KANSAS CITY, Mo. (Special)—Roy B. Dalziel of Merkel was named to membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

Sixty-seven Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during July. The Association maintains active accounts for more than 80,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association during the last fiscal year recorded 476,367 purebred calves. The year's total recordings were the eighth highest on record and almost twice the combined registrations of other major beef breeds.

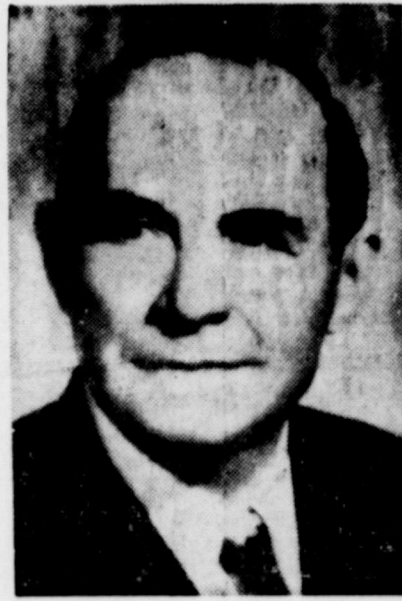

Dr. Lankins to Lead Revival At First Baptist Church

A nationally known Evangelist, Dr. Joe Henry Lankins of Little Rock, Arkansas, will lead the First Baptist Church of Merkel in a city wide Tent Revival August 25 through September 2. Evening services will start at 7:30 p.m. under the tent, located at North Third and Edwards Streets, and 10:00 p.m. services will be held at the church located at 3rd and Locust Streets in Merkel.

Dr. Lankins, a pastor for 23 years, spent 12 of these in Texas. He was pastor of First Baptist Church of Childress. His last pastorate before entering full time evangelism was at First Baptist Church, Little Rock, Ark., where in four years and eight months, the church received 3,105 additions with 1209 of these for baptism in other churches where he held revivals during this time.

Dr. Lankins has been in independent evangelism the past 20 years, holding revivals in 31 states, resulting in over 50,000 conversions and more than 100,000 other decisions for Christ. He has led in city-wide campaigns in some of the larger cities in America including Chicago, Los Angeles and Syracuse, New York.

Music for the revival will be under direction of Dr. and Mrs. Joe Trussell of Brownwood, Texas, who promise special inspiration at singing at every service, and will work with the primary and junior crown choirs, prior to each night service. His wife will aid him.

William B. Sawyer is pastor of Merkel's First Baptist Church, starting his second year with the church this August. The church is observing its 80th anniversary this month.

NO CANDIDATES FILE FOR MAYOR, COUNCIL

Mayor Earl Hughes and City Councilman O. H. Griffin resigned their posts in the regular meeting of the city council here Monday night.

Hughes, manager of the West Texas Utilities office here, resigned effective Sept. 1 because of ill health after 5 1/3 years in office.

Griffin, owner of Merkel Farm Machinery, will serve as acting mayor until Oct. 1, when his resignation becomes effective. He was elected for a two-year term last April.

A special election was called for Sept. 18 to fill the two posts, both for their unexpired term of office. Hughes' term is up March 1 next year.

The regular term for mayor is two years. The newly elected mayor will take office Oct. 1.

Deadline for filing in the two races is Sept. 1.

The following letter of resignation was presented by Hughes to the council:

"To O. H. Griffin, mayor pro tem, and members of the city council of Merkel:

"I hereby offer my resignation as mayor of Merkel effective as of Sept. 1, 1962, by reason of health and recommendation of my doctor.

"My doctor says that I will be incapacitated for some time and will not be able to perform the duties of mayor.

"I want to express my gratitude to all members of the council for their co-operation and to all city employees for their faithful service during my five and one-third years tenure as mayor.

"It is with deep regret that I offer my resignation and respectfully request that it be acted on at your regular third Monday night meeting Aug. 20, 1962."

The council also raised the salary of Fire Chief Chester McWilliams to \$290 a month, with expense-free house and utilities, an increase of \$15 a month.

A six month contract was awarded to Gulf Oil Co. to furnish gasoline for city vehicles. Three bids were received.

