

Your administrator will have to file an estate tax return if the fair market value of your estate is \$60,000 or more on the date of your death. However, if there is a surviving spouse and the estate Is community property, you do not have to file unless the estate exceeds \$120,000, since 50 per cent of the community proprety belongs to the surviving spouse. Getting the correct evaluation on your estate is important since this evaluation affects all future tax transactions on the property.
