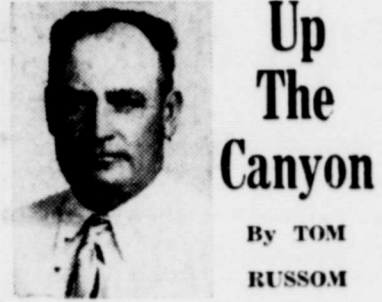

BADGERS LAME WITH INJURIES

The Merkel Badgers can wear the District 6-A Crown by defeating Roscoe at Merkl Stadium in the game starting at 7:30 Friday night.

The Badgers are unbeaten and untied in league play. But so are the Roscoe Plowboys. Merkel is also hurt with injuries. And the Plowboys will be set and eager to defeat Merkel.

The Badgers blanked Coahoma 35 to 0 at Coahoma last Friday night to add the Coahoma Bulldogs to the Badgers' string of victories. Merkel played a scoreless tie with Stanton and was defeated 50 to 14 by Albany.

Merkel's victories include: Merkel 26, Cross Plains 0; Merkel 6, Baird 0; Merkel 20, Rotan 6; Merkel 13, Aspermont 0; Merkel 48, Wylie 12.

The Badgers slashed their way to their fourth district victory over Coahoma in what Coach Byerly described as one of Merkel's best games. He said the team has played better defensively in games and better offensively in others — but that the Badgers played better all around ball against Coahoma.

However, Coach Byerly told members of the Merkel Booster Club that he looks for Roscoe to play an entirely different brand of ball from what they have been playing.

On the injured list for Merkel at this time is powerhouse Weldon Tittle, Gary Adcock, Jimmy Rives and Larry Owen.

Lacking in depth, the Badgers could be in desperate straits with the loss of manpower.

.. NEED SHOPPING IDEAS ..

October is the season when apples are most plentiful and their quality is excellent reminds Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, extension service consumer marketing specialist.

Medium to small size apples by the bag may be the best value. Today grapes and bananas are featured at attractive prices this week, but check for quality, the specialist adds.

Cranberries are available for a new menu offering. Grapefruit and oranges from Florida are on the market with prices ranging from moderate to high. Sweet potatoes, russet and red pota-

toes, cooking greens, cabbage, eggplant and carrots are among the budget extenders for vegetables this week. And there are limited quantities of locally grown peas, okra, broccoli, and cucumber coming to market.

Poultry departments abound with good buys. Fryers, chicken hens, turkeys and eggs are all good protein choices. Large supplies of beef and pork await your other 'cook out' methods are selection. Various beef roasts and hindquarter cuts for broiling are featured. Ground beef continues as a good value, and pork loin roasts, shoulder steaks and Boston butts are attractively priced. And you may want to consider cured and canned ham, picnics and bacos, the specialist adds.

Here is a fresh apple bread you might like to try.

FRESH APPLE ORANGE BREAD

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar (or 1/2 cup honey & 1/2 cup white sugar)
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 1/2 cups ground or grated unpeeled apple
- 1 cup ground raisin or
- 1 cup dates chopped fine
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts
- 1/4 cup orange peeling, ground very fine
- 4 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 3 eggs

Cream together sugar and shortening; add eggs and whip until light and fluffy. Mix together orange juice (you may use juice of 1 orange with cup filled to 3/4 mark with boiling water), apple, raisins, nuts and orange peel. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add fruit mixture alternately with dry mixture. Bake at 350 F. 1 1/2 hours, or until straw pressed into center comes out clean. Baking container should be well greased and floured. Try making small round loaves by baking in No. 2 popcorn or soup cans. Fill cans about 3/4 full of batter. When cold, cut in thin rounds and spread with butter or creamed cheese for afternoon tea, or party refreshments. Nippy cheese is much better.

Miss Betty Jo Richardson of Merkel was recently accepted as a member of Pandora Social Club at Abilene Christian College.

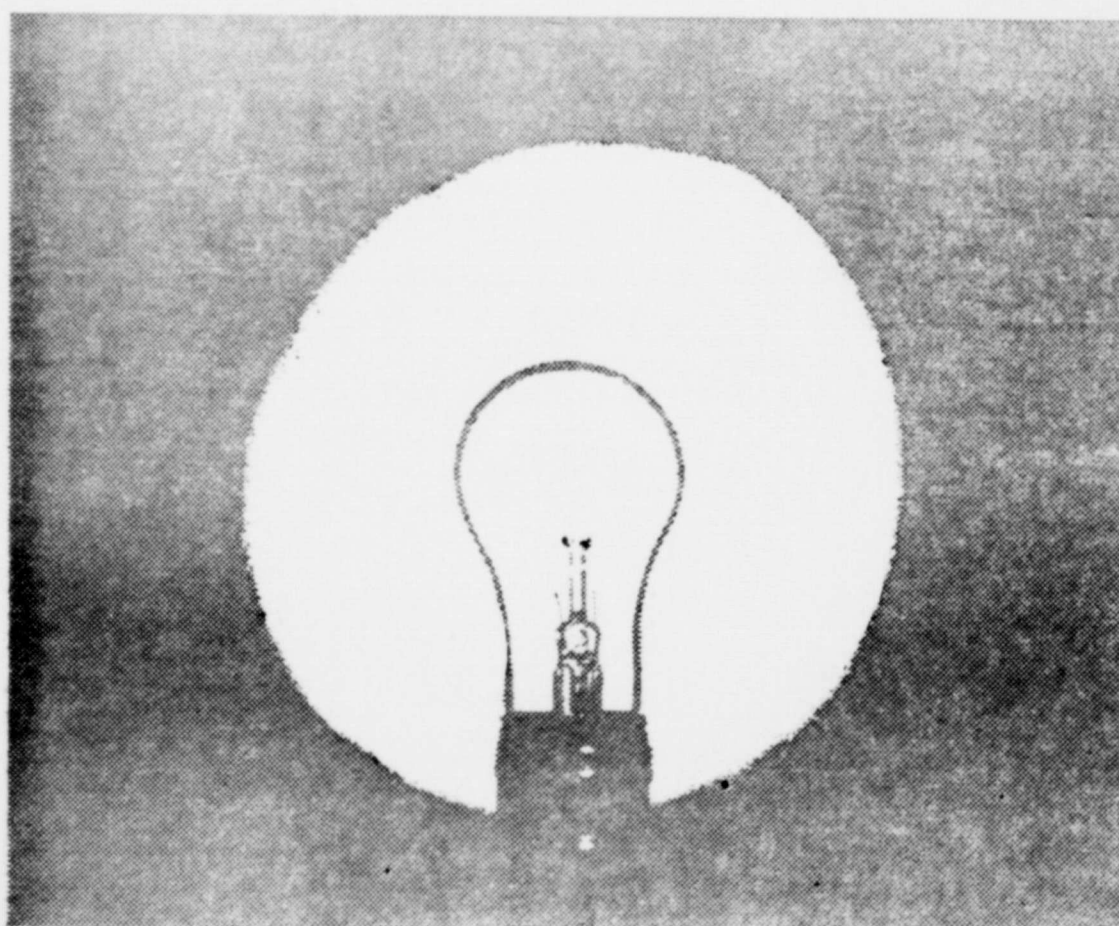
Miss Richardson is a sophomore home economics major.