Cattle Prices High In July

Fort Worth — The market was active and slaughter cattle prices moved higher in Texas during July. Demand for Texas fed cattle came from a broad area during the month with cattle moving to the southeast, West and other regions.

Demand for all classes of fed cattle was good and heavier, higher grading steers and heifers were in particular demand. Choice steers looked \$1.00 higher compared to the close of the previous month.

Most feedlots have sold up close on cattle which are carrying reasonable slaughter finish, according to the latest monthly summary published by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

"Cattle are leaving feedlots with a shorter feed and at lighter weights than normal," said Lloyd Bergsma, director of the Cattle Feeders Division. "From the standpoint of the feeder, this is a healthy situation and could be a factor in a continued strong fed cattle market," he said.

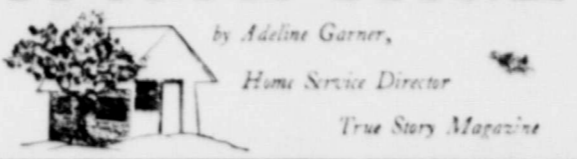

Chicken Pointers
The September issue of TRUE STORY features chicken recipes which any family would welcome. One of the favorites is:

Neapolitan Chicken
Makes 3 servings

Wash well and dry:

1 (2 1/2-3 lb.) broiler, cut up

Place in a baking dish. Pour over chicken parts:

1/2 cup Italian dressing

Cover and refrigerate at least 1 hour. Uncover and bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 1 hour, or until tender, basting occasionally.

Chicken Cookery Pointers

The delicate flavor of chicken is enhanced by a variety of herbs and spices. Any of the following are excellent: tarragon, rosemary, parsley, basil, thyme, poultry seasoning, paprika, curry, ginger or nutmeg.

Try dipping the chicken in orange juice and adding grated orange rind to the flour before frying.

Basic chicken salad may be varied in many delectable ways. Try adding any of the following to your basic recipe: fresh diced pineapple, orange sections, grapes, diced apple, avocado, almonds, green pepper or sliced olives.

To the mayonnaise for basic chicken salad may be added a combination of curry, ginger, and finely cut chutney to taste. Or try a combination of capers, Worcestershire sauce, sour cream, and lemon juice to taste.

Jelly Roll Cutting

Ferego a knife and use a heavy white thread to slice cake rolls. Place a 15-inch piece of thread under the cake roll where you want to slice it. Bring ends together up over top, cross thread and pull it down quickly to cut through the cake roll.

Carpet Care

The National Institute of Rug Cleaning suggests these are three easy rules to add life and beauty to your rugs and carpets.

They are —

1. Daily cleaning with a carpet sweeper.

2. Careful vacuuming once or twice a week, depending on traffic and soiling conditions.

Hamlin Jaycees Open Golf Course

Grand opening of the Hamlin Jaycee Miniature Golf Course will be held at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, August 18, according to Bob Craig, president of the organization. The project was started by the Hamlin Jaycees on July 27 and was opened for play Saturday afternoon at 3 p.m. even though the project was not fully completed.

James Wright, chairman of the project, said that the final touches are being made this week for the formal opening.

Mayor John V. Howard will cut the ribbon during the opening ceremony. Rev. Leonard Hartley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will also take part in the program.

Following the opening ceremonies a foursome can play for 50c until 7:30 p.m.

The course is open from 6 to 10:00 p.m. daily and from 2 to 6 p.m. on Saturday. Sunday hours are from 2 to 5 p.m. and from 8 to 10:00 p.m.

64 Per Cent of Texas Cotton Picked by Mechanical Means

COLLEGE STATION, August 15 — Last year 64 percent of the Texas cotton crop was machine harvested — 13 percent by mechanical pickers and 51 percent by strippers. The trend is upward for this type of harvesting, says Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

An important consideration in the machine harvesting of cotton, he says, is the use of either defoliants or desiccants for preparing the cotton plants for the harvesting process.

Defoliants are used to prepare the cotton plants for spindle picking and two groups of material are available — dusts and sprays. Dust defoliants require leaf moisture to activate them and therefore give best results when applied late in the afternoon or early in the morning, says Elliott. Spray defoliants are available as chlorate and or zinc phosphorus materials. They may be used in the absence of moisture and at lower humidity levels. Thorough coverage of the plant is essential.

