149 Sign Up At Homecoming

A total of 149 Merkel exes registered at the community center last Friday, kicking off the first day of the Merkel Homecoming activities.

The highlight of Friday was a parade through downtown Merkel. Leading the parade was Ralph Russell, carrying the American Flag, Walter Henslee, carrying the Texas Flag, Horace Boney, Merkel Mayor and Joe Dell Gregory, president of the Homecoming Association.

Featured in the parade were Ruth Pangle and Nancy Johnson, 1962-63 reigning queens, and Mary Dunagin, 1963-64 queen.

Another featured attraction were the Brush Stompers, Merkel's Riding Club. They were led by Wanda McAninch, carrying the club banner.

Others taking part in this event were representatives from various classes and several cars carrying ex-presidents, majorities, class officers, cheerleaders, beauties and Homecoming queens. There was also a car carrying "future" exes.

A special attraction of the parade was Mrs. Etta Tucker of Merkel who was a student at Merkel's Normal and Commercial College sometime during 1887 and 1902.

Music for the parade was furnished by the Merkel High School Band under the direction of W. G. Reed.

Herman Carson, master of ceremonies, introduced each entry as the parade advanced through the downtown area.

Immediately following the parade a pep rally was held in front of Merkel Drug Company, and each of the Merkel Badgers were introduced. Short speeches were given by Mary Dunagin, head cheerleader, and Bob Byerly, head football coach.

Following dinner at the school cafeteria the evening entertainment was provided when the Merkel Badgers whipped past the Baird Bears in a 6-0 victory.

During the hi-fi time activities the high school band marched onto the field forming a double-lined "X" on the 50-yard line. Three 1964 cars furnished by Merkel Ford Company, Max Murrell Chevrolet, and Palmer Motor Company, brought the queens, escorts and attendants onto the field.

The highlight of the event was the crowning of Mary Dunagin, High School Homecoming Queen, and Esther Carson, Exes Homecoming Queen.

The 1963-64 queens were escorted by Wayman Adcock. The 1962-63 queens, Mary Johnson and Ruth Pangle were escorted by Joe Gregory.

Attendants for the occasion were flower girls Sherry Hanie,

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hanie, Lisa Gregory, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gregory, and Kathy Cypert, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Cypert.

Drivers of the three cars were Danny Cypert, F. J. Duncan and Duane Shugart.

Wayman Adcock was elected president of the Homecoming Association at a business meeting following the Badgers game.

Other officers elected to serve the 1963-64 term are William R. Cypert, vice president, Ouida Reid, secretary, and Pat Dalziel, treasurer.

Gifts were given during the meeting to Frank Smith, Abilene, oldest graduate to attend the reunion, Kay Lynn Cloudus, Abilene, youngest graduate, and Crenela Swope, for traveling the greatest distance.

Smith was graduated with the class of 1911, Kay Lynn Cloudus was a 1958 graduate and Crenela Swope, class of 1943, traveled from Torrance, California to attend the homecoming.

MERKEL CAR-BUS WRECK FATAL TO 93 YEAR OLD WOMAN

A 93 year old Merkel woman, Safornia Fellen, was killed last Thursday when the car in which she was riding rammed into the side of a Merkel School bus driven by W. G. Reed.

The car, a 1961 Chevrolet, was traveling south and the bus was traveling east. The wreck occurred when the two vehicles met at a country intersection. "By law the bus had the right of way and it was the Chevrolet's duty to yield, but it was a blind intersection," stated investigating patrolman Harold Evanson.

The crash occurred about 7:50 Thursday morning approximately 4½ miles southeast of Merkel. There were four other occupants in the car in which Mrs. Fellen was killed. They were Tommy Lee, Glenn Edward Lee, David Lee and Robert Lee, driver of the car.

Tommy Lee suffered a broken arm and David Lee had a slight head injury.

There were ten school children on the bus at the time of the accident. Only a few minor cuts and bruises were received by the children on the bus.

The Chevrolet hit the bus turning it around. The bus turned on its side partially in the ditch dragging the car under it. The accident was investigated by two Abilene patrolmen, Harold Eavenson and E. M. Watts.

TWO MERKEL BOYS MEET NEAR-DISASTER

Two Merkel boys, David Purley and Jerry McCloud, were among the 31 on board the DC-3 that was forced into a crash landing at Barksdale Air Force Base early Sunday morning.

Twenty-five McMurry football players, three coaches and three airline officials made up the 31 on board the plane.

