Three Grandchildren of Merkel Couple Killed In Oregon Wreck

Three grandchildren of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Massey were killed instantly when the car in which they were riding collided with an oncoming train in Harrisburg, Ore.

Jacky Reagh, 22, his wife, Mary Reagh, 19, and a sister, Brenda Carol Reagh, 16, and two other passengers in the car were killed instantly.

Stella Pearl Reagh, 15, was taken to a Harrisburg hospital where she remains in critical condition. She received severe injuries to her arms and legs. Her right arm was crushed, left elbow broken, and the skin on the left hand was completely torn off. The flesh on the back of her left leg was completely torn loose.

She is a sophomore student at Harrisburg High School.

The accident occurred when a large truck crossed the railroad blocking the view from the Reagh car. The truck had pulled across the tracks and the Reagh's car was on the tracks when Jacky Reagh spotted the train. "He shouted 'stop,'" when he saw the train, stated his grandmother, Mrs. Massey, "but the train was too close."

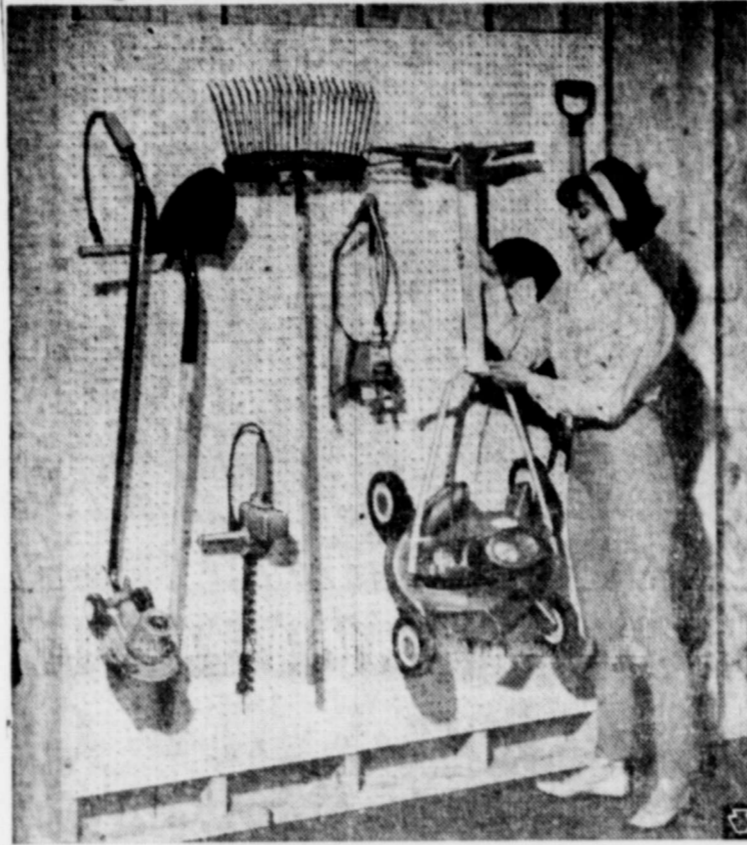

Peg Board Solves Garden Storage



CHICAGO—This suburban homemaker says she likes her electric lawn mower for two reasons: It operates as easily as an ordinary upright vacuum cleaner; and it is stored on a peg board in garage, basement, or den, where it extends only eight inches from the wall.

Sunbeam, the manufacturer of electric lawn mowers and other garden and lawn grooming equipment, suggests this Storage Wall made of ordinary pre-punched wall or ceiling board and using standard hooks. The total cost is approximately \$4, with the local building supply store "custom cutting" the board for the customer's requirements.

"The greatest change in automatic equipment for garden and lawn care is its weight reduction. An electric mower with a motor suited for rough terrain and high grass weighs less than 35-pounds; the new automatic sprinklers weigh a fraction of

their former selves; and the new hedge and shrub trimmers are lighter even with the addition of a pruning saw that handles up to one-inch branches," William J. Burke, general manager, hardware and machinery division, Sunbeam Corporation, says.

The official said that designers for electric lawn and garden equipment have effected sharp weight reductions in equipment suited for city and suburban average size homes. "The trend toward equipment that required strong-man operation has reversed itself as women have been asserting their views on design," he said.

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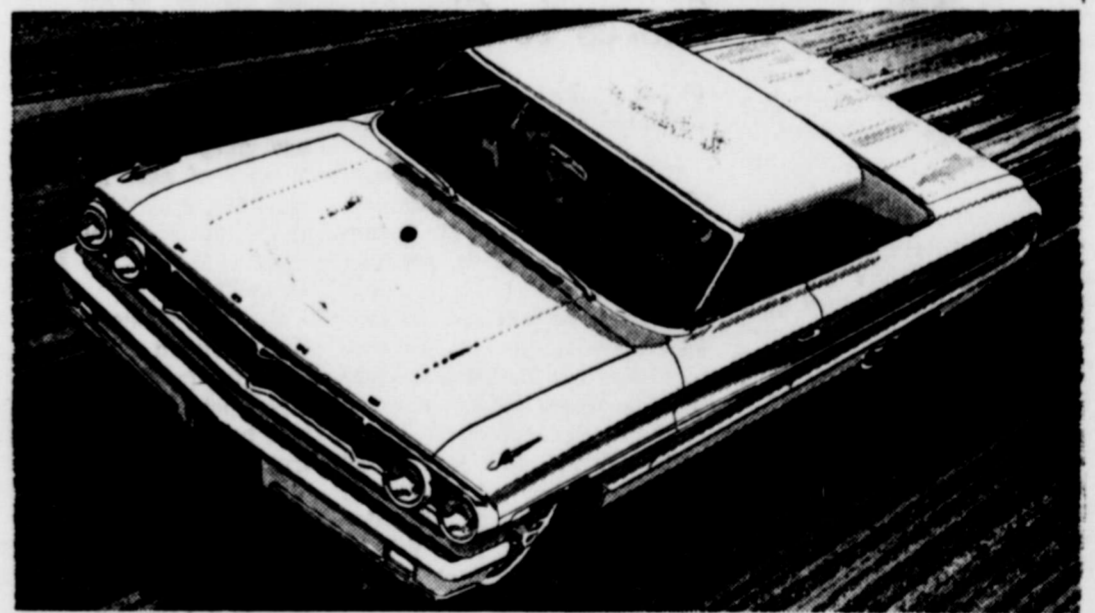

