Members of Bovina Church of Christ are on brink of launching an \$85,000 church building program.

Construction is scheduled to begin around March 1, Minister Don Stone announces, with completion date slated for about June 1. Contract will be let in near future.

The new building will be built in an L-shape around present church building. When new building is ready for use, present building will be moved with space it occupies being paved and used for parking.

Estimated cost of new structure is \$85,000. It will contain 14 classrooms, a large fellowwill seat 400. The auditorium will have an overhead-type nursery facility. The auditorium will be furnished with upholstered opera-type chair. Interior decorating will feature pine paneling with exposed beams. Total space in building will be 9800 square feet. Exterior will be in an autumn blend of brick set off by a double panel of colored glass in front. Plans are to have \$20,000 of the total cost on hand when the building is started. Balance of cost will be financed, Minister Stone says. Approximately \$16,000 is in building fund at present. Plans for the new structure have been on drawing board for several months.

Shotgun enthusiasts here are displaying a much greater amount of caution now than they did at first turkey shoot here a couple of months ago. They're wise in doing so.

For instance, according to rules, no gun may have a shell in it unless its user is onfiring line and preparing to shoot. That's just one of many rules and they're all backed by common sense.

A new method for screening county agent explained the new samples are collected from the plant or other designated points.

Negative animals are credited veterinarians work directly with herd owners until the disease problem is cleared up. In areas ticed, at least 80% of all eligible heifer calves retained in a herd each year must be vaccinated, Coker said.

Under the new method, counties can be recertified if at least five per cent of all breeding cattle in the county are tested each year or a total of 15 per cent for each three - year period, the county agent explained. Only female cattle three years of age or older are back tagged and tested,

If we fail to qualify under this method, the animal disease eradication division must come into the county at the end of three years and check 20 per cent of the herds and 20 per cent of the cattle in these herds not participating in the backtag program until a 15 per cent total has been reached. All purebreed breeders or registered breeders also will be required to test 20 per cent of their if they cannot qualify by testing at least 15 per cent cull cattle.






