FISHER TO ATTEND LIBRARY MEETING

Mack Fisher, superintendent of Merkel Schools, has been invited to participate in a state conference on libraries to be held in Austin on March 23. The meeting is being called by the governor to assist in formulating procedures to improve the libraries throughout the state.

The Governor's Conference, the first to be held at the state level. will seek to enlist state - wide citizen cooperation in solving major state problems relating to improving library service for Texans. Outstanding speakers, Gov. John B. Connally, Chanceller Harry Ransom of the University of Texas, and the president of the American Library Association will discuss the broad demands being made on libraries in the space age and the action needed to meet these demands.



WTU EMPLOYEES WIN 1965 SAFETY AWARD
