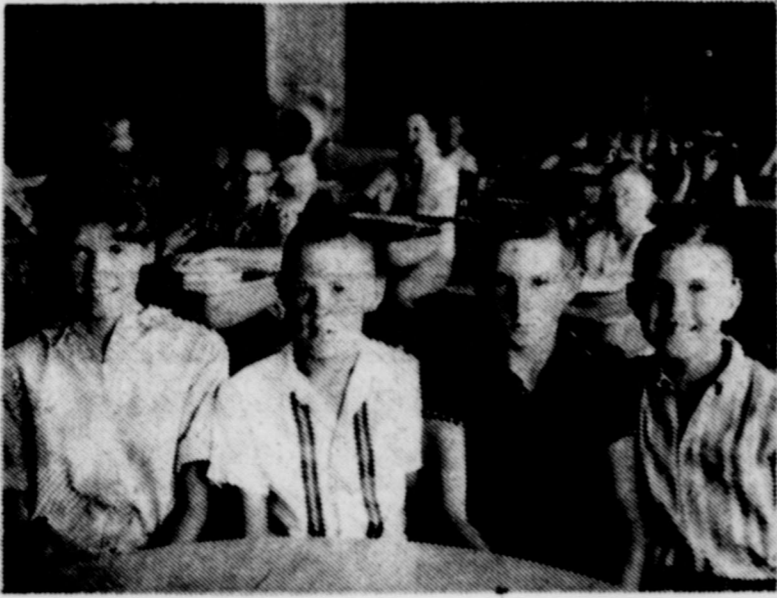
Mrs. W. F. Perry said it is just awful dry at her ranch at the Mountain Pass area. She said that most all of the goats in that area had been sheared.

The difference he said was in the experience gained in the two games.

The Badgers next play Colorado City at 8 p.m. at Colorado City, which will be the last of their games in non - conference play.

In the Baird non - conference warm - up, the Bears jumped into the lead when left halfback, Steve Stanley scored from Merkel's 40 yard line with approximately 5 minutes left in the first quarter.

With one minute left in the first quarter, Merkel's Nick Davis scored from three yards out on a drive which began from Baird's 13.

With 9:15 left in the second quarter, Merkel hit again when Davis scored from the 2 yard line. On a reverse play, Felix Costillo scored the two extra points.

The Badgers scored again with 6:05 left in the quarter when Bob Tate walked a 57 yard pass to Richard Walker. Tate gained two more points for the Badgers on a keeper.

With one minute and 10 seconds left in the half, Tate was trapped behind the goal line as he was attempting to toss a pass and Baird slapped a safety. The half ended with Merkel leading 22 to 8.

In the final period, Merkel's Costillo scored from three yards out, and Jimmy Williams scored two points on the extra point try.

Merkel later drove 35 yards for the final tally, with Costillo going over from the four with five minutes left. Tate scored two more points on an option play.

Williams set up the last tally with a 27-yard play.

