Afro-American Texans celebrate emancipation on Juneteenth

On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger landed in Galveston and issued a general order freeing African Americans from slavery.

This year, June 19 marks the 130th anniversary of Emancipation Day in Texas.

Popularly known as Juneteenth, Emancipation Day was made an official state holiday in 1979 by the 66th Texas Legislature to commemorate the occasion.

African American Texans across the state celebrate the event with parades, music, picnics and festivities.

The Emancipation Proclamation to free all the slaves in regions still under Confederate control originally was issued in 1863 by President Abraham Lincoln.

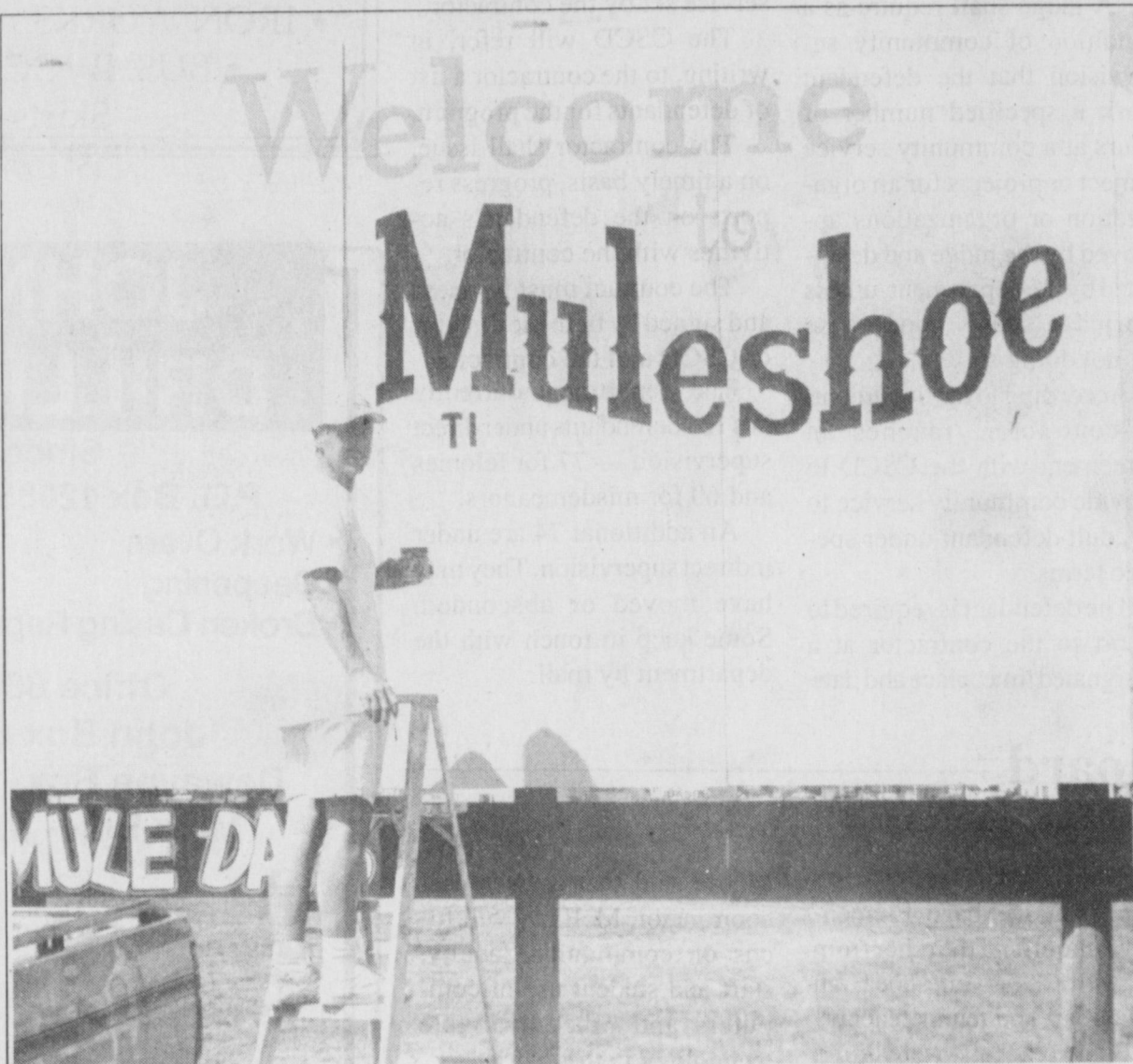

Program provides probationers chance for community service

Civic groups, churches, schools and other non-profit organizations can receive assistance from probationers serving suspended sentences.

