Cemetery Directors Purchase Acreage

The directors of the Merkel Cemetery Association Inc. last week purchased 7.58 acres of additional land for cemetery purposes.

The land was purchased from John Shannon et us., and lies immediately north of the older portion of the cemetery.

The purchase price was \$2,100. "The directors felt that the additional acreage should be purchased for future use while it could be bought," stated Booth Warren, president.

Commissioner Joe Cypert, who is also one of the directors of the Cemetery Association, has already fenced the additional acreage and brought it to grade at no expense to the Cemetery Association, stated Warren.

Merkel Cemetery Association, a non-profit organization, was incorporated April 30, 1926 for a period of fifty years, to own and maintain a public cemetery located near Merkel.

The original directors were J. T. Warren, Mrs. R. O. Anderson, Mrs. Amy Sears, A. T. Sheppard and John Sears.

March 5, 1963 ballots were submitted by mail to 100 persons who had theretofore indicated their interest in and desire to participate in the perpetuation of the corporation, requesting them to vote for five directors.

The five persons receiving the highest number of votes and who have now been the directors of the association for more than a year are Booth Warren, president; Mrs. W. S. J. Brown, vice president; Fred Starbuck, secretary - treasurer; Joe Cypert and David Gamble.

The Cemetery Association is not tax supported in any manner and the only sources of revenue at the present time are donations and sale of lots.

There are now approximately 1,500 lots unsold and the present price is \$40 per lot, space for 4 graves.

The cemetery embraces approximately 31.86 acres of land.

District Baptist Brotherhood Hold Rally at Hardin-Simmons

The Baptist Brotherhood of District 17, a 12-county region fanning out to the east, north and west of Abilene, will hold its last district rally Aug. 3 at Hardin-Simmons University.

Up to 1,000 Baptist men from the area may attend the rally, said Lowell Queen of Abilene, district president. Following this year's rally the district organization will be dissolved in favor of smaller units which will continue to function within the framework of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Featured in the closing rally in the H-SU Chapel - Auditorium will be an address by Dr. George W. Schroeder, executive secretary of the Brotherhood Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Also on the program will be a brief address by Queen and a panel discussion directed by Dr. Hooper Dillard, director of the BGCT's church services department. District officers will make up the panel, which will be assisted by Dr. Schroeder.

Discussions will be based on the newest plans for Brotherhood Work, which will put a greater stress on evangelistic efforts, Queen said.

Bill Davis, choral director for Mann Junior High School in Abilene, will direct music for the rally. A men's chorus is being organized for the event.

Dr. Schroeder, who operates out of Memphis, Tenn., has headed the SBC Brotherhood program since 1952. He had been associate director of the program for six years and also served for six years as secretary of the Baptist Brotherhood in Illinois.

He received both the B. A. and M.S. degrees from Southern Illinois University and was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Southern Baptist College, Ark., in 1953. He is a member of the executive committee of the Baptist World Alliance.

One of his three children, Harriett Schroeder, formerly served on the science faculty at H-SU.

The 1964 rally will begin at 7:30 p.m., Monday, Aug. 3, Queen said.

Watts is a field representative for the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

