Fort Worth - The market was active and slaughter cattle prices moved higher in Texas during July. Demand for Texas fed cattle came from a broad area during the month with cattle moving to the southeast, West and other regions.

Demand for all classes of fed cattle was good and heavier, higher grading steers and heifers were in articular demand Choice strers ooked \$1.00 higher compared to he close of the previous month. Most feedlots have sold up close on cattle which are carrying rea sonable slaughter finish, according to the latest monthly summary published by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Se western Cattle Raisrs Association

"Cattle are leaving feedlots with a shorter feed and at lighter weithis than normal." said Lloyd Bergsma, drector of the Cattle Feeders Division. 'From the standpoint of the feeder, this is a healthy situation and could be a factor in a continued strong fed cattle market," he said.
