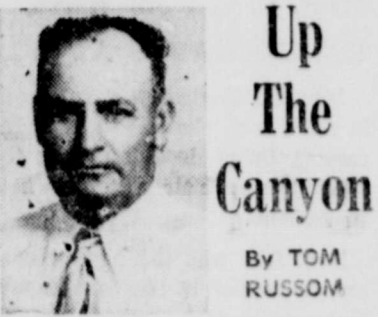

AREA CLUBS DISPLAYS PREPARED FOR NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK

September 26 thru Oct. 3 has been proclaimed National 4-H Club Week and the clubs in our area are busy with 4-H displays and information booths.

The purpose of the club week is to bring recognition to the outstanding program of 4-H and to encourage membership in 4-H Clubs.

There are five 4-H Clubs in the immediate area of Merkel. A summary of each organization and their work is as follows:

MERKEL
There are approximately 25 members in the local 4-H Club. To participate in National 4-H Club Week club members have set up a 4-H information booth at Westgate Shopping Center in Abilene. Two members and a parent are at the booth passing out literature and explaining procedures of 4-H work.

The club also has a display in Farmers and Merchants National Bank consisting of record books and projects of club members.

Local Bethel Mission Continues Evangelistic Crusade Services

The Bethel Mexican Baptist Mission of Merkel are conducting evangelistic services at the church which began Sept. 27 and will continue until Oct. 4, as part of a statewide Crusade aimed at reaching 2½ million unevangelized Latin American people of Texas with the gospel.

About 400 Latin American churches and missions throughout the state are participating in the widespread effort called Cruzada Bautista Nueva Vida (the Latin American Baptist New Life Crusade). It is being sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas Aug. 30-Sept. 11. In addition, Baptist churches near the border in Mexico and New Mexico are joining in the Crusade.

The Crusade is being held in four states with the state divided into three zones for better coordination. The first week of the campaign in each area is devoted to area central campaigns held chiefly in tents at 43 strategic locations.

Personal witnessing campaigns take up the second week, with local revivals in about 400 churches slated the third week. The fourth and final week features major central campaigns in auditoriums and stadiums in 23 cities across the state.

Seven Angelo churches have been assigned to each of the Latin American churches as prayer partners, said Dr. T. A. Patterson, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