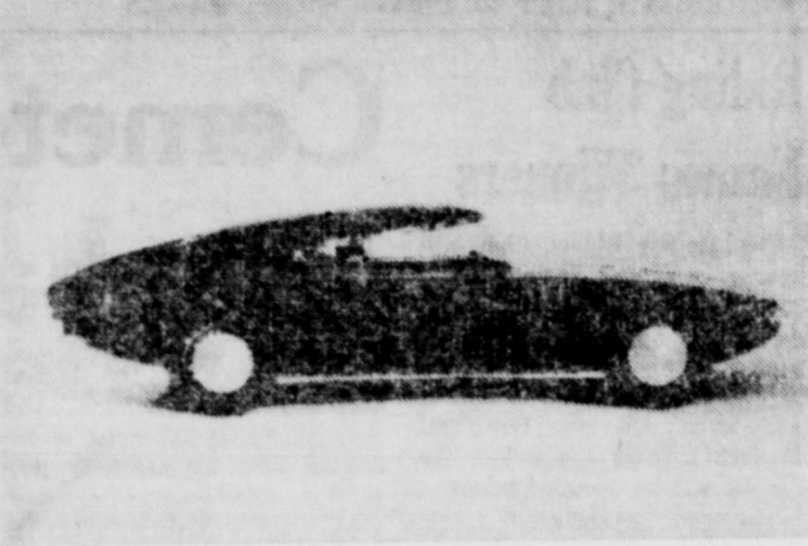
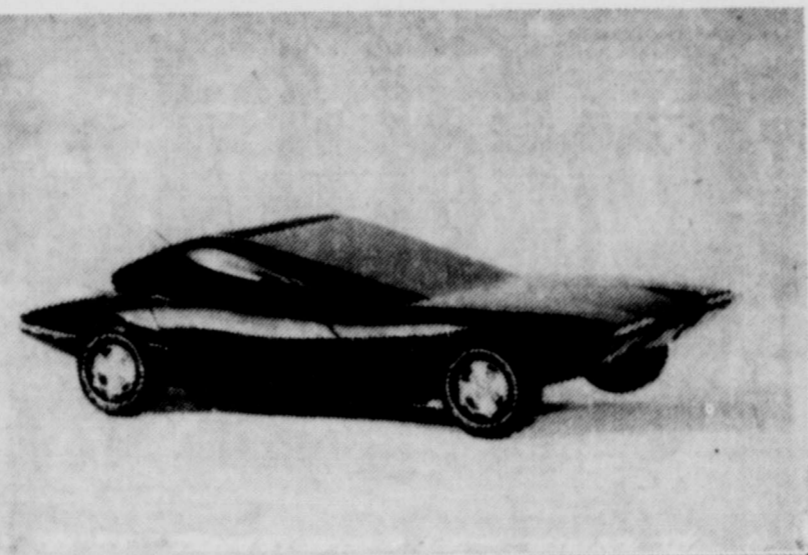

Cancer Society Honors W. Carr

Attorney General Waggoner Carr has been honored by the Texas Division Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society for his outstanding work as State Crusade Chairman for the Society's 1964 Crusade. Dr. William D. Seybold of Houston, President of the Division made the presentation at the meeting of the Board July 8 in Dallas.

The award was made following a report which showed that Texas would exceed the previous all time high of \$1,575,000 raised in Crusade last year.

Acting on the recommendation of the education committee, the Board authorized the purchase of 50 copies of the film "Smoking and You," a film for adults de-

signed to implement the Society's public education program on the relationship of smoking to lung cancer.

185 County units over the state were recertified for the coming year, and 3 units were put on probation until they could bring their Cancer Control programs up to the minimum standards set by the Board in the areas of ed-

education, service and campaign.

In other action the Board authorized a grant of funds to present a session on the latest findings relating to cytology and the diagnosis of oral cancer at the Annual Meeting of the Texas Dental Association, and establish-

ed new district offices in Harlingen, Waco, Wichita Falls and Longview.

