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Up The Canyon

The last few days the rain has fallen very fine over the Canyon, bringing a total of two inches in places.

Farmers had just started sowing their wheat and oats. And they are saying they wished they could have gotten more of it soon.

Some of the cotton is showing the results of that awful hot September weather we had, and it never did recover from the heat.

One thing about good rains, it will boost the live stock market some; however, farmers and stockmen realize that winter weather will be coming real soon, and perhaps will cause them to think before buying.

As to now there has been very little cotton harvested; however, a few farmers were planning to start this week. But due to the rains it will have to be postponed.

As to the lamb market in San Angelo the last few days, the market showed a little weakness from a few weeks ago.

Joe Swinney, stockman in the Canyon, sold a load of lambs last week and they sold around the 21c mark, but the lambs were heavy and dollared off a good price.

D. I. Irvin Davis reported a sale of 350 lambs from the Davis Ranch, but there was no price report on those lambs. However, you can figure around \$15. per head on them.

There have been a few land sales made in the Canyon the last few weeks. The Will Orr little ranch place of 342 acres in the extreme south part of the Canyon, has just sold to Ray Wilson and son, Don. A 160 acre place along the west line of Taylor County, owned by Booth Russom of Monahans, sold to Billie D. Doan of Merkel. We understand the land sold very high, but of course, there isn't any cheap land at all.

Booth Russom, my nephew of Monahans, called me this week, saying he wanted to buy some young bulls. Booth has just taken a 1700 acre grass lease between

Funeral services for J. A. Patterson, 80, was held Monday, Oct. 4, at the First Methodist Church, with the Rev. Newton Daniel, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery under direction of Starbuck Funeral Home.

Mr. Patterson, a longtime resident here, died at his home Sunday after a short illness.

Born May 11, 1885 in Ochitah County, Miss., he moved to Abilene in 1888 and was married to Etta Ann Berry on April 9, 1903 at Hodges. Mrs. Patterson died in March, 1959.

Mr. Patterson had lived in Taylor and Jones counties for the past 48 years. A retired grain dealer, he was a member of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors are four sons, the Rev. Clesby of Fritch, C. O. of Lawn, Lester of Abilene and Jim of Long Island, N.Y.; one daughter, Mrs. James (Louise) Pomroy of Great Falls, Mont.; 11 grandchildren; three great-grandchildren; and two brothers, Brooks and Herbert, both of Merkel.

Barnett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Barnett, Merkel, was presented the 4-H Gold Star Award at a dinner honoring Taylor County 4-H Club members, Monday, Oct. 4.

The dinner, held at the Starlite Inn, was hosted by Abilene's Key City Kiwanis Club.

Barnett has been a member of the Merkel 4-H Club, of which his parents are organizational leaders, for five years. He served three years as its president and two terms as vice president. He is the newly elected chairman of the Taylor County 4-H Council, of which he is past treasurer.

Other activities which have made Barnett an outstanding 4-H

leader include his representation of the county clubs at the District 7 4-H Camp at Lake Brown-wood this year; a first place win in public speaking in the county; and second place in District 7 4-H competition, which qualified him for state competition last June.

He won first place in the county's leadership awards program and second on the district.

He has presented his 4-H speech "Optimism — Spirit of Youth," to a number of service clubs in Merkel and Abilene.

Finley has fed steers each of his five years in 4-H work and has shown his animals each year in the Abilene Fat Stock Show and four years he has exhibited at the Odessa show. He has fed lambs two years and owns two Sears Foundation gilts.

Finley is a sophomore in Merkel High School. He is an alto saxophone player in the school's concert and stage band. He is active in the Youth Fellowship of the First Methodist Church.

City Council Discusses Citizens' 'Dog' Complaints

Councilmen Agree Action Necessary

Taking top precedence on the Merkel City Council agenda was a lengthy discussion of determining the necessity for, and "passing of an ordinance on re-establishing and adding new and stricter regulations on the keeping of dogs in the town of Merkel."

Council members present for the Oct. 4 regular meeting were Onis Crawford, Charles (Peck) Eager, Clyde Wurst and Weldon McAninch.

