parents to receive immediate health insurance benefits, but would insure their own health benefits after they reach the age of 65 and, in turn, make certain they won't have to depend on their children to pay their hospital bills when they

get old. This is a sound and simple proposal which makes sense for the entire family. In a subse-quent article, I will give you he details of the President's Health Insurance Plan through Social Security and show you why is it the best answer to the biggest national issue facing our country today. Q-I'm changing my job and am going to have to sell my home bought with a GI loan. Must the loan be paid off in full before I can sell?

A-Not necessarily. The buyer may assume your GI loan as well as all liability, if he is willing, if your payments are up to date, and if VA determines the new buyer is a satisfactory credit risk. Q-I have a dental condition connected to injuries in service but for which I am not entitled to receive compensation. Is there any deadline in my case for applying for outpatient dental treatment?

A-No. Veterans with service - connected compensable dental conditions or disabilities may apply at any time and receive as many treatments as are needed.



ATED - Fourth annual "Texas chased at the meeting. Reading Club" - designed to encourage an interest in reading among youngsters - during their summer vacation - is under way. Sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries in 89 cities and towns, the program enrolled more than 16,000 young people this year. Harold J. Marburger, director of rural library services, State Lbirary, described the reading club as the largest of its kind in the nation. Youths who read 12 books on their reading level before August 31 will receive a reading certificate signed by Marburger and Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, dircetor and librarian, State Library.

In addition, all youngsters who enroll will receive a "reading log" to keep a record of books completed during the program.

Books in many instances are being furnished by the State Library through inter-library loan, bookmobiles, multi-county regoinal libraries and through the loan of books as an extension service from the library field services.

TOLL ROAD — Only toll road in Texas—the Fort Worth - Dallas Turnpike-seems to be making its way.

The Turnpike grossed \$3,245,-797 last year, with operating expenses of \$937,168. It put \$1,641,-977 into the fund to pay interest on the \$58,500,000 it borrowed to build the road, and to build up its total reserves to nearly \$5,000,000. The Fort Worth - Dallas Turnpike is the only place in Texas where it is legal to drive 70 miles

per hour. Legislautre allowed the Turnpike Authority to raise the speed limit to that figure. SMOKERS PAY - Cigarette smokers are chipping in more than \$7,000,000 a month to the State Treasury under the 8-cent sales tax on each package.

Treasurer Jesse James reported income from that source to be \$7,700,588 in May.

Fight against the screwworm fly has been extended northward. Reason is because truck-hauled livestock, infested with screwworms, crossed the control line which was being maintained by aerial dis-tribution of sterile male flies. 




