

George Boyce sold corn, feed and eggs and his good wife sold that good Jersey butter.

Pirk Browning would tell us of the big tobacco deals and pretty women and and whiskey in old Kentucky while Sam Dunkin skinned us on a bill of lumber and Jim Barnes would tell us how he hunted possums in Louisiana and sold us lumber at cost.

At that time we were sure the H. B. \$2.50 shoe was the best in the world because Tom Warren maranteed every pair and the Solid Comfort was the chief plows for George West said so. Bill Sheppard sold us porterhouse steak at 6 cents a pound, but of course it was none of our busines where he got it.

I remember well when Merkel went out of the saloon business. when that good old man Jake Brooks piled up his stock of booze and made a bonfire out of it and my old friend Dad Huffman wiped the tears from his cheeks and Jack Haley danced the war dance and on Sunday we went to church to hear Brother Baker preach the gospel. 