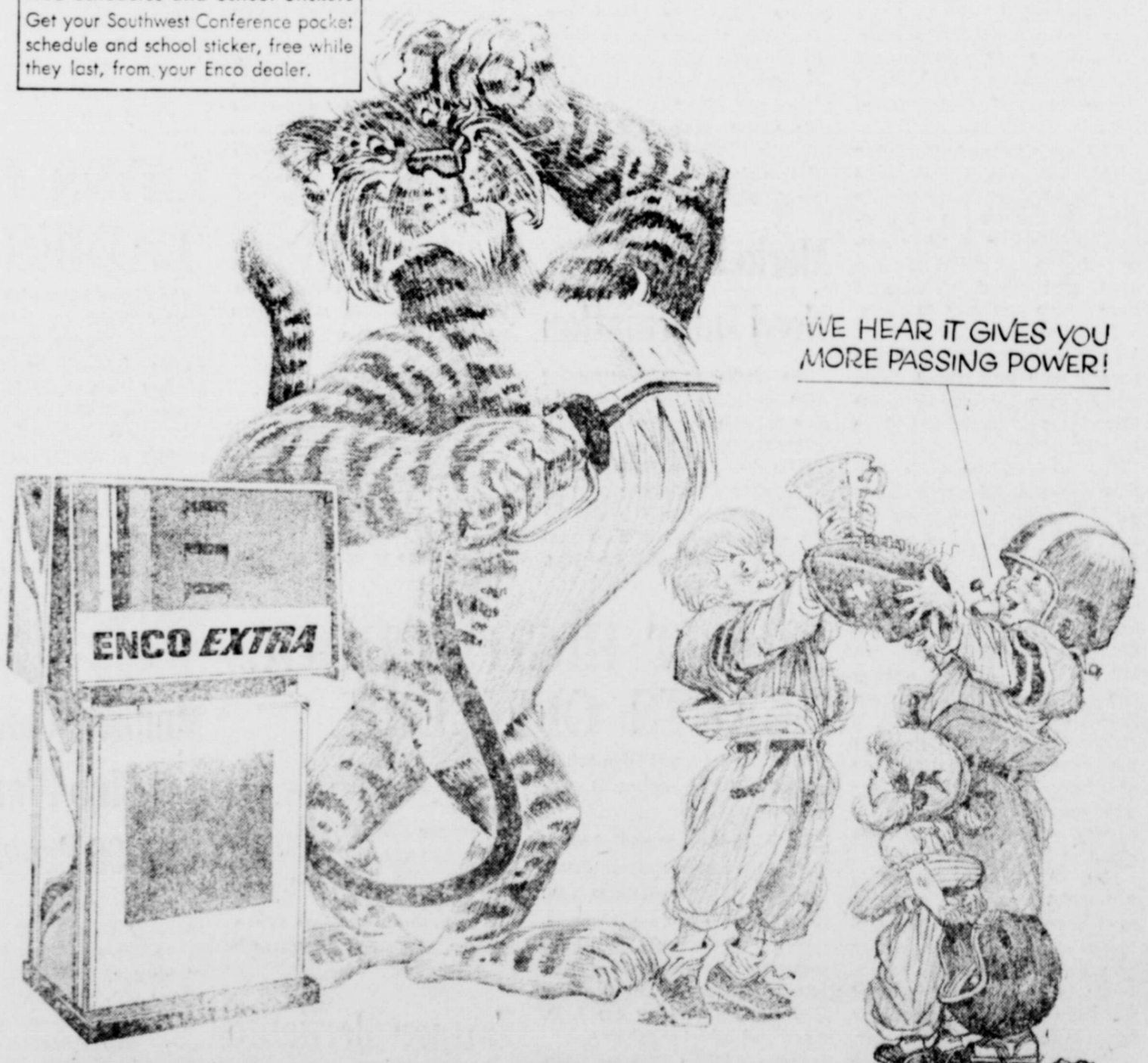

A Message From New Live Oak Baptist Church

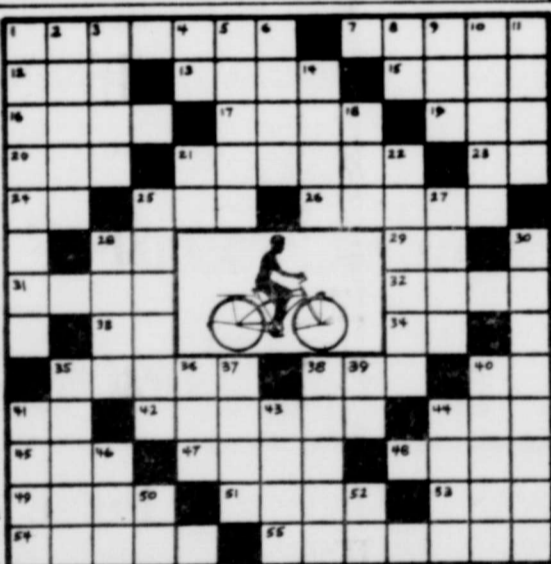

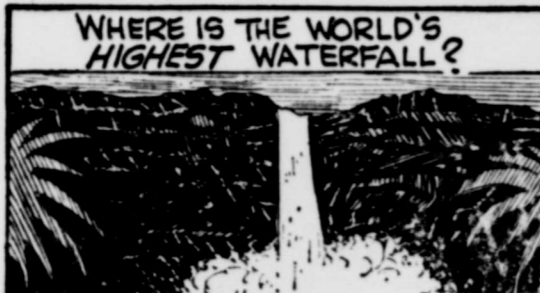

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THAT RUBBISH AND TRASH WEEDS AND GRASS TO BE REMOVED THEREFROM; CUT UPON PREMISES AND AND FIXING A PENALTY FOR

FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH SUCH ORDINANCE, AND PROVIDING THAT SAME SHALL BE DONE BY THE CITY IN THE EVENT OF SUCH FAILURE AND PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN UPON THE PROPERTY FOR THE EXPENSE INCURRED IN REMOVING AND DECLARING THAT ALLOWING WEEDS TO GROW AND TRASH AND RUBBISH TO ACCUMULATE TO BE A NUISANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERKEL:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any owner, lessee, occupant or any person in charge of any premises in the City of Merkel to allow weeds to grow upon the premises, or trash or rubbish to accumulate upon said premises to such an extent as is reasonably calculated to create a fire hazard or calculated to become injurious to the health of the citizens of Merkel, and either act is hereby declared to constitute a public nuisance.