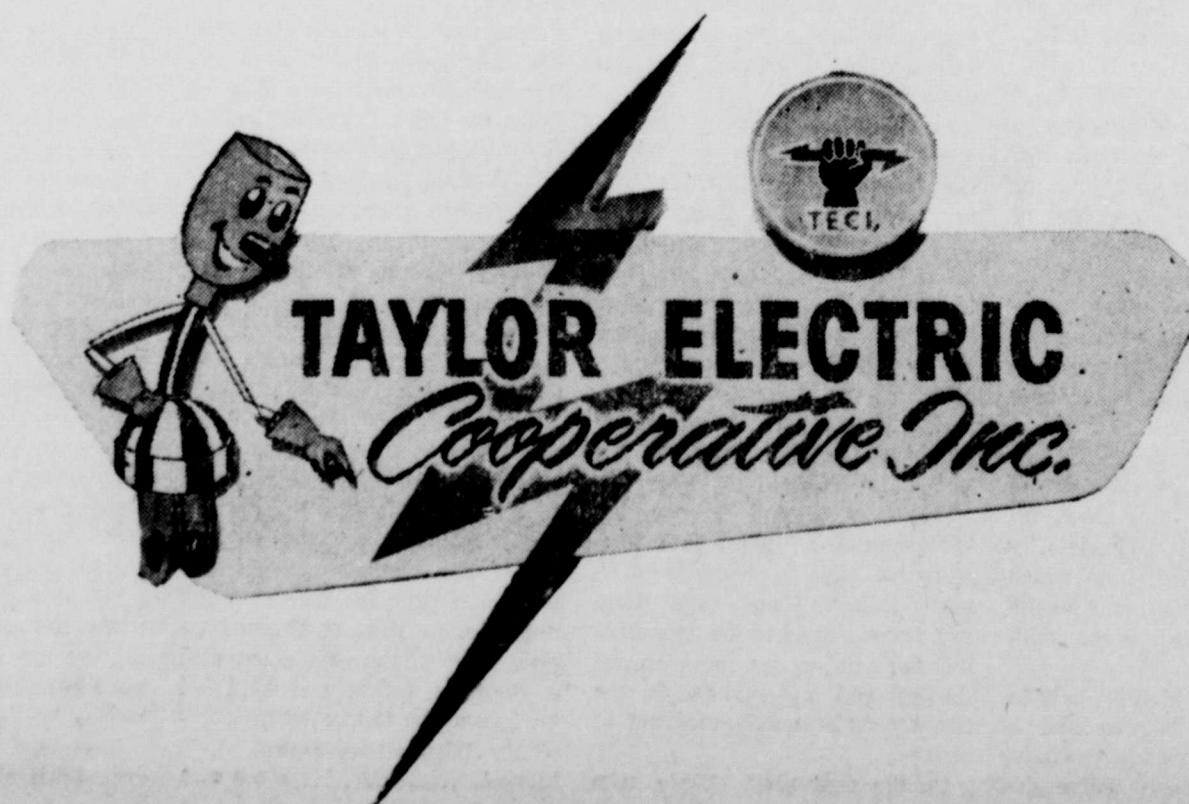

EDITORIAL

WANTED: YOUNG PEOPLE TO HELP BURY AMERICA

OPENINGS FOR PALLBEARERS OF TRUTH AND GRAVE DIGGERS OF DEMOCRACY.

NO PRIOR EXPERIENCE NECESSARY.

If communism advertised its true aims in this manner, it would become a dusty, cobweb-covered doctrine untouched by young Americans steeped in a heritage of liberty and freedom. But the treachery of communism does not permit such a factual recruiting poster.

A record number of young people are now entering college classrooms to engage in one of man's most noble pursuits: the search for truth through the acquisition of knowledge. In America, this endeavor is as honored as the freedoms which make it possible. It is an undeniable fact that under communism these freedoms do not exist. Communism stipulated the "truths" its scholars must embrace and spreads its venomous lies and distortions through any available medium.

This academic year will undoubtedly see intensive Communist Party efforts to erect its newest facade on the Nation's campuses to draw young blood for the vampire which is inter-national communism. In its continuing drive to attract young Americans, the Communist Party, USA (SPUSA), spawned a new national Marxist youth organization in June, 1964 - the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America.

Top Communist Party functionaries decided in October, 1963, that additional measures should be taken to recruit young citizens. Now, one year later, by mandate of CPUSA General Secretary Gus Hall, the true face of communism has another mask to wear - a new disguise calculated to dupe unwary youth.

As an example of communist deception in action the DuBois Clubs chose as their official insignia a half white, half black circle encompassing a white hand and a black hand under a dove. Thus the symbols of unity, brotherhood and peace wave as a banner for an ideology that countenances discord, hate and violence.

This organization and its communist parent would have us believe that communism has only one hand - the extended open hand. But a look over their shoulder sees the other hand clasp the Berlin wall and squeezing freedoms bread from enslaved millions. It is this duplicity that is difficult for young American to comprehend. If our young citizens turn an objective, analytical searchlight on this ideology and its organizational arms, they will understand communism for what it is - a materialistic, godless dogma dedicated to world domination.

By spreading its poison through young veins, gangrenous communism is attempting to render the future America a quadruple amputee - a nation with out freedom of speech, press, assembly, and religion. The youth of this nation, armed with the scalpel of truth, can and must cut this disease from the body of America.

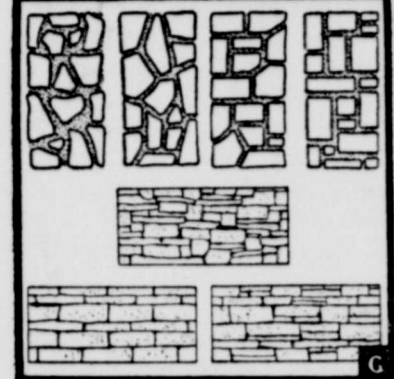