The McMurry team had just met an 8-7 defeat by Northeast State College in Monroe, La., and were enroute to Abilene when the plane developed elevator trouble during its takeoff about 12:30 a. m.

When the plane left the ground its elevator controls apparently locked and it was unable to gain altitude.

Line coach Herbold Kimbrell said the pilot, W. B. Smith of Hurst, tried twice to land at Monroe. On the second attempt

a tire blew out and he flew to Barksdale and a larger runway.

"We flew at a really low altitude all the way," Kimbrell said.

"As we came into Shreveport, they had everybody tied down."

Because the plane's elevator controls were jammed, it was almost impossible for the pilot to get the tail section down. The three McMurry coaches volunteered to lie in the tail section to give the plane better balance and weight down that section.

One of the McMurry players, Joe Coulson from Fort Worth, said, "The coaches went to the back of the plane, where there were no seat belts, to weight down the tail section. They knew if the plane broke up what might happen to them. One of the boys wanted to take their place, but the coaches sent him back to his seat."

The coaches were Head Coach Grant Teaff and assistants Herbold Kimbrell and Buddy Fornes. All are married and have families.

The pilot had to bring the plane in at a faster than normal rate of speed, (about 100 miles per hour).

"When the plane first landed at Barksdale AFB it bounced about 10 feet in the air," Kimbrell said, slightly injuring Kimbrell and Teaff.

Just before the plane came in, Kimbrell said Teaff led the team in prayer.

"He was trying to calm everybody down," Kimbrell said.

"Everybody was scared, probably worse than they've ever been in their lives. But everybody was real calm. They conducted themselves real well."

"The first thing we did when we got off the plane, everyone knelt in prayer," Kimbrell said.

It was 1:05 a. m. when the plane hit the runway at Barksdale.

When the plane jolted to a stop amidst flying sparks, a fire broke out in one of the engines.

The engine was quickly covered with foam and after the football team folded, the entire craft was covered as a precautionary measure.

The fire chief said, "They were certainly fortunate. Real lucky. Most planes landing like that catch fire all over."

Only one member of the team was treated at the base hospital. Halfback James Maddox of Fort Worth was treated for shock and released shortly afterwards.

