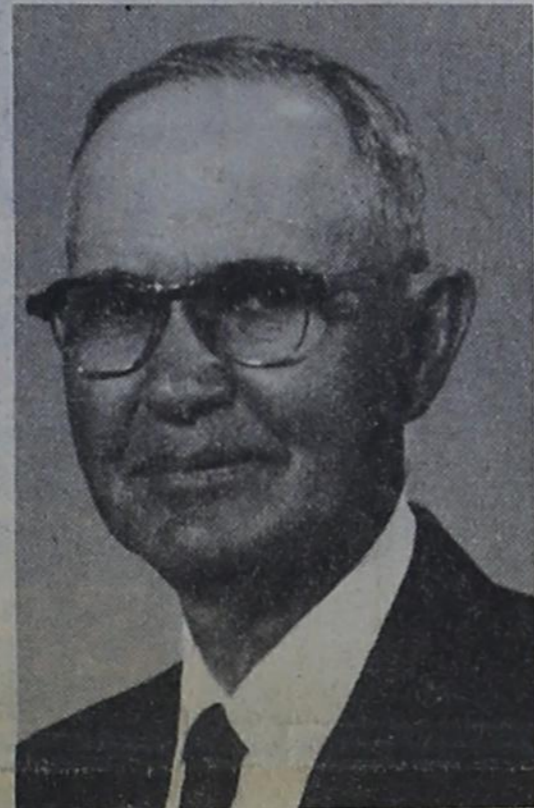
## L.M. Grissom's Services Held

Superintendent Bob Owen said "We are pleased to have someone with Paul's abilities and dedication. We look forward to our association with him in the athletic department."

Topliff, an Iowa native, spent four seasons at Texico, giving the school (1) its first winning season; (2) its first back to back district titles and (3) its first undefeated season.

The Wolverines were 3-6 in Topliff's first season, improved to 4-5 in 1977. In 1978, the team was 10-2, losing to Hagerman 34-19 in the state Class A finals. In 1979, the team was 9-0 in regular season play, and won two playoff games to again advance to the finals.

They again met Hagerman, and Topliff says, won the game everywhere except on the scoreboard, where Hagerman took a narrow 9-7 decision.

Topliff is from Gilmore City, Iowa, where he was an all-state running back in high school and also excelled at track. Though small, he wanted to play college football, and finally, Coach Jack Scott gave him his chance at Westmar College in Lamars, Iowa, telling him he could play both football and run track.

Topliff responded by starting every varsity game in college, where he played wide receiver, and was named to the "Little All-America" team his senior year.

He received his college degree in 1970. He became head coach at Everly, Iowa, spending six years there and developing a successful program, getting into the playoffs twice.

When Coach Scott moved to Eastern New Mexico University, he persuaded Topliff to join his staff as wide receivers' coach. Topliff calls Scott his "second father," and says he took the job "sight unseen," but that when he first saw the desolate sandy country near Portales, he wondered what he had gotten himself into.

Topliff is married. His wife Rebecca also is a native Iowan. They have a son, Paul, 13, who will be in the eighth grade, and a daughter Tonia, 10, who will be in the fifth grade.

Mrs. Topliff will be an elementary teacher in the third grade here.