Chief Probation Officer Bud Street at the Community Supervision and Corrections Department (Adult Probation), said recently that interested organizations can sign a simple contract with the department to request labor from people who are doing community service as a term of their probation.

Joy Williams, a certified

supervision officer and assistant in the Community Justice Assistance Division, said that probationers are not allowed to replace existing employees, but are contracted to do additional work which no one is currently being paid to do.

District Clerk Nelda Merriott has worked out an agreement as a Girl Scout leader for probationer Rudolfo Nunez, a 1993 graduate of Muleshoe High School, to put the finishing touches on the interior paint job of the Girl Scout Little Hut.

Merriott also said that in

addition to community service, probationers are required to pay court costs, restitution to injured parties and appointed counsel fees if the court appoints an attorney for them.

Nunez, who is attempting to complete 200 hours of community service by the end of June, also has been contracted to replace the fence at the Little Hut. "I do everything I can wherever I can," he said.

Nunez said when he completes his community service, he hopes to get a full time job or to enroll in college at West Texas A & M University in

Canyon.

Williams said that the corrections department is not liable for accidents while the probationer is working for an agency, and that the agency must supply the hoses, rakes, tools, paint, etc. that the worker needs to accomplish the job.

She said that either the worker or the agency provides transportation to the job site.

Williams said that DeShazo Elementary School, Muleshoe High School, the Bailey County Coliseum and some of the area churches have taken advantage of the opportunity

Also named to the first team were infielders Robert Toscano, Jimmy Gauna and John Embry; outfielder Robert Jaime and designated hitter Jarred Redwine.

The Mules compiled a 20-

Perez compiled an 11-5 overall record with 100 strikeouts and an earned run average of 3.5. He was 6-1 in district play. He also had a .351 batting average on the year and hit .483 in district play with six doubles.

Toscano hit .360 with 10 doubles and one home run in 1995. He hit .460 in district play for the Mules.

Embry led the Mules at the plate, hitting .473 for the season with 8 doubles, 7 triples

Williams said. And the service must be pre-arranged and a contract signed.

The contract of the 287th Judicial District Community Supervision and Corrections Department/Community Service (CSCD) states:

"A judge shall require as a condition of community supervision that the defendant work a specified number of hours at a community service project or projects for an organization or organizations approved by the judge and designated by the department, unless the judge shows good cause for not doing so."

According to the document, a "contractor" reaches an agreement with the CSCD to provide community service to an adult defendant under specific terms.

The defendant is required to report to the contractor at a designated time, place and date.

He or she shall not be permitted the use of power tools, except under direct supervision of the contractor or designated person.

The probationer is required to complete, on a schedule set by the CSCD, the community service set by the contractor.

The CSCD will refer, in writing, to the contractor a list of defendants for the program.

The contractor shall issue, on a timely basis, progress reports on the defendant's activities with the contractor.

The contract must be dated and signed by both the director of CSCD and the contractor.

The department currently has 137 defendants under direct supervision — 77 for felonies and 60 for misdemeanors.

An additional 74 are under indirect supervision. They may have moved or absconded. Some keep in touch with the department by mail.

Miracle, special education teacher at DeShazo Elementary School, and the other from Terry Graves, a Muleshoe High School art and tennis teacher.

Moore said that as technical coordinator, McElroy will focus on community, faculty, staff and student use of computers and other available technology in the district.

If adult education classes are offered in computer use, McElroy will teach them, Moore said.

During regular session, the school board voted to approve plans for a Title I Schoolwide program involving DeShazo and Dillman Elementary Schools.

The district is allowed to establish such a program if 60% or more of the students en-

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attending local high schools and living with an American family.

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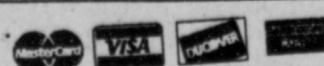
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Schuster Family honored

rolled or living in the attendance area meet low-income criteria.

Using 1994-1995 statistical data, it has been determined that the district average for students on free or reduced lunches is 64%.

So Muleshoe I.S.D. qualifies for the new program, which will free up equipment such as VCRs and overhead projectors, as well as school personnel, formerly designated for use by Title I (previously known as Chapter I) students only.

Moore said the new program will eliminate the labeling, segregating or grouping of at-risk students.

Under the new program, all students at DeShazo and Dillman will become eligible Title I students, and funds will not need to be spent on supplemental services only.

Moore said that compensatory education money can be spent to fund at-risk students at Watson Junior High School and at Muleshoe High School.

