Dear Helen:

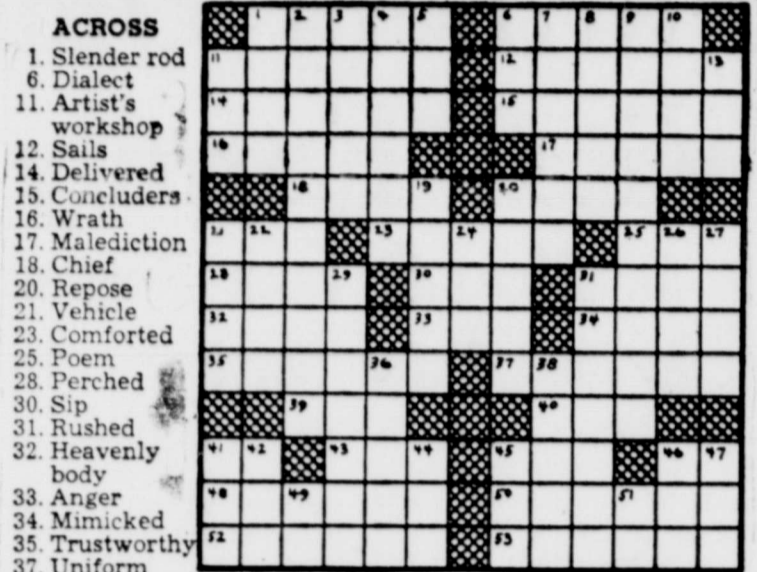
