Aircraft Are Lifeless; Made To Live By Men

Though aircraft have been built to fly at fantastic speeds and to soar to the outer altitudes of the atmosphere, without men at the controls they are simply

inanimate objects of wire, metal and plastic.

Put a man in the cockpit and the aircraft virtually becomes a magic carpet which can perform a variety of missions in peace or war.

It was man, a SAC pilot to be precise, who during the recent Cuban crisis operated the high altitude vehicle which brought back first-hand proof of the Soviet missile build-up in Cuba. Ten pilots of SAC's 4080th Strategic Wing were awarded Distinguished Flying Crosses for their "exceptional flying skill and personal bravery" in obtaining the conclusive evidence of the Soviet buildup of offensive weapons. TAC and Navy pilots received similar recognition for their low level missions.

In the early days of aviation many men "bet their lives" just by stepping in an airplane and starting a flight. Great technical advancements have eliminated this kind of risk but heroism is still an everyday occurrence among men who operate aircraft.

Just recently, a SAC B-47 aircraft commander surrendered his life to make it possible for three of his crew members to escape from their damaged aircraft and live to fly again. Such records are not just gold stars on a report card. They are proof that man cannot be deleted from the operational phases of the aerospace age.

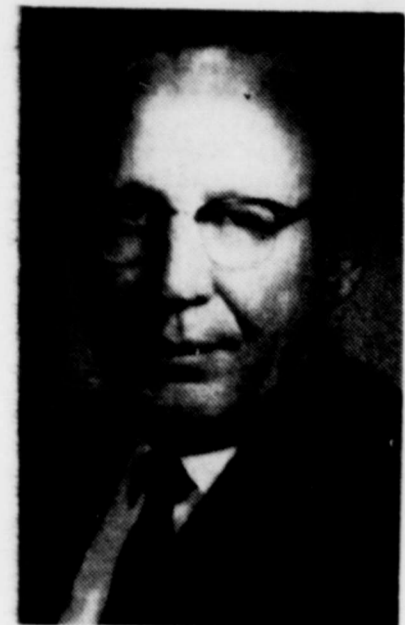

These were the KC-135 aerial refueling tankers which, in the month of around-the-clock flying during the crisis, completed 4,076 aerial refuelings and transferred more than 70 million gallons of fuel.

At this same time, all available SAC B-47 and B-52 bombers were on constant ground alert at bases throughout the world, ready to respond to any level of aggression, anywhere.

They were secure in the knowledge that they could be able to accomplish their assigned missions, knowing that the KC-135 and KC-97 tankers would be at the specified rendezvous point at the specified time to give them the fuel to complete their missions and return to their home bases.

Over the years, through millions of flying hours and countless hookups, SAC's tankers and bombers have made a science of aerial refueling, until now theoretically only combat crew endurance limits the time the bombers may remain in the air.

The SAC tankers and bombers have become, essentially, one weapon system — unmatched in military history — and recognized as the world's most powerful strike force.

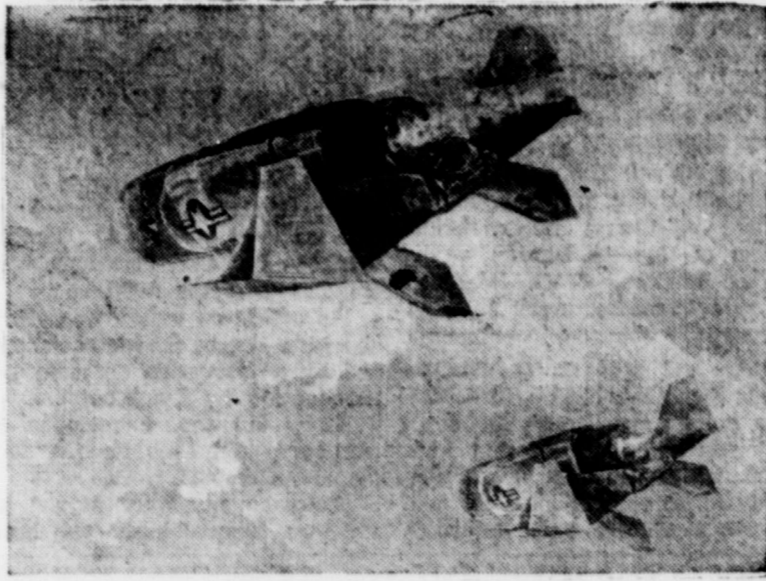

SAC Aircraft Always On Alert -- Everywhere

At Strategic Air Command bases around the world, SAC aircraft stand ready—never more than a few minutes from being airborne and on the way to their target.

But it takes men-skilled, dedicated, professionals—to make B-52s, B-47s, B-58s and their supporting tankers into discriminating tools for peace.

Since October 1957, SAC aircraft have been on 24-hour-a-day alert. Today the command has 50 per cent of its total bomber and tanker forces on ground alert—ready to react well within the warning time provided by the ballistic missile early warning system (BMSWS).

Maintenance crews constantly check and recheck the aircraft, and flight crews sleep and eat nearby while pulling alert duty around the clock. Working together, ground and flight crew teams keep the aircraft ready at all times.

The overseas portion of this world-wide alert operation termed "Reflex" sends crews and aircraft from SAC's stateside bases to overseas areas for a short time where they remain on the alert similar to that in the United States.

In addition, a portion of SAC's heavy bombers are continuously flying airborne alert training missions. Thus, SAC has tested and proved the airborne alert with thousands of successful sorties.

During the Cuban quarantine in October 1962, the command launched the first airborne alert in the history of airpower. SAC aircraft flew 20,022,000 miles and completed 4,076 aerial refuelings during that operation. Alert crews know their targets and the routes they must fly to reach them.

Although the command's intercontinental ballistic missile force is rapidly increasing, no responsible military authority has suggested that they will soon cancel the need for SAC's alert bomber force.