Section 2. Whenever weeds are allowed to grow, or trash or rubbish allowed to accumulate upon any premises of the City of Merkel as prohibited by this ordinance the Board of Commissioners shall hear evidence and determine whether or not such accumulation of rubbish and trash or the growth of weeds thereon, or both, are sufficient to constitute a nuisance as herein defined, and if they so find, they shall pass a resolution declaring that the growth of weeds or accumulation of trash and rubbish upon such premises, or both, constitutes a public nuisance, and shall order same removed by the owner, occupant, lessee or person in charge of such premises, within five days from the date such notice is given.

Section 3. In the event the owner of the premises upon which is located a nuisance as prohibited by this ordinance can not be found or served with notice, and there does not appear to be any person of such premises or occupancy, or in the event the nuisance is not abated by cutting the weeds and removing the trash and rubbish or either of them, as the case may be, then said nuisance shall be abated by the City of Merkel, and the expense incurred, which shall include salary and wages of all employees, and reasonable charge for machinery and tools, vehicles, etc., used in abating said nuisance shall be a personal charge against owner of said premises and shall be assessed as a lien against the property on which such nuisance is located and removed therefrom, and

shall be due and payable to the City Tax Collector the following tax paying period, that is, the first day of March following the date at which such nuisance is abated and failure to pay when due shall cause a ten per cent penalty to be added and same shall bear interest from the date the same is due, at the rate of six per cent per annum.

Section 4. Failure to cut weeds and remove trash and rubbish or to do either of them when notified to do so, as set out in this ordinance by any party obligated to do so by this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) and each day that such nuisance shall continue after the time for abatement as herein set out shall constitute a separate offense.

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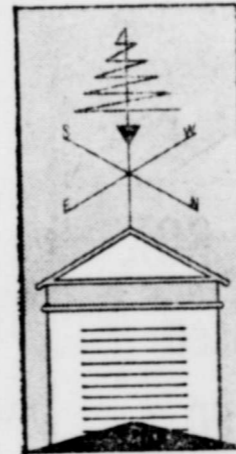

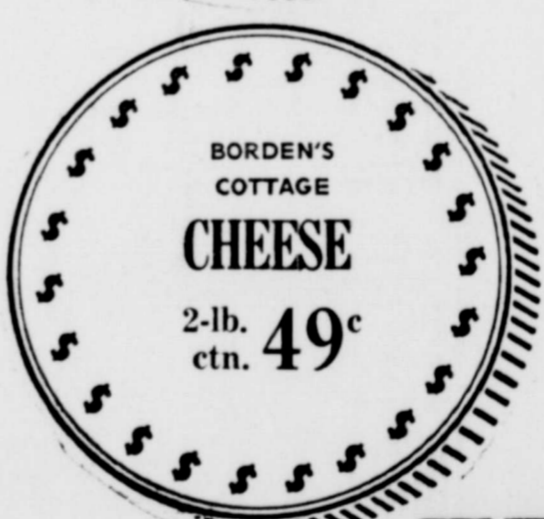
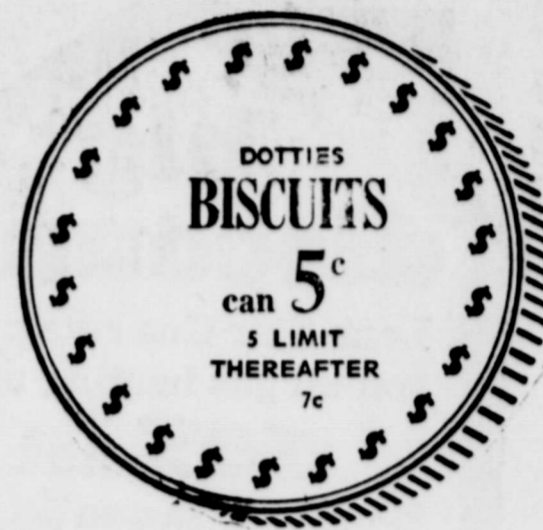