With ground sprayers, 10 to 20 gallons of water is recommended as the carrier for the material used, depending upon the type of sprayer and the extent of plant growth, explains the specialist. Applications of the defoliants should be staggered in order to stay just ahead of the harvesting operation and as a means of reducing regrowth, points out Elliott. He emphasizes that only recommended defoliants should be used. When 60 percent or more of the bolls are open most defoliants can be safely used, he says.

Arsenic acid and pentachlorophenol are the materials commonly used for desiccating purposes, that is preparing plants for stripper harvest. These materials can be used in water as recommended by the manufacturers. Desiccant applications should be made when more than 60 percent of the bolls are open under dryland conditions and on irrigated cotton when more than 80 percent of the bolls are open. No fiber damage should occur when

recommendations are followed, Elliott says.

For detailed information, he suggests that growers get from the local county agents office a copy of L-145 "Texas Cotton Defoliation Guide."

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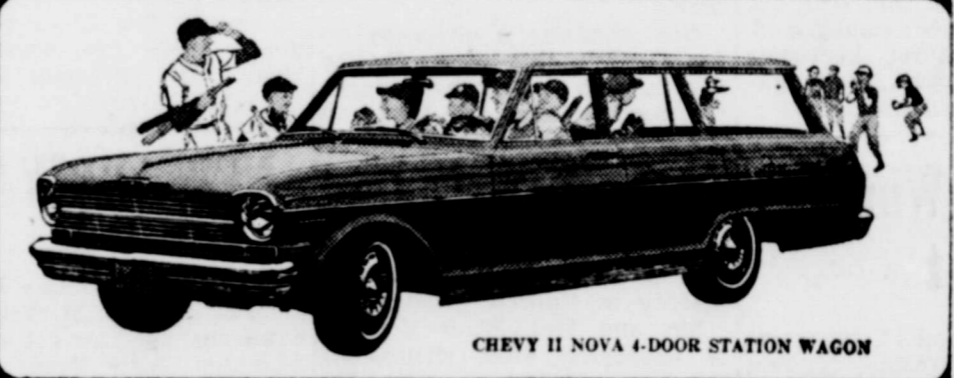

Dear Fellow Texan:
Here in a land where the Indians talked by smoke signal not too long ago, we have developed a new method for sending television, radio, telephone and wireless messages all over the world.
It is done by sending up what we call a satellite into space

and relaying signals from it to receiving stations at various points on the globe. Hundreds of millions of tax dollars went into the research that makes this modern system possible.
Now, we in the Congress must decide whether this great new force shall be turned over to a private monopoly or whether it

will remain in the hands and control of the people for the general good.

I am a member of a group of senators who introduced a bill for public ownership of the space communications satellites. Private communication by one corporation would block progress in a program to show that its potential for the good as a whole, beyond imagination.

We are now ahead in space communications because the taxpayers of America paid the research bill. We have spent \$25 Billion of taxpayers' money in research on the space sciences. In return, I strongly feel that the taxpayers must retain ownership of the satellites. The taxpayer deserves a return on his money under a program like the government-owned TVA or the Panama Canal company.

That's why I've joined with a group of senators to support a bill for government control of our rights to space. I oppose monopoly control by one company at the taxpayer's expense. The space communications program is too big for a private corporation to handle. It involves treaties with foreign powers.

far too much of a share of the powers of government to turn over to one private corporate monopoly.

American people must hold on to the golden space-age promise in the areas of world peace and progress. The debate in the Senate is over this conflict. The bill I support is in the public interest in my opinion and in the opinion of others helping in this fight, the private bill is not in the public interest but would only benefit special interests.

Tel grams are coming into my office urging me to stand fast. Let me cite a few of these letters from private citizens.
From Corpus Christi: "Don't give up the ship in the great 'give-away.' From Dallas: 'We're behind you here.' From a business executive in Chicago: 'I am in hearty agreement with you.' From a man and his wife in New York: 'Keep up the good fight for public ownership.'

