TIME SET TO MAIL CHRISTMAS PARCELS

The period of November 1 to November 20 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels to members of Armed Forces overseas. The term Armed Forces overseas also includes members of their families and authorized United States Civilians who receive their mail through APO and FPO.

The time of mailing parcels by surface mail is November 1 to November 20, and by airmail, December 1 to December 10.

Relative to preparation for mailing, boxes for overseas transmission must necessarily be of strong construction on account of the great distance they must be transported and the handling and storage they must undergo. It is necessary that all articles for boxes of wood, metal, solid fiber at the postoffice for information.

rugated fiber board. It is also desirable that all fiber board boxes be securely wrapped in heavy paper, which strengthens the package. Each box should be tied with a strong cord. A slip of paper showing list of contents and address should be enclosed in the parcel.

In addition to the usual articles normally prohibited in the mails, matches of all kinds and lighter fluid may not be mailed overseas. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, and coffee are prohibited to many APO points.

Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared




