Three Directors Elected at Meet

Attendance at the Taylor Electric Cooperative's 25th Anniversary meeting Thursday, April 21. struck an all time high of 1,710. Members and visitors began forming in the registration lines as early as 8 a.m.

In the election of three directors a record of 610 ballots were cast. The three directors elected to represent Zones 1, 2 and 3 were Riley Miller of Potosi, Alton Whitaker of Hamby, and Clovis McElmurray of White Flat.

Odis S. Moore, a Divide farmer - stockman was reelected to a second terms as president of the board.

R. C. (Sonny) Watts, Jr., a stockman from the Hylton Community in Nolan County, was elected vice president.

Jack Morrow, Hawley farmerstockman, was reelected secretary treasurer of the board.

Horace Hargrove, assistant manager of the Taylor Electric Cooperative, represented the managerial and operating staffs in the absene of manger Norman Winter, who was in a hospital in

jor surgery. Hargrove told members that the cooperative has been doing a lot of improvement on properties during the past twelve months. "Several unused lines were removed," he said, "and replacement of others. Crews traveled 528,000 miles without an accident and worked 106,000 man hours with only two minor accidents."

Bryan Bradbury, attorney for the cooperative, was moderator for the business session.

Board president Moore reported the following comparative figures for March 31, 1941 (at the end of two months of operation) and for Dec. 31, 1965, at the end of 24 years operation:

Line mileage, 397 and 2,683.7; connected members, 549 and 7,-4188; total revenue \$2,770.37 and \$1,169,817.63; plant value, \$220,-197.93 and \$5,738,951.86.

Members equity, \$2,290.35 and \$1,805,807.75; total assets, \$290,-235.07 and \$5,343,137.66; number of employees, 2 and 44; vehicles 2 and 21; patronage capital and margin for year, \$2,290.35 and

Total cooperative's assets were reported by secretary treasurer Morrow as \$5,343,137.66 and liabilities of \$3,537,329.91. Equities in membership fees and patronage capital were \$38,210.00, and other equities of \$1,767,597.75, for a total membership equity of \$1,-805,807,75, and liabilities and net worth of \$5,343,137.66.

Revenue checks totaling \$162,-481.61 were given to members attending. The cooperative had returned \$301,870.94 on capital cred-

For 1965, \$347,694.47 in revenue were received from residential and farm uses; \$155,003.49 from commercial users; \$2,870.28 from public buildings; \$13,596.28 from irrigation; \$614,350.96 from oil industry; and \$36,302.15 from miscellaneous sources.

The cooperative spent \$310,808.-76 in the purchase of power, \$322-549.89 for operating and maint ance costs; \$273,813.70 on members capital credit and margins; \$24,925.22 on taxes; \$66,371.79 on interest, and \$171,349.27 for de-

The colonel, a graduate of Noodle High School, attended Howard Payne College, Hardin-Simmons University, and Texas Technological College. He has his B.A. and M.A. degrees.

Col. Tarpley is a group training officer at the Officer Training Command which provides the flying technical, and specialized education programs for the Air Force.

He has served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II and is a veteran of the Korean War.

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Where Stand On

FREE ENTERPRISE

"I am not one of those who apologizes for or takes a defensive attitude toward the free enterprise system. It doesn't need defending. It's the best system ever devised for satisfying the material needs and aspirations of the people. There is room for improvement, of course, but this can be done without altering the basic principles which make it function."

FEDERAL BUREAUCRACY

"I believe that too much control of our government's affairs has passed out of the hands of Congress, and into the hands of the regulatory and administrative agencies. This authority, which has been lost by default, must be re-claimed by the Congress. The trend of surrendering authority to agencies and commissions-who are supposed to administer the laws instead of making them-should be halted. I think it is time that Congress recognize this usurpation of its power and authority for what it is: government by bureaucracy. When Congress loses its authority, then the people lose theirs, for Congress is the voice of the people."

GOVERNMENT SPENDING

"There is no justification for deficit spending except during times of national emergency. I think all new proposals for spending should be carefully screened and that a determined stand be made against unnecessary spending. These are prosperous times, and it is now that we should be paying the national debt, rather than creating more of it. If we don't pay off our national debt during good times, when lo we pay it?"

VIET NAM

"I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Viet Nam than that which the President has so firmly taken. We cannot be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. Our goal in Viet Nam is to stop aggression on the part of the communists to-ward a peaceful people who have every right to seek their own destiny."

OIL AND GAS

"I will support legislation aimed toward bringing about a healthier oil and gas industry. This is a prime business-an indispensable business-to our District, and contributes substantially to the welfare of us all. As to the 271/2% oil depletion allowance, I am in full accord with it and would resist any measure that would seek to change it to the disadvantage of the industry and the District."

EDUCATION

"Education is the single most important function of an enlightened society. We must make it as accessible as possible, for as many without eithe lastic standards or jeopardizing our traditional academic freedom. I will favor legislation that broadens our educational base, insofar as it does so without giving the Federal Government control over our curricula. The selection of textbooks and the teaching of subjects should be left exclusively in the hands of local schools, without infringement of any kind on the part of the government.

