According to Saunders' reease, the new system is known is All Numerical Calling Plan ANC). It replaces the more amiliar two-letter five numer (2L5N) system which was naugurated when the telephone ndustry first launched its longange program to permit operitors and / or customers to Hal direct from one city to

Each telephone number is now composed of seven digits instead of two letters and five

Saunders points out the 2L5N bracket of theirs. system is being replaced as rapidly as possible in order that all number combinations

be utilized. "The old 2L5N system requires a prefix such as CHerry or ADams;" he states, "However, because no words in English language begin with letter combination WX or WY or JK or JL, telephone numbers beginning with 99 or 55 could not was Bovina's leading scorer. be utilized, thereby limiting FUNERAL THURSDAY-number assignments."

As the number of customers being assigned 2L5N numbers throughout the nation increased, necessity of using all possible number combinations on the dial also increased.

"In some areas," Saunders says, "we are running out of possible letter prefixes."

As a result of this realization, a study was undertaken in Wichita Falls to determine whether assigning seven digit telephone numbers proved satisfactory to customers and operators. Conclusion of the extensive study was that the ANC Plan not only was satisfactory, but even eliminated some previous dialing errors resulting from confusion between the numeral "1" and the letter "I" and numeral "zero" and the letter "O."

Saunders' release didn't say so but we suppose this will eventually do away with letters on telephone dial. Seems to us they'll have no purpose to serve from here on.

We noticed in the new phone book which was mentioned earlier here that Friona kept its four digit system which it used all during the time we were going through that ADams 8 business in Bovina.

That's all right with us, but we don't understand why our neighbor to the northeast gets to keep those easy-to-remember, uncomplicated numbers while they've changed us around is often as a Republican trades utomobiles. We're not comlaining, we just don't undertand.

Try stirring three or four tablespoonfuls of plant food in each gallon of water. You will be amazed at the amount of water and plant food the pots will soak up. This will prevent the pots from absorbing chemicals that plants need from the

### Special Milk Program Ups Consumption

College Station, Dec .-- For the sixth straight year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports an increase in the amount of milk being consumed children through the operation of the Special Milk

According to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, in the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1960, nearly 2,4 billion halfpints of milk were moved into use by the program, in addition to milk served with lunches under the National School Lunch Program. This 2.4 billion total represents an increase of about 200 million half-pints over the preceding year. Preliminary reports indicate that the amount of milk used by the program will be even graater this year.

The Special Milk Program encourages children to drink more milk by making it possible for schools and institutions to serve it more frequently and at reduced prices, or to inaugurate a milk service. During 1960 the number of participating schools, settlement houses, summer camps, and other child-care institutions climbed to an all-time high of

The report covering employees who worked in 1960 must be filed with the Director of Internal Revenue during January 1961."

The report must be filed for: any employee who was paid \$150 or more in cash wages during the year; or any individual who worked on 20 or sample. more days in 1960 for cash wages figured on a time basis (for instance, by the hour, day, week, etc.) regardless of the total earnings for the year. It is important that the em-

ployee's correct social security number be shown on the report, Geldon said. There was a sharp increase

in the number and quality of reports filed by area farmers last year. Geldon advised that correct and complete reporting helps guarantee that the employee receives full social security credit for the work he has done.