At-risk students include students who are economically disadvantaged or who have special health problems or language difficulties, Moore said. "We are dealing with kids who need extra help," he added.

Another item of the agenda was the selection of an energy management partner. Two firms from Lubbock submitted plans: Higgins & May, Inc. Consulting Engineers and Honeywell.

Honeywell was selected, and its representative, Joe Persely, was at the board meeting to answer questions about the proposal.

Honeywell plans to do a

preliminary study of the heating, air conditioning, ventilation and lighting systems and to examine equipment to determine ways the district can operate more efficiently to save both energy and money.

Moore said that during the last two years, new ballasts and bulbs in the fluorescent lighting at the schools have been replaced for energy and cost efficiency and that air conditioning has been installed on all campuses.

He said he is hoping that Honeywell can recommend preventive maintenance to extend the life of existing equipment.

Honeywell also has offered — as an energy management partner — to help the district apply for state and federal energy grants.

The approval of the interlocal agreement with Sudan I.S.D. allows the property-wealthy district to apply funds toward the weighted average daily attendance of a property poor district.

Moore said this agreement with Sudan has been in effect for three years. The funds come directly from Sudan rather than being allocated from Austin, Moore said.

The sick leave policy approved by the board will allow personnel with catastrophic illnesses or accidents, to apply for a pool of sick leave days donated by other personnel.

Such personnel can apply for 25 days of sick leave up to four times per year under the agreement, in order to avoid loss of salary during extenuating circumstances. The program is voluntary, and unused

sick leave days will revert to the employee who offered them.

ARAMARK's food service contract was renewed. The food service has provided new meal choices for students and has been active in the community during pre-game dinners and annual banquets, Moore said.

According to ARAMARK president, Howard T. Watson, there was a 6.4% increase in participation and an 11.4% increase in revenues last year.

The board approved the 1994-1995 school calendar, and the board began discussion of salaries and will take up the issue at the next meeting, Moore said.

Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Adrian Meador reported that summer school students include 43 at Dillman, 50 at DeShazo, 18 at the junior high school and 20 at Pep School. He said that Science Spectrum is in effect for the summer.

Curtis Shelburne, board secretary, reported on a conference he had attended concerning superintendent evaluation. He said that Muleshoe I.S.D. evaluates its superintendent on nine simple criteria four times per year.

Shelburne said that under the new law, the responsibilities of a superintendent have changed, including sole responsibility and authority for recommending the hiring of personnel.

The board may accept or reject his recommendations, but may not act without a recommendation, Shelburne explained.

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The cost of recycling



We try to be faithful recyclers around our house. I make regular runs to town with the pickup full of newspapers, bottles, aluminum cans, cardboard boxes and tin.

I take old pipe and steel to the scrap metal yard and buy car parts at G&B Salvage.

Yesterday I noticed our toilet paper was labeled "100% unbleached, 100% recycled paper, 100% post consumer content and 59.4 sq. ft. in total area." It's a little like newsprint and I feel odd using toilet paper somebody else has used but I guess we're doin' the right thing.

Sister Sue said they were using it, too. But it struck her as one of the incongruities of the 90's that recycled toilet paper costs more than a roll of

new. I remember the same thing happened with gasoline when they introduced unleaded. It cost more than regular to which they had to add the lead.

How 'bout sugarless gum? Bottled water? Egg substitutes? Hamburger Helper cost more per pound than hamburger. Are we being skewered on our noble quest to be green and healthy?

Several years ago the cattle business went on a binge to recycle manure and feed it back to the steers. Concrete pens, elaborate washing systems, dryers and millions of dollars yielded us a product with the nutrition and palatability of bedding for the price of caviar. The trend toward lean beef

gives me second thoughts, as well. Just looking at a hubcap size Holstein round steak, you realize God intended it for taco meat. But if that same steak goes into a specialty health food

meat counter it costs twice as much. It is labeled Au Bouf DeLite and guaranteed to contain less than .01% fat. Cooking instructions are explicit: Boil for three days and pound until flat as hammered gravy.

My mother saved and re-used tin foil, wax paper, jelly glasses, bacon fat, soup bones, old bananas, cloth diapers, baby clothes, string, ribbon, wrapping paper and cottage cheese containers. There are still those around who straighten and reuse old nails, buckets of bolts, fence wire

and lumber. Maybe, in truth, if you counted the labor, it costs more to straighten old nails than to buy new ones. But thriftiness forced recycling.

Today the high cost of recycled, sugarless, lean, unleaded products is the price we pay to do our part in makin' the world a better place.