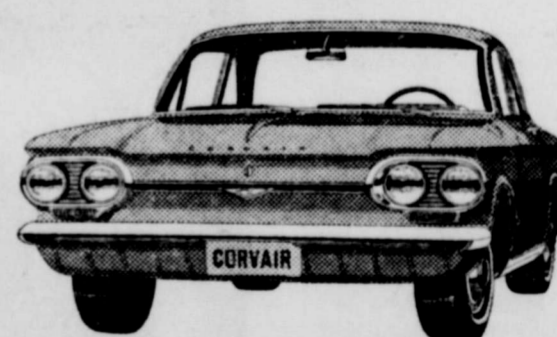

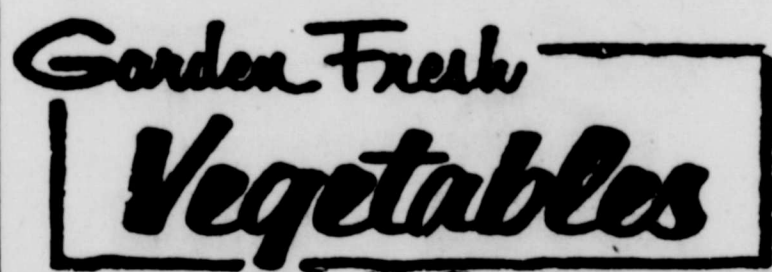

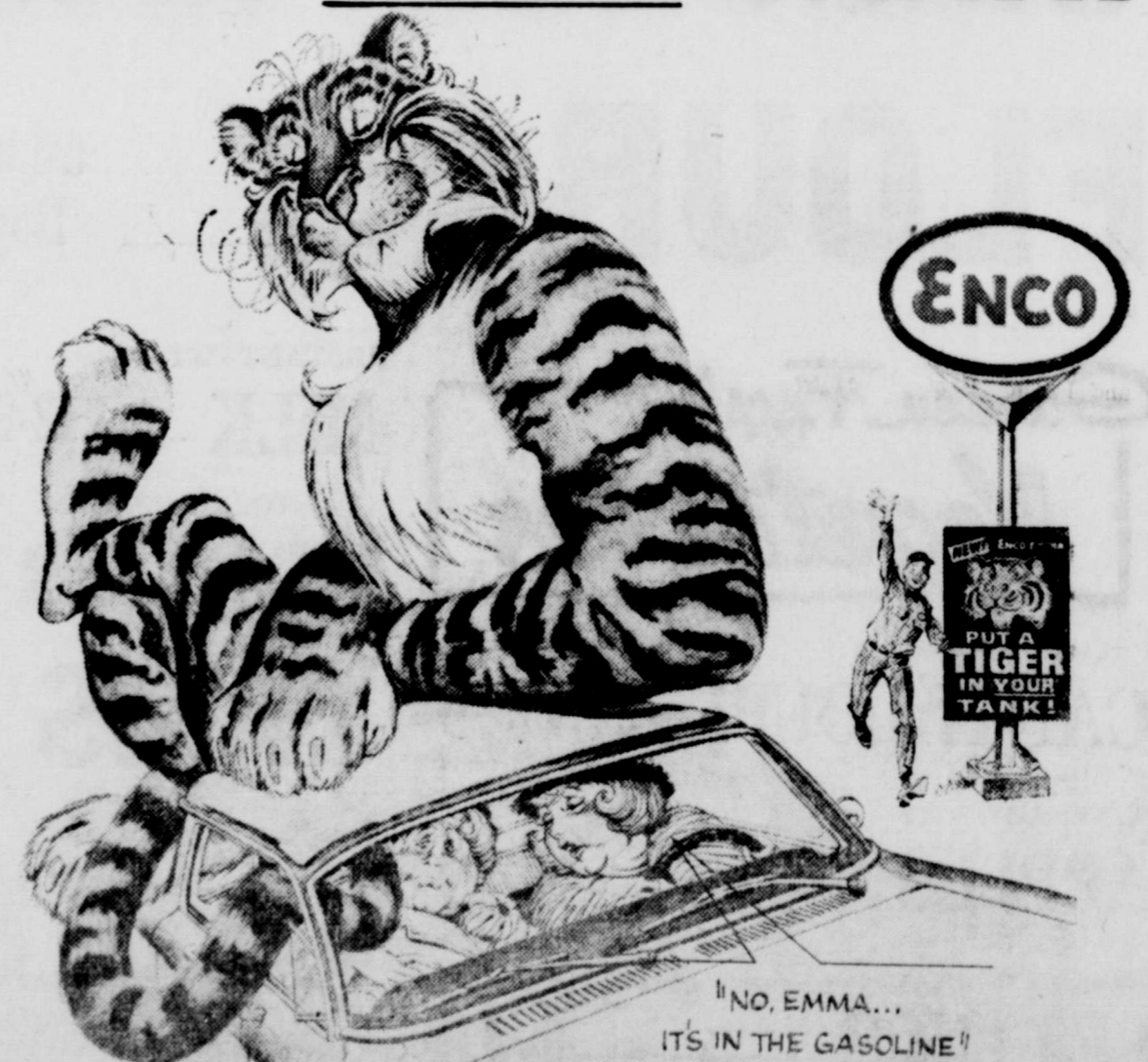
An Open Invitational track tournament will be held Saturday at the local track field with Merkel and 11 other teams competing.