Fellow Texan, the public ownership that I propose would not put the United States government in the telephone, telegraph or radio or TV business. The government would

merely own the satellite and not space in the spectrum to all the broadcasting, telegraph and telephone and telegraph companies to let them compete in the true free private enterprise system.

If we create one giant private monopoly we destroy the free enterprise system. Free enterprise means competition and government ownership of the satellite—with the government sending messages but renting space in the spectrum to the different competing telephone, telegraph and radio companies—would maintain the true private enterprise system.

Fellow Texan, I believe the Senate debate is helping to awaken the American people to the promise and to the dangers in world-wide space communications.

Nimble Fingers Turn Out Mountain of 4-H Sewing

When 4-H Club girls turn out more than 3 million pieces of sewing annually it's sure a sign that they like to sew.

A recent survey made by the Cooperative Extension Service shows that girls enrolled in a 4-H Clothing program completed more than 1 1/2 million dresses, coats, suits and miscellaneous attire and about the same amount of household articles such as draperies, pillow covers, spreads, covers and the like.
Before the girls can make these things, however, they must learn how to use a sewing machine. And they do. The local volunteer 4-H Club leader does the "showing how."

Where does the local clothing leader get the up-to-date know-how she passes on to her young counterparts? At Singer Sewing Centers or some other designated place where she takes a 4-H course called "Getting the Most Out of Your Sewing Machine."

This special training is a cooperative effort of the Singer Sewing Machine Company, the Extension Service and the National 4-H Service Committee.

Since the program was first introduced in 1955 some 60,000 extension agents and volunteer clothing leaders have been trained. They in turn have instructed junior

4-H clothing project leaders and members.

Singer provides literature, sewing materials and experienced instructors to augment extension personnel who supervise the training program.

Besides sponsoring the sewing machine training program the firm makes another noteworthy contribution to 4-H.

During the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago, Singer presents a "pop" concert, played by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Arthur Fiedler, for the entire delegation of some 2,000 boys and girls and adults.

The concert this year will take place on Monday night, Nov. 26 in Orchestra Hall. Two young 4-H soloists will be featured.

Bookmobile Shows Increase

AUSTIN — Texas State Library's Tri-County Bookmobile demonstration serving Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor counties, reports that during the month of July 4,607 books and recordings were borrowed from the Bookmobile.

Mrs. S. L. McElroy, Bookmobile Librarian also stated that 29 new patrons registered to borrow books. "I would like to clarify a misunderstanding some patrons have regarding the registration," the librarian remarked, "it is necessary to register only one time and that single registration is valid as long as the Bookmobile serves the area. We ask patrons to present their library card each time they borrow a book because it is necessary to use the card in the automatic borrowing machine."

The Tri-County Bookmobile demonstration is considered one of the outstanding examples of library service in the State. Recently the Commissioners' Courts approved the purchase of a Bookmobile and all counties have appropriated money in the next budget for its operation and maintenance. Texas State Library will continue to furnish most of the books.

Mrs. McElroy urged residents of the Tri-County area to make use of the Rural Library Service Bookmobile. "Residents will find books of all kinds, informational as well as recreational; books for adults, young people and for children."

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands."
"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein."
"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and the same shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:
"Section 2b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the Constitution and laws of this state, and such governing body shall also have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

