to linebacker Tittle and linemen Joe Higgins, Freddie Mewborn, Robert Shouse and Richard Owen, plugged up the middle, but Lindsey got loose around the left end and sprinted to the two before he was jostled out of bounds.

On the next play, Currie, who directed the Wolves offense all

night, wormed his way over for the score. A fake conversion try and a pass from Currie to David Aycock accounted for the bonus points, and provided the visitors with the lead they never relinquished.

The Badgers fought back gamely in the closing minutes of the game, but the clock ran out on them as sophomore quarterback Richard Walker completed a 36yard pass to end Charles Danheim who was hauled in at the Merkel 36-yard line by the last two defenders.

The pass was only the second completion of the night for the Badgers, who attempted 10. Colorado City's Curry hit one of two for 15 yards, while Merkel's two went for a total of 50.

Merkel's deepest penetration came when they received the opening kickoff of the second half and marched down to the Wolves 28 before giving up the ball when a fourth - down pass fell incomplete.



If communism advertised its true aims in this manner, it would become a dusty, cobweb-covered doctrine untouched by young Americans steeped in a heritage of liberty and freedom. But the treachery of communism does not permit such a factual recruiting poster.

A record number of young people are now entering college classrooms to engage in one of man's most noble pursuits: the search for truth through the acquisition of knowledge. In America, this endeavor is as honored as the freedoms which make it possible. It is an undeniable fact that under communism these freedoms do not exist. Communism stipulated the "truths" its scholars must embrace and spreads it 's venomous lies and distortions through any available medium.

This academic year will undoubtedly see intensive Communist Party efforts to erect its newest facade on the Nation's campuses to draw young blood for the vampire which is inter-national communism. In its continuing drive to attract young Americans, the Communist Party, USA (SPUSA), spawned a new national Marxist youth organization in June, 1964 — the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America.

This organization and its communist parent would have us believe that communism has only one hand - the extended open hand. But a look over their shoulder sees the other hand clasping the Berlin wall and squeezing freedoms breath from enslaved millions. It is this dupicity that is difficult for young American to comprehend. If our young citizens turn an objective, analytical searchlight on this ideology and its organizational arms, they will understand communism for what it is - a materialistic, godless dogma dedicated to world domination.

By spreading its poison through young veins, gangrenous communism is attempting to render the future America a quadruple amputee — a nation with out freedom of speech, press, assembly, and religion. The youth of this nation, armed with the scalpel of truth, can and must cut this disease from the body of America.