So when pondering the use of environmentally correct antique toilet paper we can envision the historical significance and gain some satisfaction knowing this same paper might have been used by Davy Crockett, Opra Winfrey or Chief Sitting Bull. And if that don't make it worth the price I'll send you some slightly used corn cobs.

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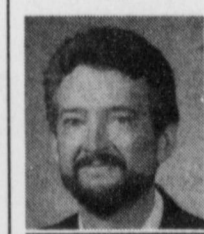
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"God Is Like My Father"

Creator, Lord, Potter, and, yes, even as a "woman in travail" (in Isaiah 42). And on the list could go. But without doubt the picture of God which speaks most clearly to me, and the one which I most treasure, is of God as our Father.

Thinking of God as my Father is absolutely positive and helpful to me because I grew up in a home with a father worthy of my highest respect. I learned about the love, the mercy, and the righteousness of my Father in heaven firsthand from my father on earth. If a child really does make the connection in his mind, "God is like my Daddy," and I think he does, that certainly presented

no hindrance to me as a child or as an adult.

I realize that not everyone is that fortunate. What happens to the child whose father is a man he has never known and his mother barely remembers? What happens to the little one whose father is a man who is always making promises but rarely keeping them, who loves his television or nine-iron more than his own child, who is, on one hand, too unloving to fairly discipline him, or, on the other, bitterly harsh and overly demanding?

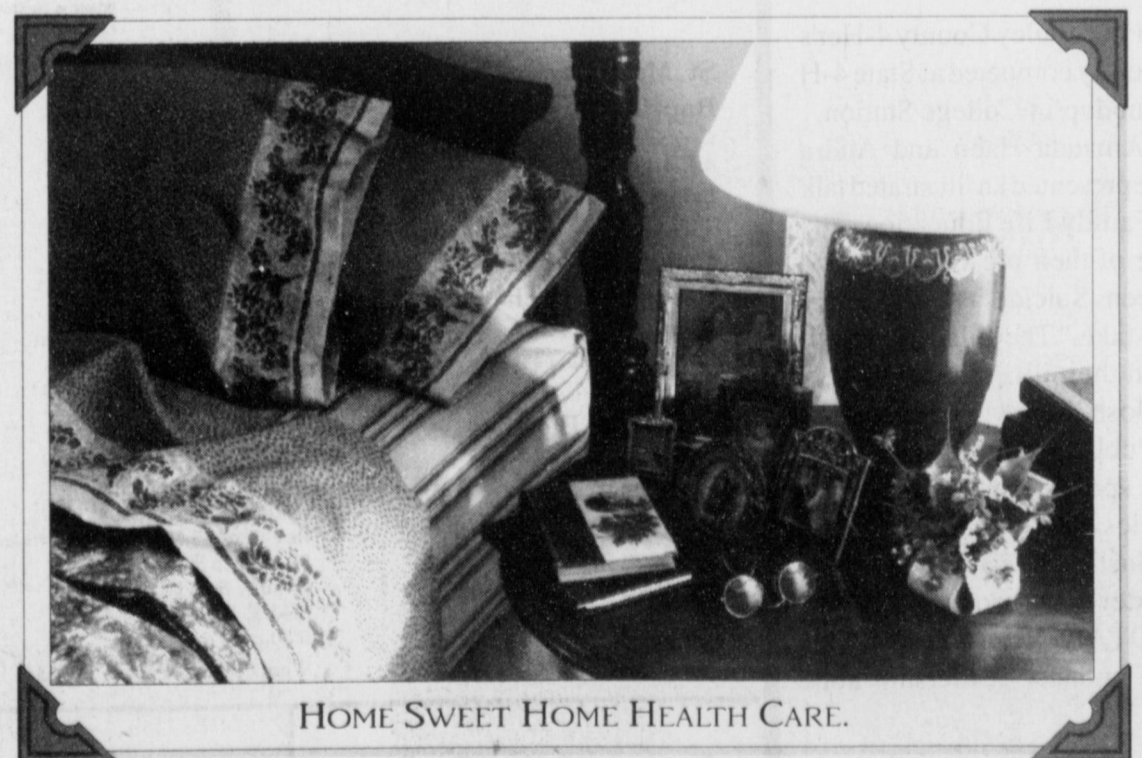
Something in the child's little mind says, "God is like my father. My dad is unconcerned about me, inconsiderate and unloving, severe and unbending. God must be all of these things and worse! I don't think I like God. I believe I can do better without Him."

You see, dads, an earthly father may be either the greatest aid or the worst hindrance a child has in really learning to love God and in embracing Him, embracing beauty and truth and joy.