"I enjoy a challenge. We had a good program, and a great school

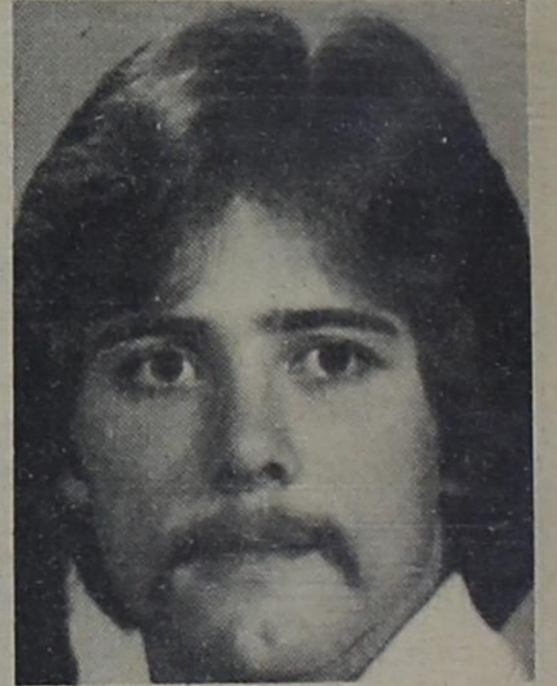

### Clif Neal Is Basketball Coach Here

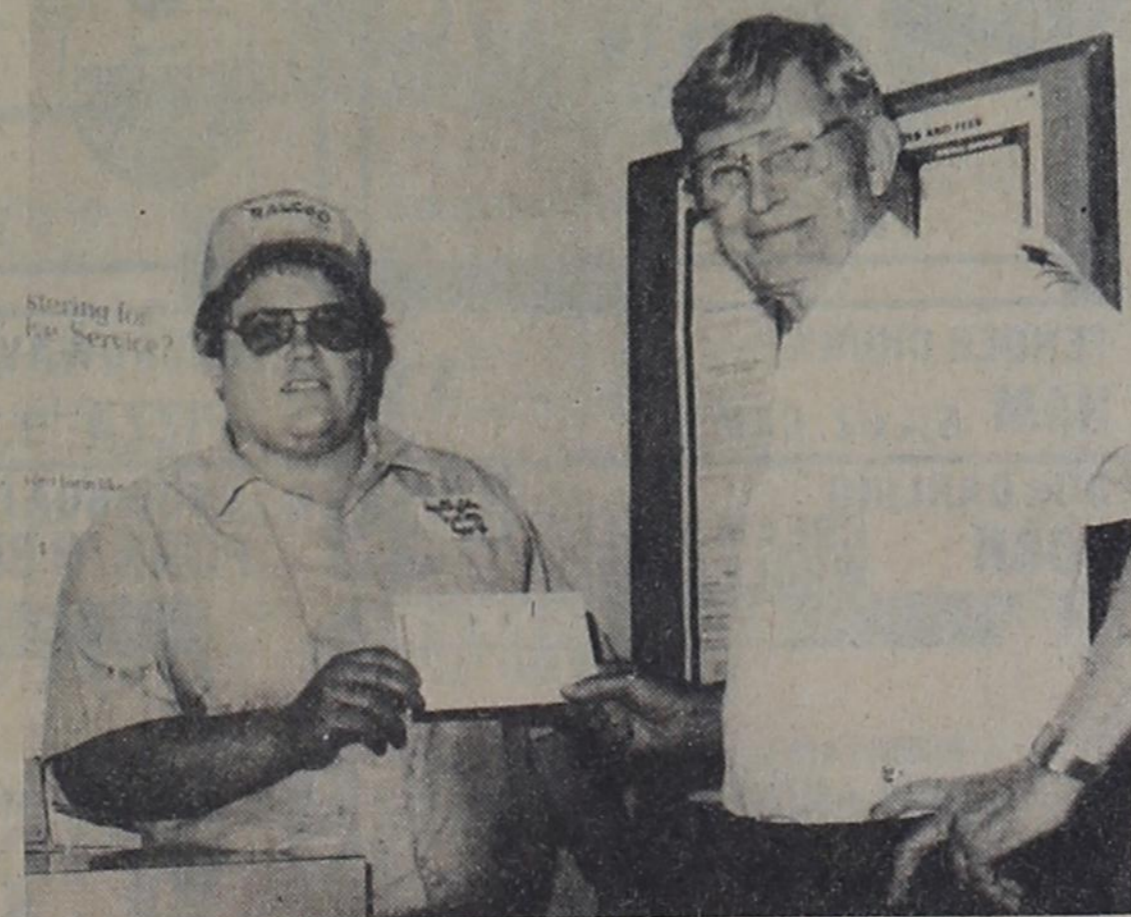
Clifton Neal is the new head boys basketball and assistant football coach at Bovina High School.

