They might have invented a motor car, an electric light; they might have been governor, senator, president; they might have got that culture for cancer, written that great novel, painted that great picture. Might have been. Instead they fought great battles. They're still fighting ... fighting so people won't say, "Why should I give 'em my money?" They don't want money given them. They want to earn it. And they make tiny flowers - poppies to sell. They want you to buy them . . . as straight merchandise . . . so that they can help themselves with better medical care and faculities.