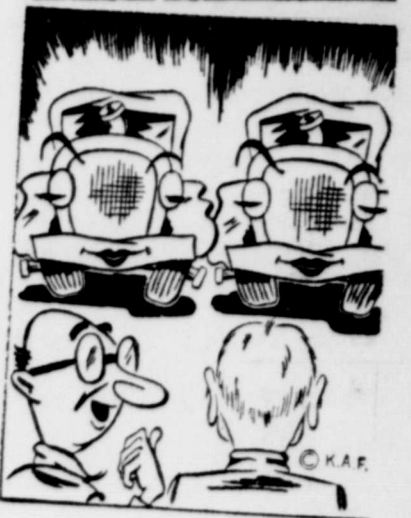

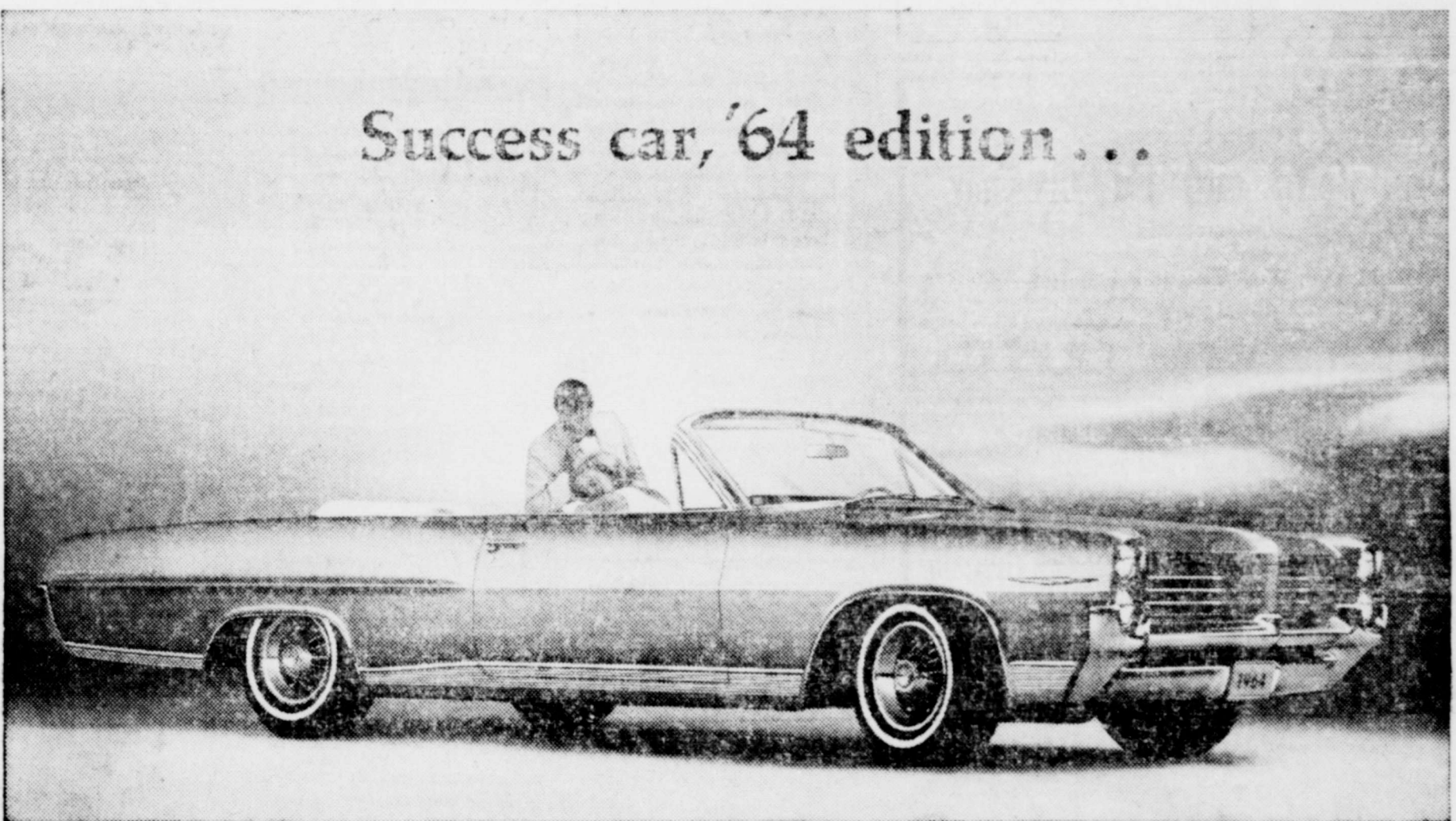

Tye - Abilene Land Overlaps

City Manager H. P. Clifton of Abilene said Thursday he hopes to open negotiations in about two weeks with the City of Tye to resolve the legal tangle resulting from overlapping annexations of 990 acres of land by the two cities last winter.

He said a study is now being made by staff members for recommendations to the Abilene City Council on clearing up the dual annexations.

The overlapping was discovered several weeks after Abilene had

annexed a 3,840 acre tract west of Abilene last Nov. 15. Two days earlier, Tye had either initiated or completed annexation action which included 990 acres annexed by Abilene.

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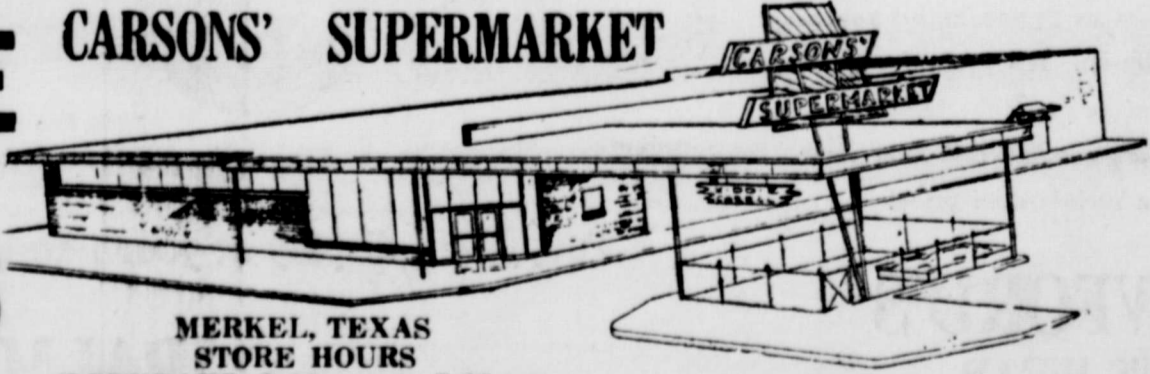
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