At approximately 9:30 p.m. we went outside to check on the two brothers — outside the cage were two other brothers!

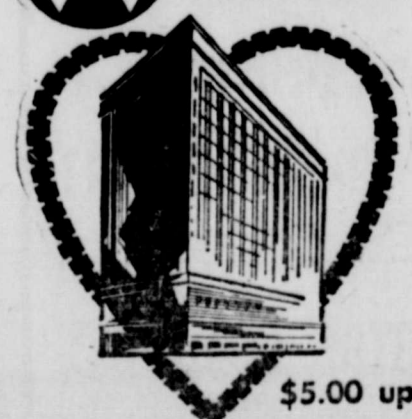
Not knowing what to do with the two new skunks, Alice also put them inside the cage.

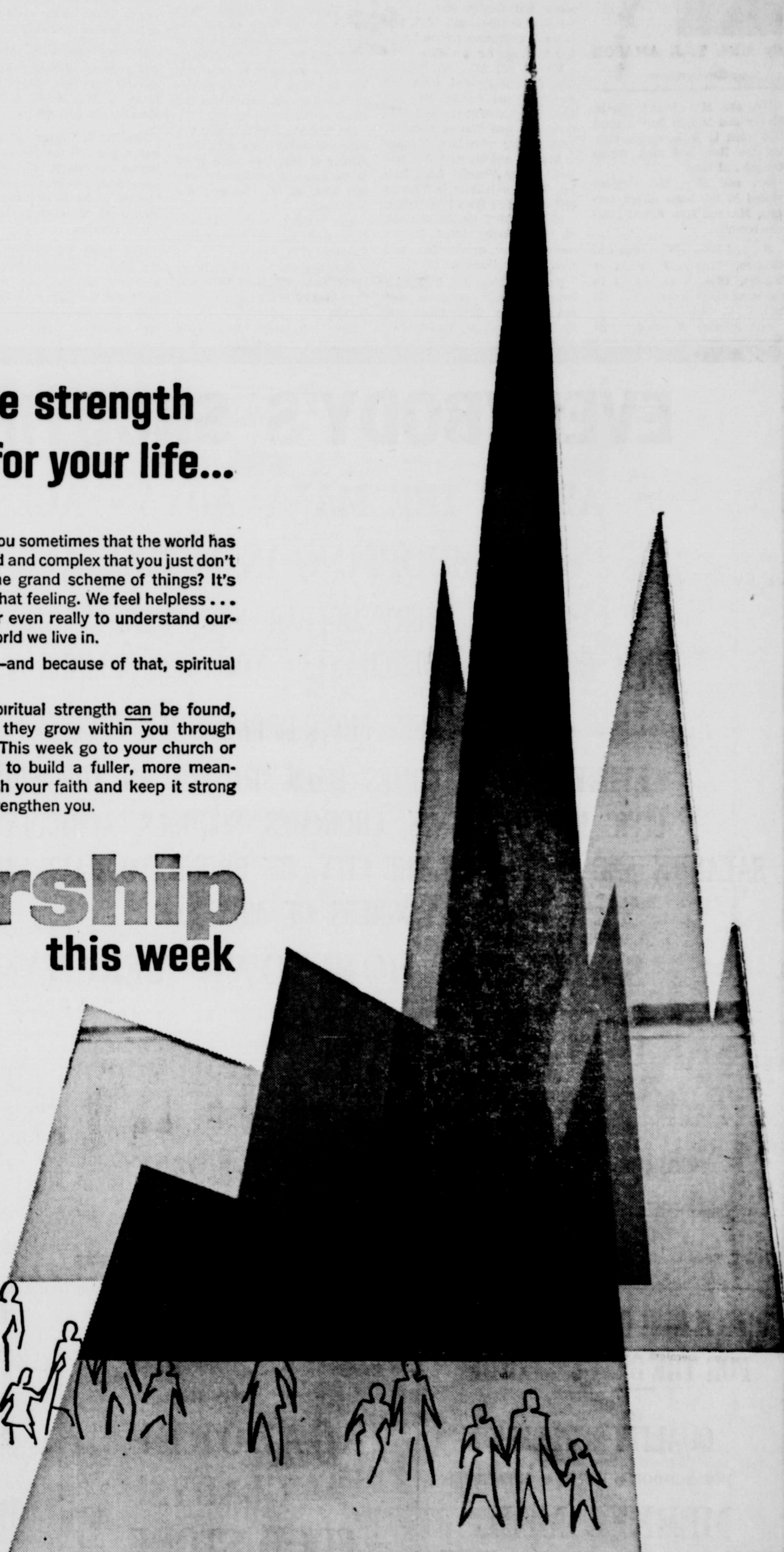
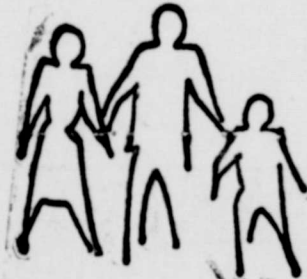