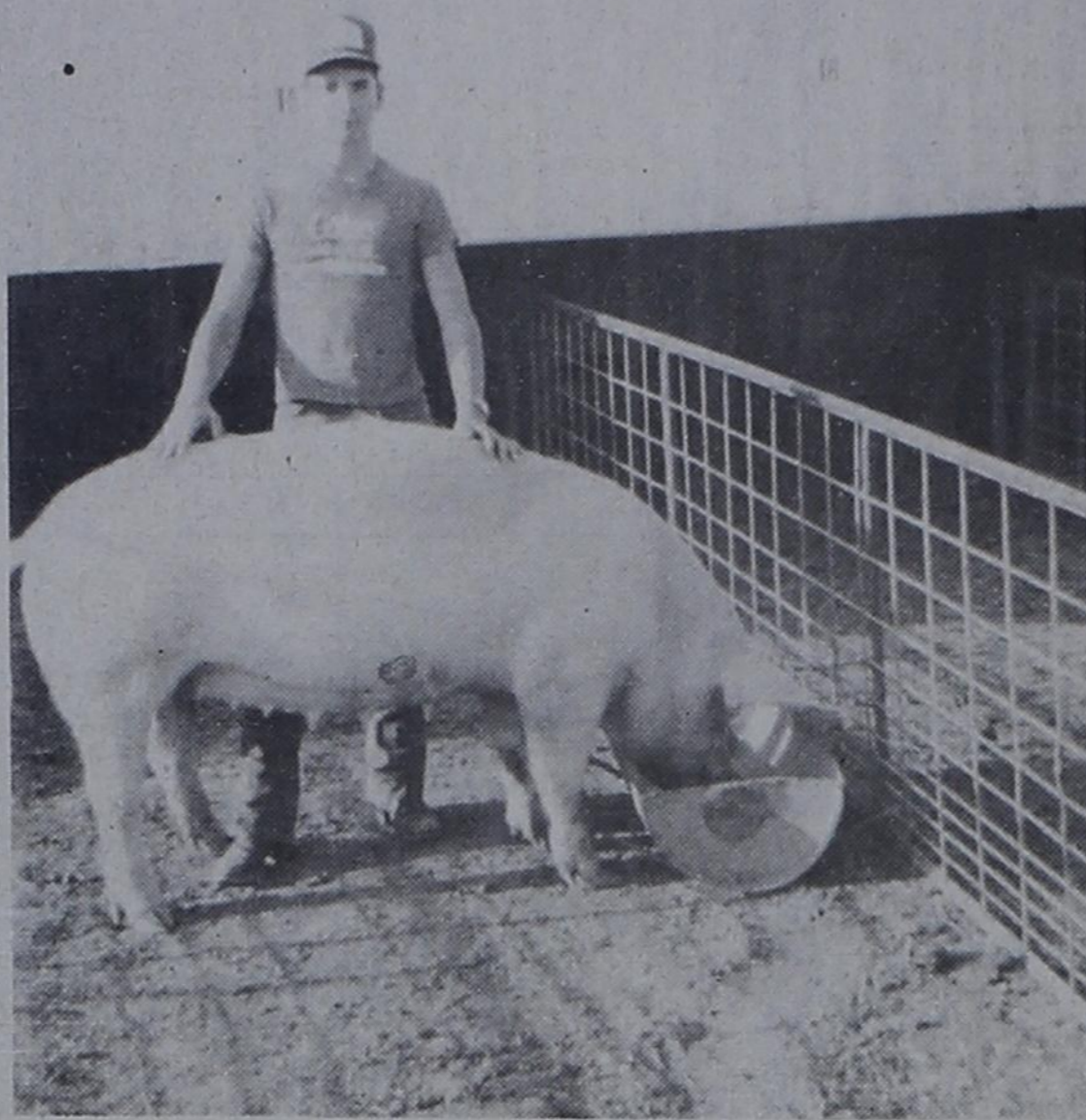

John is majoring in welding and fabrication and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O.B. Johnston of Star Route, Bovina.