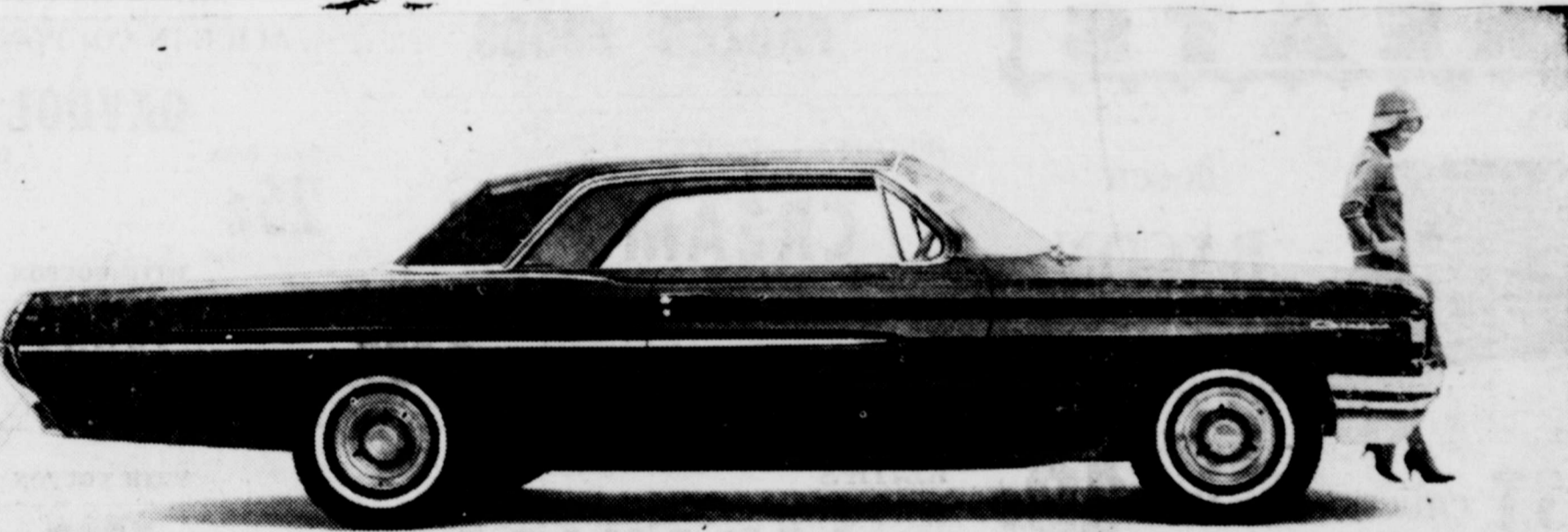
changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scientific census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 2b, providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."
"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 2b, providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts, and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the conditions prescribed by the Legislature."
Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

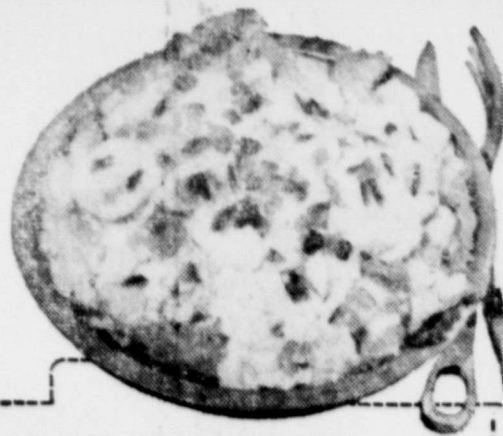

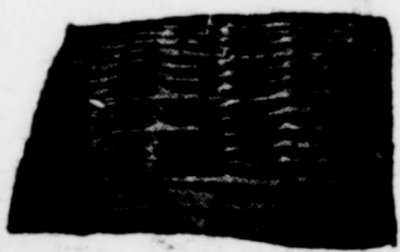

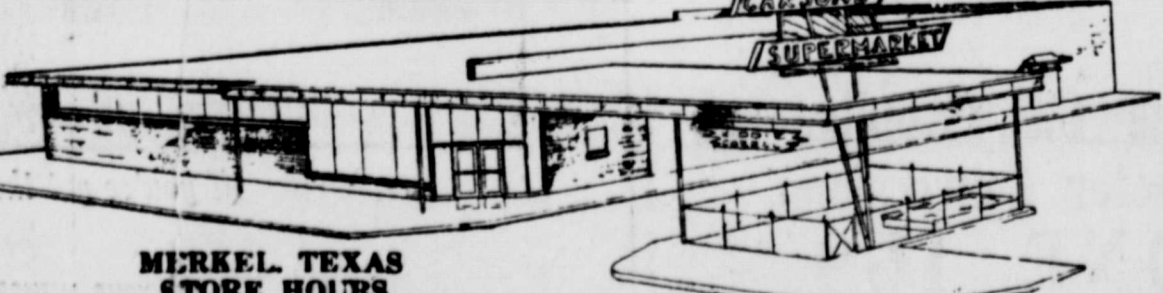
