Starbuck Funeral Home here, which was notified of the death about 4:30 p.m. reported that the body was found in the yard by his children when they returned home from school. Officers said Whisenhunt was preparing to go hunting when he fell on a porch and his gun discharged. Funeral was held at 4 p.m. Tuesday in the First Methodist Church here with the Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor, and the Rev. Bill Tanner, pastor of the Merkel Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery. He was born May 21, 1924, in Merkel. The Whisenhunts' farm is eight miles north of Merkel and in Jones County. Survivors are his wife, Betty; three children, Ann, Alyce and Bill, all of the home, his father, Riley; three brothers, Walter of Merkel, Clyan, of McKinney and "Dink" of Merkel; and two sisters, Mrs. Tommye Niell of Merkel and Mrs. Irene Hammond of Arlington. Cottage cheese-filled manicotti makes a satisfying meal for the whole family. Creamed cottage cheese tastes good, is high in protein, economical and best of all it is easy to use. Here's a tasty version of manicotti developed by the Borden Kitchen.

(Makes 8 servings)**

| 1 (8-oz.) package uncooked manicotti                         | 2 eggs   |
| 4 cups (two 1 lb.) cartons small curd creamed cottage cheese | 1 tablespoon dehydrated parsley flakes                 |
| 3/4 cup grated Parmesan and Romano cheese                    | 1/2 teaspoon salt                                      |
|  | 1/2 teaspoon pepper                                    |
|  | 3 cups (three 10-1/4 oz. cans) meatless marinara sauce |

In an 8 or a 10 quart saucepan, bring 6 quarts of salted water to a boil. Parboil 4 manicotti for 3 minutes. DO NOT OVERCOOK. With a slotted spoon carefully remove manicotti from water. Place on rack; drain. Keep water boiling and parboil remaining manicotti (4 at a time) as directed above. In a large mixing bowl, combine cottage cheese, 1/2 cup of the Parmesan and Romano cheese, eggs, parsley flakes, salt and pepper. Blend well. With a teaspoon, fill each manicotti with cheese mixture. Cover the bottom of an ungreased 13-1/2 x 8-1/2 x 2-inch baking dish with 1 cup of the sauce. Arrange filled manicotti side by side in a single layer in baking dish. Four the remaining sauce over manicotti. Spread sauce to completely cover pasta. Bake in moderate (350° F.) oven, for 20 minutes, or until sauce is bubbly. Sprinkle remaining cheese over manicotti. Bake additional 5 minutes.

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**Work to Begin  
On FM Road 2833**

A contract for 5.4 miles of construction on FM Road 2833 in Jones and Taylor County has been awarded to a San Marcos firm, it was announced in Austin by the State Highway Commission.

R. B. Bowden Construction Co. submitted the low bid of \$129,657.34 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing in Jones County from Taylor County line to Lake Fort Phantom Hill and in Taylor County from Jones County line to SH 351.

The project is expected to take 100 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

R. D. Domann, Resident Engineer at Abilene will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

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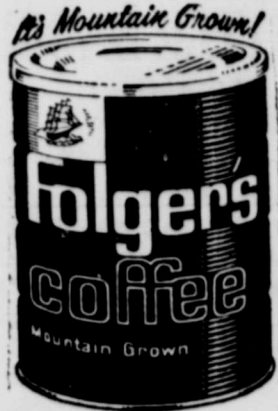

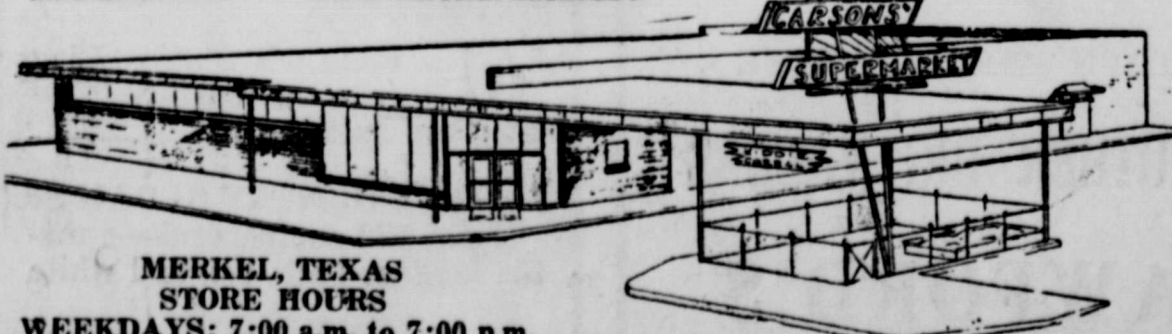
