"More school children die from cancer each year than from any other disease. About half of them die from lukemia, which is cancer of the blood forming tissues. Lukemia, once considered primarily a disease among children, is far more prevalent among adults. The disease will take the lives of 2300 children and about 11,500 adults this

year. The American Cancer Society has designated 1963 as "This Year of the Volunteer" in behalf of the more than 2 million volunteers who make up the organization.

Put a man in the cockpit and the aircraft virtually becomes a magic carpet which can perform a varity of missions in peace or war

It was man, a SAC pilot to be precise, who during the recent Cuban crisis operated the high altitude vehicle which brought back first-hand proof of the Soviet missile build-up in Cuba. Ten pilots of SAC's 4080th Strategic Wing were awarded Distinguished Flying Crosses for their "exceptional flying skill and personal bravery" in obtaining the conclusive evidence of the Soviet buildup of offensive weapons. TAC and Navy pilots received similar recognition for their low level missions.

In the early days of aviation many men "bet their lives" just by stepping in an airplane and starting a flight. Great technical advancements have eliminated this kind of risk but heroism is still an everyday occurrence among men who operate aircraft.

Just recently, a SAC B-47 aircraft commander surrendered his life to make it possible for three of his crew members to escape from their damaged aircraft and live to fly again. Such records are not just gold stars On a report card. They are proof that man cannot be deleted from the operational phases of the aerospace age.