"I am also interested in seeing our schools extend their efforts in the direction of more technical and vocational training, and would support legislation that would encourage this. I feel that this would lessen the high drop-out rate, as well as provide useful training to those who do not have an opportunity to go to college. This would also enhance the national employment picture, as the overall demand for trained technicians and specialized workers in nearly all fields is greater than the supply.

'As your Congressman, I would support legislation that would give a tax relief to parents of students enrolled in colleges. Such a bill should allow tax deductions for the amount put out for academic expenses such as tuition, fees, and books, or perhaps give the parents an additional standard tax exemption similar to the present \$600 exemptions allowed for dependents. Such educational exemptions, of course, would continue only for the established four year period.

"It is my firm conviction that we cannot legislate poverty out of existence, but we can go a long way toward eliminating it through

JUDICIAL SYSTEM

'As a former District Judge and District Attorney, I am extremely proud of the lead the legal profession has traditionally taken in the affairs of our government. Especially do I hold our courts in high esteem.

"To keep our court system above the criticism and reproach it has occasionally under-gone in the past, I would introduce and urge passage of legislation that would prescribe basic qualifications for Judges appointed to the federal judiciary. In addition I think it would be desirable to establish a mandatory retirement age, and a procedure for removing judges when they become unfit for service because of health or other reasons.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

"I will always be a strong advocate of a national defense force large enough and modern enough to maintain our peace and security anywhere it might be threatened. Such a force should be second to none in the quality of its personnel, its leadership, and its weaponry. I believe such a force can be achieved and maintained without a wasteful expenditure of the

WATER CONSERVATION

"There is no greater problem facing our District than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Obviously, such legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

AGRICULTURE

"I believe the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. As a case in point, there is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Agricultural Department, that adversely affects the famer by altering skiprow planting practices. I would favor farm legislation that would take into consideration the different and varying characteristics from one farming region to another. Especially would I work diligently to amend the program to again permit the kind of skip-row planting that the farmer of this district wants and

LABOR LEGISLATION

"I have always favored the right of labor to organize for the purpose of achieving de-sirable objectives for its working members.

I also support the principle of collective bargaining, as it is the only just way to reach a livable balance between labor and management.

I do not believe that either labor or management should be allowed to walk rough-shod over the other. It takes both to produce the goods and manufacture the wealth in which we all share, and both have legitimate viewpoints which must be evaluated and adjudicated equitably in any controversy between them.

I do not favor any act or measure that would directly or indirectly compel anyone to become a member of any labor, trade, or business organization on a mandatory basis. This, to me, is a dangerous encroachment on the freedom of the individual."

VETERAN'S AFFAIRS

"As an overseas veteran of World War II myself, I am a supporter of the broad objectives of the Veterans' Program, and I particularly endorse the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill and the extensions of it to include veterans of recent conflicts. As to future legislation for veterans, I will give due consideration to any measure that will tangibly improve the lot of the veteran without putting an unfair penalty on other segments of the

ELDON MAHON FOR CONGRESS

ASSESSMENT OF COSTS OF CLEANING THE PRE-MISES TO CONSTITUTE A LIEN UPON THE PROPERTY, PRE-SCRIBING A PEANALTY. AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, there are in the City of Merkel certain premises which are used and maintained for human habitation or close to human habitation which are danperces, unsanitary and constitute a monice to the health, morals. safety and general welfare of the people of the City of Merkel; and,

WHEREAS, the existing ordinances of the City of Merkel are inadequate to properly prescribe e minimum standard for the sanitation and cleanliness of the premises within the city limits; now,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE bedroom house at 1508 Heath COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERKEL.

SECTION 1: NUISANCE. A nuisance is defined to be anycombine, drag type, used very thing or state of things that may be liable to injure the health or interfere with the comfort of the people of the city.

SECTION 2. GARBAGE.

Garbage shall be held to include, among other similar matter, all animal or vegetable matter, such as waste material and refuse from kitchens, residences, grocery stores, butcher shops, restaurants, cafes, hotels, rooming houses, and boarding houses and other deleterious substances.

SECTION 3: TRASH.

Trash shall mean rubbish such as feathers, coffee brounds, ashes, tin cans, paper boxes, glass, shrubs, yard clippings, yard cleanings and rakings, leaves, tree trimmings, old tires, automobile parts, derelict automobiles, derelict trailers, derelict farm machinery and other derelict equipment and similar mater.

> SECTION 5: WASTE, GAR-BAGE, ETC. - A NUISANCE.

The accumulation of garbage. waste, refuse, trash, and other deleterious substances on the premises of private residences, commercial institutions, and in streets and alleys, constitutes a public menace and nuisance and greatly increases the danger of the spread of infectious, contagious and epidemic diseases, and it is imperative and urgent for the preservation of health, safety, sanitation, peace and public welfare that proper and adequate regulations be adopted to require propetry owners, tenants, occupants, or leasees to keep and maintain his or her or their premises in such a condition that such premises will not constitute a public nuisance.



Surviving besides Mrs. West are his wife; two sons; two daughters; four brothers; nine grandchildren and one great grandchild.