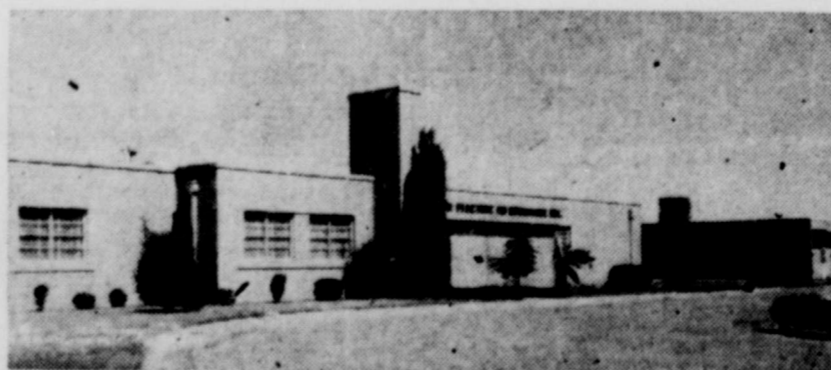

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

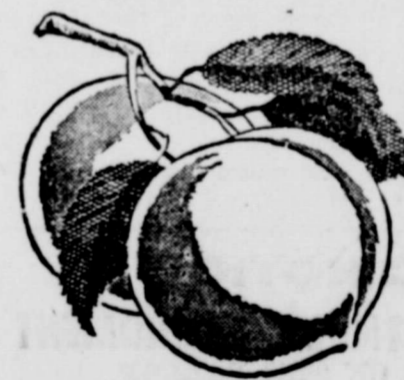

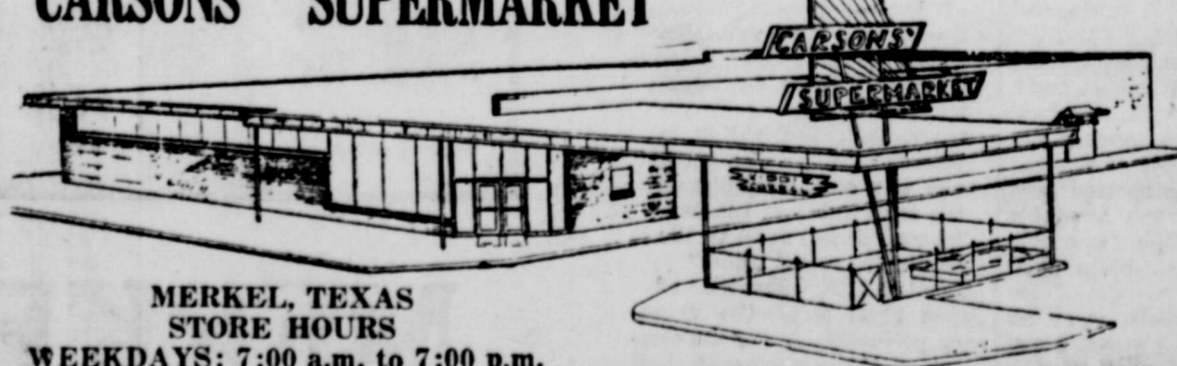
