We could say that farmers and ranchers are just afraid of a drought, because everything they have is at stake. Any way, what lies ahead, good or bad, is yet to be seen.

It's the Law in TEXAS



CHILDREN IN CAMP

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical for a visit or a camping trip, or care if your child leaves home if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid — but only for emergency where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you may come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them.

The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.

Incidentally, all tips are included in the \$192 per person price, a thoughtful gesture on the part of the management which will be appreciated by most travelers.

Frenchman's Cove, "discovered" not too long ago by the late Erroll Flynn and other Hollywood stars, has been called by Time Magazine "the most luxurious resort in the Caribbean."

The resort is a 40-acre estate bordered by the Caribbean Sea. The rainfall is lushly tropical and the average temperature, further tempered by an almost continuous ocean breeze, is 80 degrees.

State Hospitals Granted \$30,000

A one-year federal grant of \$30,000 was accepted today by the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools to initiate statewide planning for the mentally retarded.

Although the Board is the administering agency, the law requires that the study be inter-departmental, in an effort to determine what action is needed to combat mental retardation and what resources are available for the purpose; to develop awareness of the problem; and to coordinate state and local activities related to the prevention and treatment of mental retardation," explained Board Chairman Howard T. Tellepsen, Houston.

In anticipation of the grant, a

seven-man committee, appointed by Gov. John Connally, has been at work, exchanging information. Bill Cobb, executive budget director, is chairman of the interagency committee composed of Richard Coffman, administrator of the Texas Employment Commission; Dr. J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education; Dr. James E. Peavy, commissioner of the Texas State Department of Health; Dr. James A. Turman, executive director of the Texas Youth Council; Raymond W. Vowell, executive director of the Hospital Board; and John Winters, commissioner of Welfare. Planning project director Stuart C. Fisher is being assisted by Dr. Charles Meisger, executive director of the Texas Association for Retarded Children.

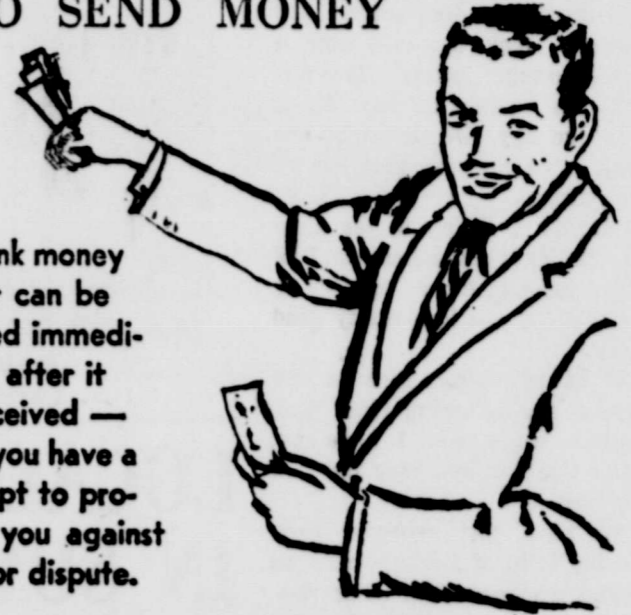
Extending citizen participation in the study, Governor Connally appointed a 20-member advisory committee. District Judge Herman Jones, Austin, accepted the chairmanship of this group which includes consumers of services for the retarded, as well as those professional and community-based personnel who are respon-

sible for implementing and managing such services. Much of the focus in their planning will be directed toward developing new and more effective benefits at the community level.

The grant stems from recommendations made by a panel, appointed by the late President John F. Kennedy to prepare a national plan to combat mental retardation. The 88th Congress enacted legislation authorizing a federal appropriation of \$2.2 million to assist the states in planning comprehensive action. The federal monies must be matched in Texas by \$10,000 in state monies.

"Mental retardation affects some 300,000 Texans — plus countless citizens who are directly or indirectly involved in their care. Six state residential institutions have a total population of over 10,000 and the waiting list for admission exceeds 1,400. We have no alternative but to act immediately and effectively in areas of education, rehabilitation, welfare, employment, health, and the law, as they concern the mentally retarded," Fisher observed.

Social Security Pays \$1.5 Billion

Payments totalling some 1.5
billion dollars are now going
each month to nearly 20 mil-
lion people in the form of retire-
ment, disability and survivors
payments under the Social Secu-
rity Act.

These figures were given today
in a statement released by R. R.
Tuley Jr., social security district
manager in Abilene.

At the beginning of 1964, some
92 million workers were insured,
58 million were permanently in-
sured and 54 million had worked
long enough to qualify in case of
disability. These figures have in-
creased during 1964 and up to
the present time.

The 58 million can expect to
receive retirement payments
whether or not they do additional
work. The families of the 92
million can expect to receive
monthly payments, a lump sum
amount, or both, in case of the
workers' death. The 54 million
and their families are protected
in case of disability. The net
effect is that some 90 per cent
of the working population has
protection against one or more of
these risks.

Since all of these hazards are
universal, social security is a
basic source of income at retire-
ment, disability or death.

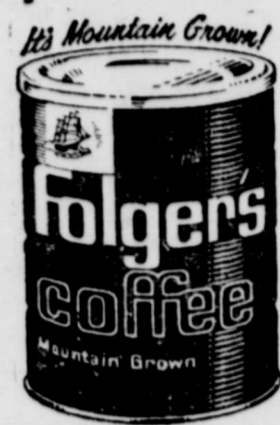

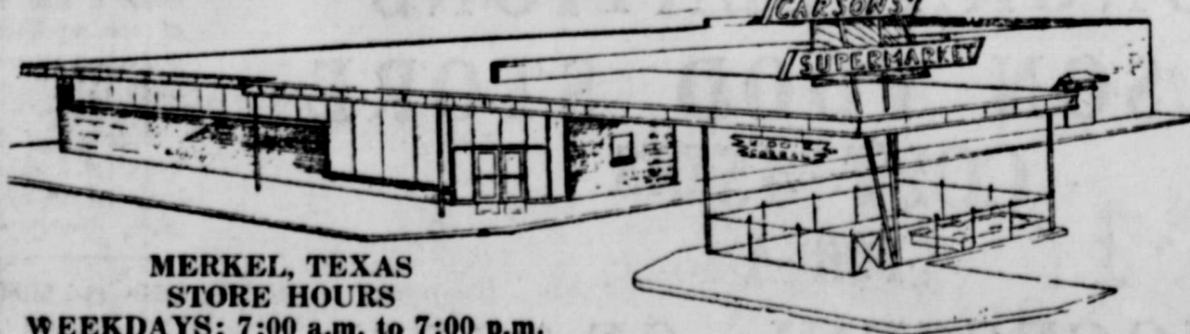
