Here are a few tips to guarantee success with the salad: To assure ease in unmolding the salad it's a good idea to oil the mold lightly with salad oil. Although this towering shape is most impressive, any 2 quart container can be used - a ring mold, loaf pan, or round mixing bowl.

To speed up the preparation time, set the bowl containing the gelatin and fruit juice mixture in ice water and stir occasionally

and the syrupy consistency is reached. To unmold the salad, run the tip of a narrow knife around the edge of the mold, loosening the salad and then invert the mold on a plate. The deluxe dressing is a combination of marshmallow creme, sour cream, lemon juice, and a dash of nutmeg. A quivering salad calls for a crisp cracker as a partner.