"We're having complaints about stray dogs from all over our town," said Eager, "and action must be taken."

Eager listed some of the complaints being received as "turning over trash barrels, carrying off and tearing up newspapers (in the early morning hours before people get up), damaging flower beds and shrubs, using yards for outhouses, prolonged and loud barking at all hours of night, and disturbing rest and sleep of neighbors."

"Some dogs are vicious and bite people," Eager said, "and this fact alone makes it imperative that something be done."

"I feel," said Clude Wurst, "that if we clamp down tight enough on dog owners, they will realize the importance of such an ordinance."

Onis Crawford pointed out that such an ordinance is a "safety protection. If we as citizens realize the danger of diseases that are carried by animals, perhaps greater efforts will be taken to prohibit them from running at large."

The ordinance appears in this edition of the Merkel Mail, and a public hearing will be held by the Town Council of Merkel October 18 at 7 p.m. in the City Hall.

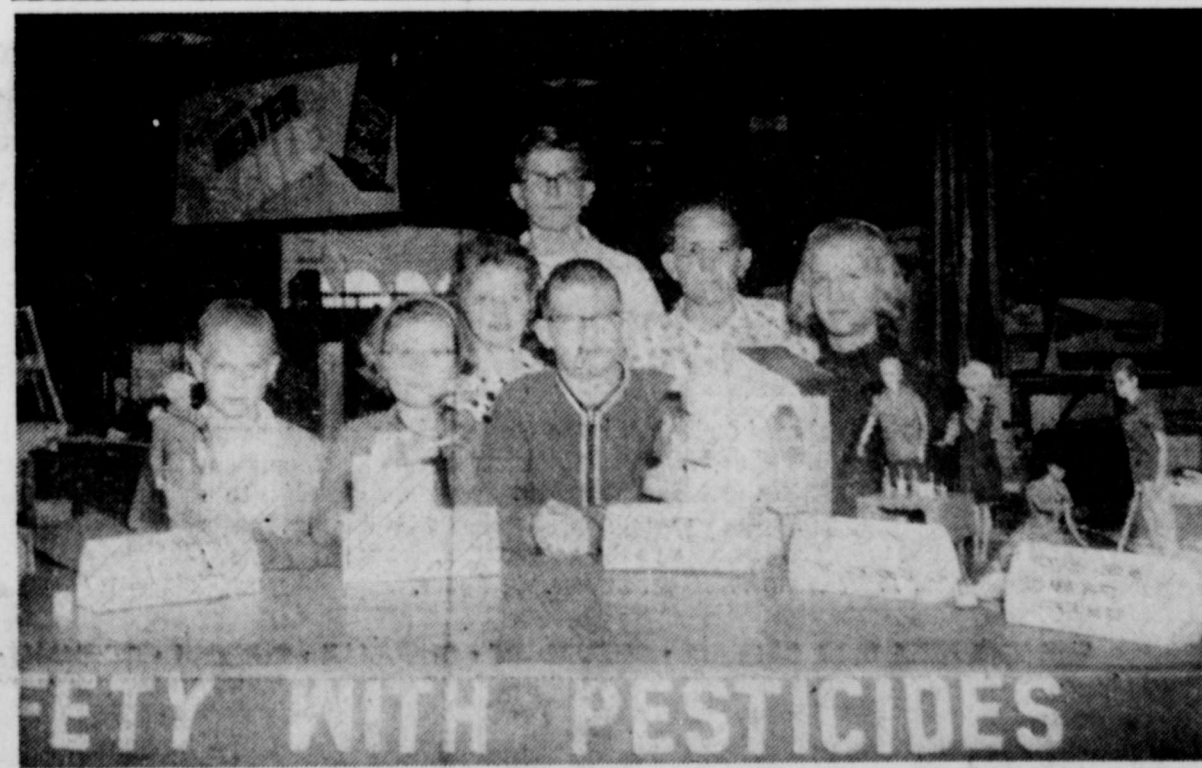
Former Merkelite Dies, Rites Held

"The dire need of the English people introduced the first writing of the Magna Carta in 1215, under the rule of King John."

