#### A Thing Of The Past

Little by little, but with the sureness of the ebb and flow of the tides, the old. fine distinction between the two great political parties of this country have been slipping away. Party loyalty, as the nation once knew it, is virtually a thing of the past. Nowadays it is commonplace for a Democratic Presidential candidate to carry a state while the Republicans sweep the local and Congressional offices. And vice versa.

There is every reason why this should be so. Once the parties, and the men who represented the parties, stood solidly on one side or the other of issues - bimetallism versus a solid gold standard, free trade versus high tariffs, internationalism versus a Washington nationalism, more government power versus a rigidly limited government, and so on down a long, dramatic list. No longer. As the Portland, Oregon, Journal, puts the question: "On the basis of political and social philosophy, for instances, why is Senator Hubert Humphrey in the same party as Sen. Strom Thurmond, or Senator Barry Goldwater in the same party as Governor Rockefeller?

So, inthese times, we vote for individual men and women, not for a strong, clear party policy. Whether this is good or bad is certainly a matter of argument. But the fact exists, and the impact on the American governmental is profound.





#### YOUR FAIR SHARE

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks.

They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.

As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share - others, less.

People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 5-0. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . .. all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the inofrmed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510 - so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure to each landowner his FAIR SHARE.







#### Some Guns Are Loaded

I'm sure you have heard the familiar phrase, "I didn't know the gun was loaded" many times after a gun accident or incident or inadvertant firing of a weapon.

This excuse or cause along with many other popular causes such as, "Failed to clear weapon," "Check list not followed," "Inadvertantly pressed the trigger," "SOP's not complied with," "Failed to assure the 'Safety' was on,' "Practicing quick - draw techniques and weapon functioned." "Failed to check to assure the chamber was clear, removed clip, didn't know round was chambered," are common expressions received on many of the 483 explosive accident/incidents reported in imately 50 percent of these resulted from personnel error. 23 percent equipment failure, 15 percent malfunction of equipment, 7 percent unknown and 5 percent aircraft crashes and others.

If we could have prevented all accidents caused by personnel error, we could have cut the accident rate in half. This effort must start with you, however check lists, T.O.'s and local procedures are already published and available, All it takes is for each one of us to follow these established procedures, and this cause will be eliminated.

Care Not Taken Many of the reported accidents are logged in with cryptic descriptions such as: "Airman shot self in leg, airman shot self in hand, airman shot self in shoulder, airman shot another in stomach, etc. These accidents were caused by careless handling and horseplay. Several "quick