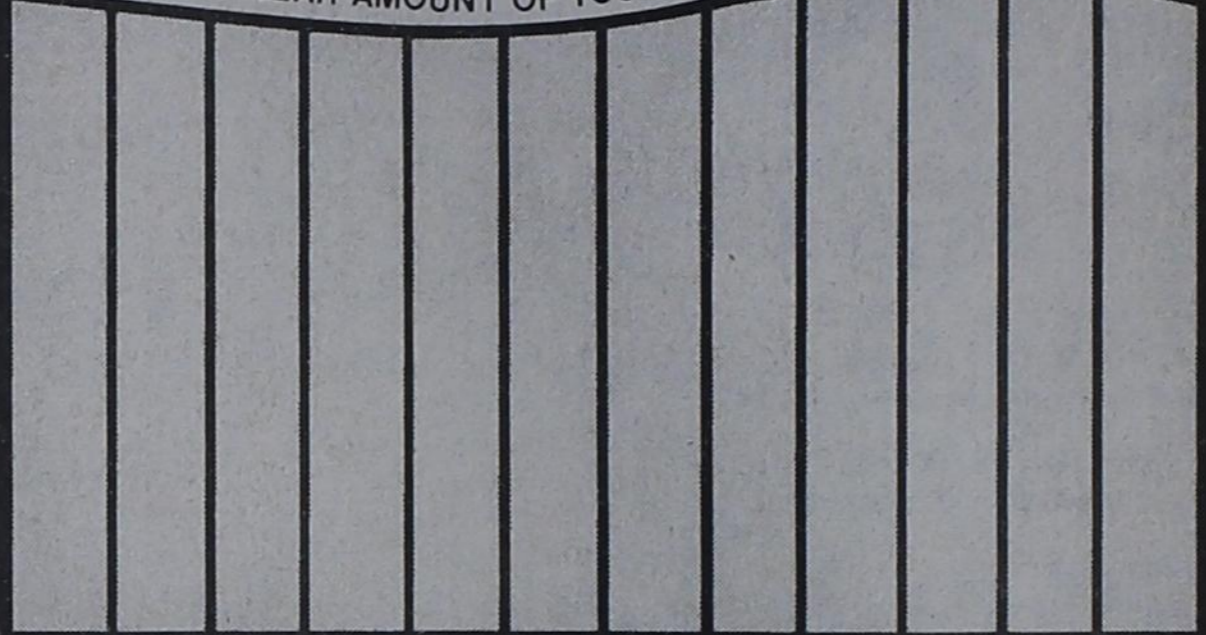

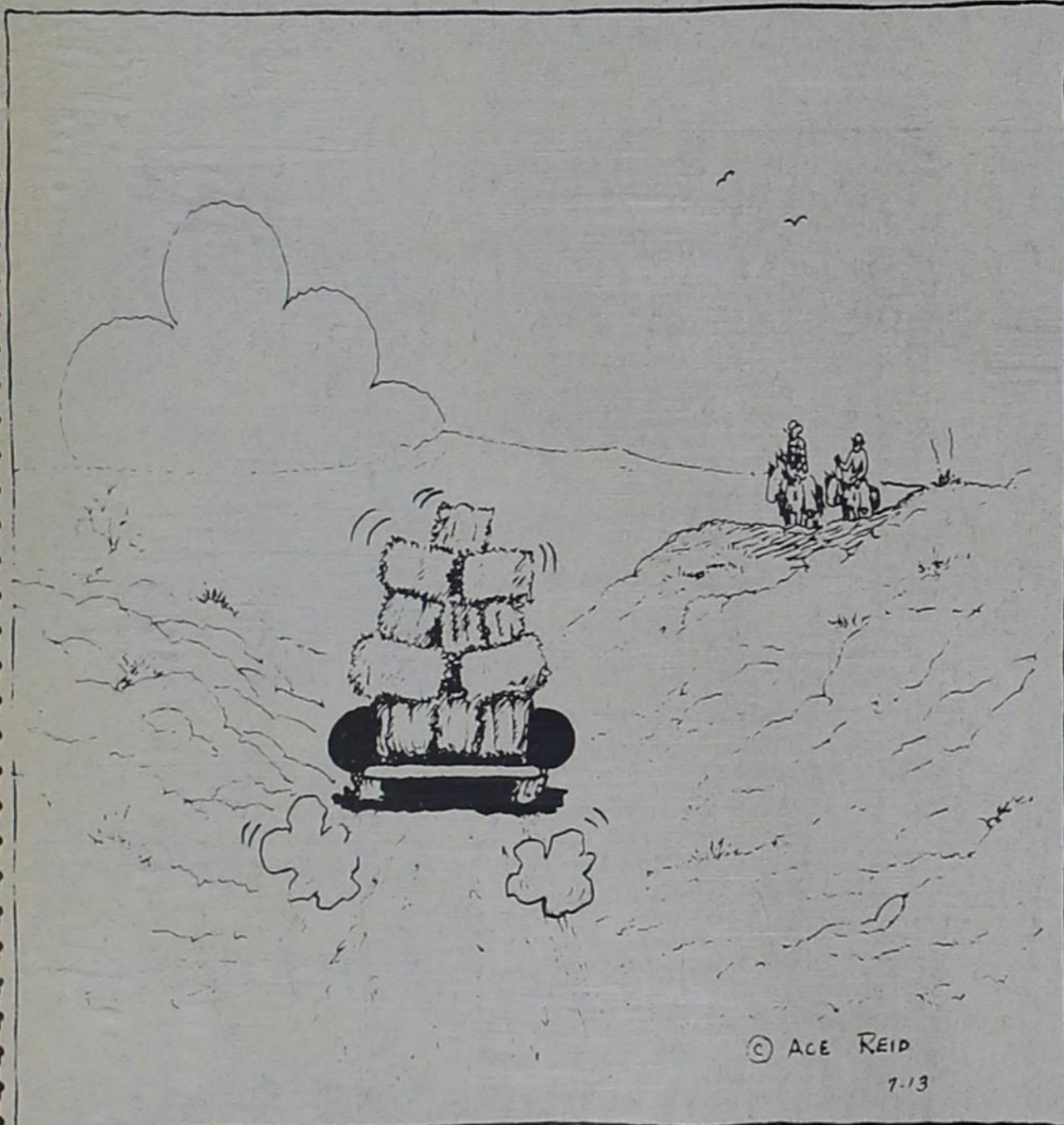
administration at Texico. I just enjoy building a program. I am excited about getting things going here. I'm ready for workouts to start," says Topliff, who oozes enthusiasm.

## Around The House

Pay careful attention to clothing contaminated by pesticides. Some pesticides can enter the body through the skin. Wash clothes worn while applying pesticides daily, or store them in plastic bags to await laundering. Do not mix contaminated clothes with other laundry.

Normal heavily soiled laundry procedures will remove pesticide from clothing. Follow this procedure:

Use hot water, 130-140 degrees F. and normal or full water level. Pre-soak or prewash for extra heavily soiled garments.

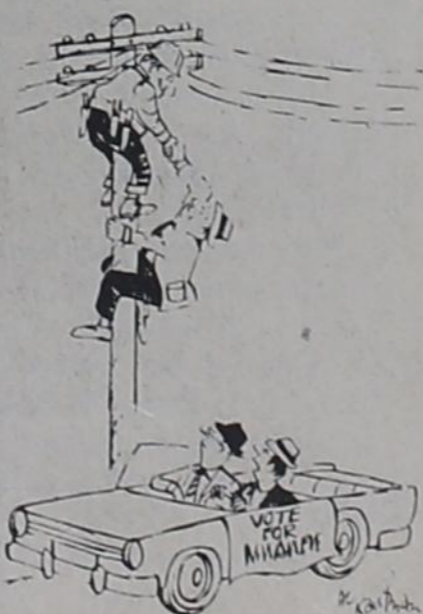
Use the manufacturer's recommended amount of heavy-duty detergent for heavily soiled laundry.

Use chlorine bleach to aid in sanitizing and deodorizing if garments are bleachable. Check permanent-care labels for warnings against bleaching.

Thoroughly rinse with cold water.

If possible, thoroughly dry in an automatic dryer at the regular fabric setting.

Remove any leftover pesticide from the washer by running the machine through the complete laundering cycle, using detergent but no clothes.