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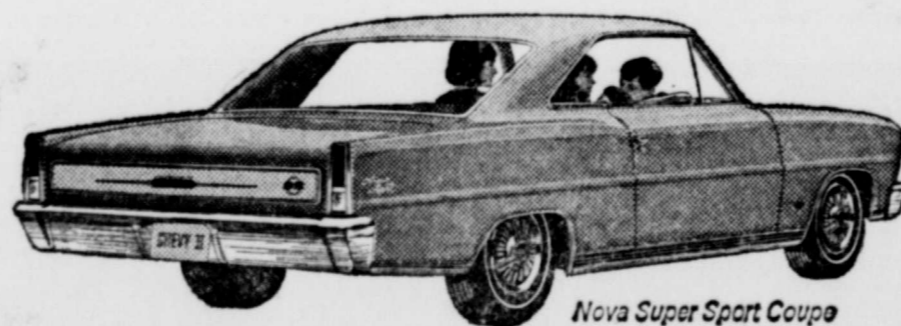

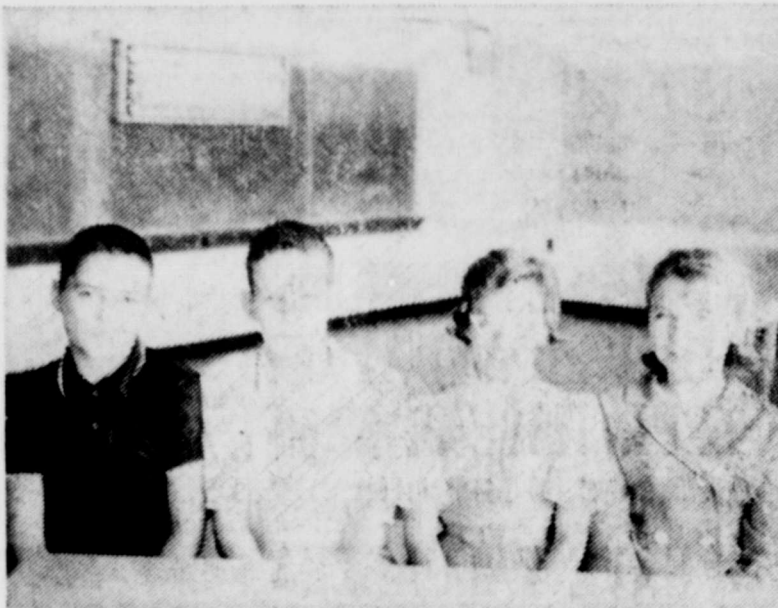

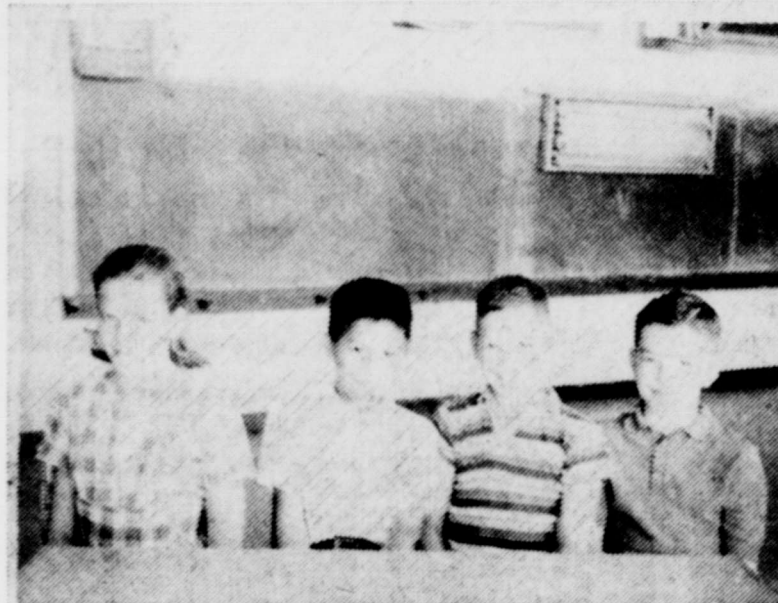
We want to give all farmers and
