### City to begin annual chip seal coating maintenance project

By Martha Toles Frost

Muleshoe citizens can anticipate street seal coating and repair of the city's concrete reservoir early next week, City Manager Dave Marr announced.

As early as Monday, the streets along the south and east sides of the community park

will be sealed with hot asphalt, then chip sealed with rock.

Marr said the ongoing project helps maintain 20 percent of the city's streets each year so that all streets can receive the coating at least every five years. The purpose is to prevent potholes and to provide good traction, he added.

Work will begin early next week and should be completed by Friday, weather permitting.

People should avoid driving through the hot asphalt, he cautioned. And when they notice work has begun, it will be helpful if they avoid parking on the streets.

Also next week, the con-

crete reservoir, which the city has been attempting to repair since February, will be repaired order to prevent it from leak-

During the repairs, the city's water supply will be at less than 50 percent of capacity, Marr said. "We encourage citizens to reduce water usage

and to conserve water during the week by watering yards at night instead of in the daytime. This will help conserve water for peak demand times."

There will be plenty of water to drink and for fire protection, Marr added, saying that citizens would be notified if a shortage necessitated more

stringent rationing.

The city's reservoir is fed by 14 wells, Marr said, but only four of them can pump directly into the city.

In order to discontinue the practice of using potable water to irrigate the city's parks, the

### **Texas Animal Health acting** to prevent VS virus spread

Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency, has acted to support New Mexico's effort to contain an outbreak of Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) within its state boundaries.

Effective June 29, the TAHC is formally restricting the movement of livestock from infected areas and will require health papers on all New Mexico livestock entering Texas.

VS is a virus that causes livestock to develop blisters in and around their mouths, and on their tongues, hooves and teats. When the blisters break, the skin sloughs, and animals

The Texas Animal Health stop eating or drinking until the painful lesions begin to heal.

> The cycle of infection lasts about two weeks, and significant weight loss and production loss occurs in affected animals. New Mexico livestock authorities report that its VS out break started in horses and has now been diagnosed in

A task force from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Veterinary Services is assisting New Mexico state personnel in answering call from producers, and investigating suspected cases and quarantining affected animals.

LUBBOCK - In 41 counties of West Texas, the state's Department of Human Services (TDHS) is bringing the electronic age to public assistance.

A plastic debit card is replacing paper food stamp coupons and checks for Aid to

Families with Dependant Children (AFDC).

Beginning August 1, households in the Panhandle and the South Plains areas receiving aid will use an electronic debit card called the Lone Star card.

The red, white and blue Lone Star card accesses the state's electronic benefit trans-

New Mexico has quarantined 50 premises and their regulations also restrict livestock within the surrounding 10-mile area from being moved across state lines.

To support New Mexico in containing the infection and preventing its spread, the majority of western states, and Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas have issued similar restrictions on livestock from affected areas.

Until the outbreak is officially cleared up, New Mexico livestock may not enter Texas if VS infection has been diagnosed within 10 miles of the animal's home ranch or farm within the past 30 days.

Additionally, the 12 member TAHC commission requires that livestock coming from New Mexico be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection with the following statement, written by an accredited veterinarian:

"All animals indentified on this health certificate have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 30 days, they have neither been exposed nor located within 10 miles of a premise wher Vesicular Stomatitis has been diagnosed."

"To stop the virus from spreading, New Mexico also has set up a restricted zone in its counties along the Rio Grande, where most of the nfected horses have been detected," said Dr. Terry Beals, TAHC executive director.

"The zone is 80 to 90 miles long and 20 miles wide. Live-stock are not to be moved from this area until the outbreak is over."

Dr. Beals said animals are considered to be free of the disease 30 days after their last lesion has healed. Although VS is rarely fatal, the virus, which has an incubation perios of two to eight days, can cause severe weight loss.

Affected dairy cattle experience a dramatic drop in milk production. The economic impact on feedlot cattle would also be significant.

Dr. Beals urged Texas producers to watch for possible VS symptoms in their herds of cattle, horse, swine, sheep or goats.

If signs are noticed, producers should call thier TAHC area office, or the headquarters in Austin at (512) 719-0700, or the USDA at (512) 482-5555, a trained desease disgnostician will be sent to the premise to assist in making a diagnosis.

### Like It or Not, Two Plus Two Always Equals Four

Ideas have consequences, and one of the most mistaken, dangerous, and, sadly, prevalent, ideas in our society today is that there is no such thing as absolute truth and, consequently, no such thing as an absolute standard of right and wrong.

If nothing is wrong, does it

follow that everything is right? Is there no moral difference between, say, murder and mercy, because nothing is moral or immoral? If nothing is false, is everything equally true? Can two plus two equal four on Monday but amount to five on Tuesday?

I know at least two reasons why the very bad ideas alluded to above are very tempting.

1) Because of the arrogance of some who claim to have the whole truth and nothing but the truth. If you want to know exactly what God thinks on any issue or, for that matter, which side of your head to part your hair on, just ask. They'!! be happy to tell you.

These folks don't understand that while all genuine truths are equally true, not all are equally important, which is why Jesus poked fun at the pompous and urged the Pharisees to try majoring on the "weightier matters."

We don't like Pharisees. But, as G.K. Chesterton writes, "A person can be right and not be right-minded." The fact that "two plus two always equals four" is just as true whether it comes from the lips of Mother Theresa or Pontius Pilate. It's a mistake to scoff at truth just because we don't like the person teaching it.

2) Because breaking rules is easier if you can convince yourself that there are no rules. And maybe no Ruler. I've known and loved some honest agnostics, but most atheists who are loud about their disbelief are living life in such a way that they simply can't afford for God to exist.

But in a world created by God, a world which still reflects His nature, some things are true, some are false; some things are right, some are wrong. And the best way to know the difference is to follow the One who is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life" (John 14:6).

You don't have to be hung up, ignorant, or hateful to believe in an absolute standard of right and wrong, that truth is not just whatever we wish it to be.

Absolutes can be difficult, but a world without them would be a very mixed up, frightening place.

Absolutely.

The safe and effective use of a chimney often involves the elimination of creosote, a tar-like condensation caused by the incomplete burning of wood. The accumulation of cresosote not only blocks the effective functioning of the chimney, it is also highly flammable.

If you choose a chimney sweep professional, many have received certification from the Chimney Safety Institute of America and belong to the National Chimney Sweep Guild.

Get more than one estimate for cleaning your chimney and be wary of an estimate that is substantially below the others.

Keep in mind that a chimney should be inspected at least once a year. Call the BBB at 763-0459 or (800) 687-7890 to check out your chimney sweep professional.

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reporting an increase in scams that are used to steal long distance phone services. Business owners, managers and employees need to alert themselves to the different types of schemes currently being used by con artists to steal long distance services from places of business.

Beware of bogus service technicians claiming to be from your telephone company. These con artists are calling companies and asking for assistance in testing the phone line. The unsuspecting employee is asked to test the line by pressing certain numbers on the keypad and then hanging up.

This gives the con artist access to one of your outside lines. The thief then uses your phone line to make interna-

tional or long distance phone
