\$192,000 Loan Approved For Taylor Telephone Coop

Major Benefits For Potosi Area

The Rural Electric Administration this week approved a loan to Taylor Telephone Cooperative of \$192,000 for 42 miles of lines to serve 85 new subscribers and to upgrade existing services.

The major portion of the grant will benefit the Potosi area," tivities, Max Murrell, retiring said John Hardesty, manager of Taylor Telephone Cooperative. "The growth in and around Potosi has come as a result of a population explosion in Abilene and the installation of a water system in Potosi," Hardesty explained.

'Approximately 30 of the 42 miles involved in this loan will be replaced with an underground cable," said Hardesty. "This will reduce the number on circuits to a maximum of four people."

"We have already installed a new central office there," said Hardesty, "to accomodate the population growth." The loan will actually permit us to go ahead reconstruct the outside plant."

Other benefits of the loan will be the increase of more circuits in and out of Abilene. "The E.A.S. a mile south of Anson while re- (Extending Area Service) will be increased from 7 to fifteen lines and the toll circuits from four to seven." Hardesty said.

"Even the so-called 'safe and sane' fireworks can be dangerous, so think of the peril involved in use of illegal and bootlegged fireworks over the Fourth of July," warns Edward R. Klamm, accident prevention chief of an Insurance Company.

"Sorrow and suffering are in store for a great many youngsters, and for numerous adults as well," Klamm predicted as he gloomily reviewed statistics relating to fireworks accidents in recent years.

"There is no such thing as 'safe and sane' fireworks," Klamm pointed out. "Each year people are warned about the dangers of playing with them, or letting their children play with them, and each year many people ignore the warnings. The result is severe injury and blindness to some and death to others."

Many towns and counties lack ordinances against fireworks. In other areas law enforcement don't enforce existing statues. The problem of controlling the sale and use of fireworks is magnified by parents who drive across state lines to purchase fireworks that are banned in their own

To aid the fight against illegal fireworks this holiday season, the Insurance executive made these recommendations:

1. Don't let small children handle fireworks and keep them away from anyone handling them.

2. Don't give them "substitutes" such as safety flares to play with. These are aids to motorists, not toys. Even sparklers are dangerous. They burn at a temperature almost hot enough to melt cop-

3. Be on the alert for people bootlegging fireworks and report them to police. Fast moving and unscrupulous, these "salesmen" are hard to trace without the help of parents and others.

4. If your children want to see fireworks, take them to a professional public fireworks display.

"Parents must take the initiative in suppressing the sale and use of fireworks," emphasized Klamm. "For many parents this Fourth of July will be one they will never forget as they stand in hospital emergency room watching their sons and daughters being treated for burns and other





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