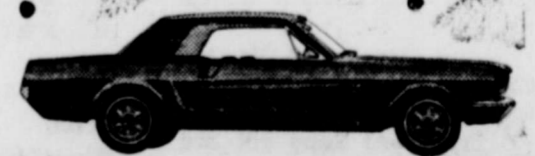

So far, nobody has found a way of making dieting loads of fun. But I have a few suggestions that might help blunt its painful edge. Here they are:

Don't get too ambitious. If you've been a curvy 135 or 140 for more than a year, you won't benefit by trying to shed twenty pounds in three or four weeks. Q. I finally have permission to buy my own clothes. It's great, but I have one problem. I trust my taste, but I'm a little worried about budgeting my clothes allowance. Mom will allow me two lump sums, one for fall and winter, and one for spring and summer. Can you tell me how to make sure I don't spend too much at first and then run out of money?

A. Better to worry a little now than later, when you need a new dress and there's nothing left in the treasury. Consider this four-point plan: First, make a list of everything you must have for the season. Use that as your basic buying plan. The unexpected does come up, so leave a safe amount for as-yet-unlisted items. Start slowly, buying only things you need right away. Second, do your very best to avoid buying on impulse. Stop and think not just once, but twice. Will the dress really have an active part in your life? Is it really your style? Third, don't stray too far from prices you are accustomed to spending for clothes. If you're tempted by an extra-expensive dress, consider whether you want it enough to cross another item off the list. Fourth, don't hesitate to call in Mom as a clothes consultant. She'll be flattered that you respect her judgment, and you'll feel more confident about your decision if it has her approval... especially if it involves a hearty chunk of your budget.

Q. A boy I dated once took my phone number and said he'd call. It's been nearly a week and I'm beginning to think he doesn't know how to dial. Maybe he lost the num-

ber. Is it all right if I call and check?

A. Sorry, but you'd only put him on the spot, and that wouldn't win any points with him. If you should "happen" to see him at school or the soda shop give him a cheerful "Hi," but don't quit him. Could be he has a money problem now, or his time is taken up by a job, homework, or another girl. Remember any of these stumbling blocks can be temporary. The phone might ring at any moment. Meanwhile, don't sit around waiting.

Q. I can't remember names until I've heard them a jillion times. Is there any smooth way out when you meet someone you should know and just can't think whether his name is Sam, Melvin or Clyde? Or should I just hide in the closet until Whoever-He-Is goes away?

A. The closet's no place to spend an evening. Try to make up with warmth what your greeting lacks in memory. Say something like, "Hi, I haven't seen you in ages," or, "Hello, it's really nice to see you again." Then listen and hope someone else calls Whoever-He-Is by name, or that your memory returns. Your own failing should make you especially understanding of others, by the way. When you see someone is having trouble remembering your name, come to his aid and reintroduce yourself right away.



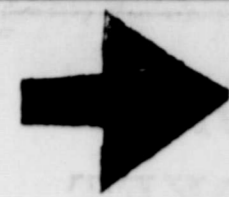

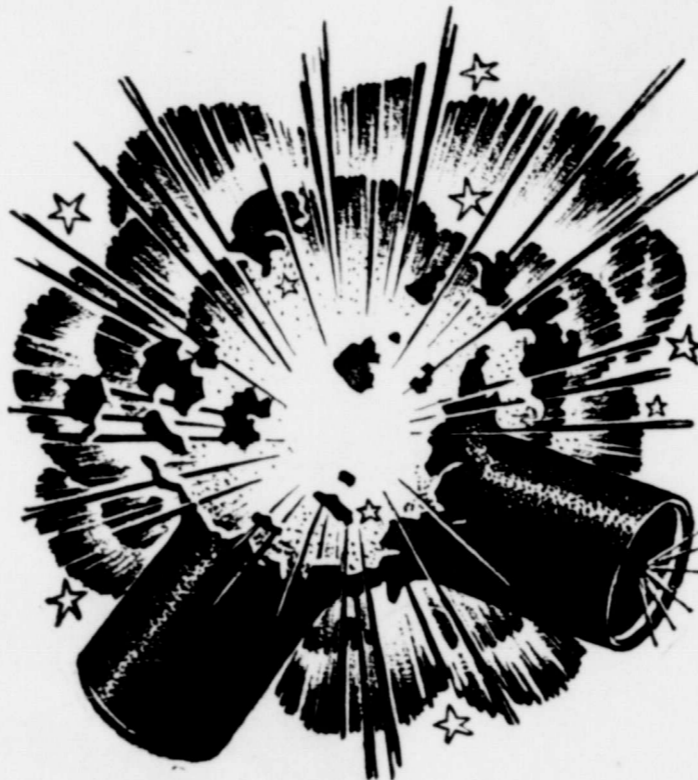
