When road conditions are questionable, a decision will be made about bus routes and time of starting school before 6 a.m.

The following media will then be notified: KMUL radio AM 1380, Channel 6 TV, KFYO radio AM 790, KGNC radio AM 710, KMAC TV 28 (cable 12), KLBK TV (13), and KCBD TV (11).

In the event you are unable to receive information from the media, you may call 272-3911 between the hours of 6:15 and 8 a.m. to receive a recorded message.

If there is no recorded message on this line, you may assume that school will start at the regular time and the buses will run their routes as scheduled. Any deviation from the regular schedule will be recorded

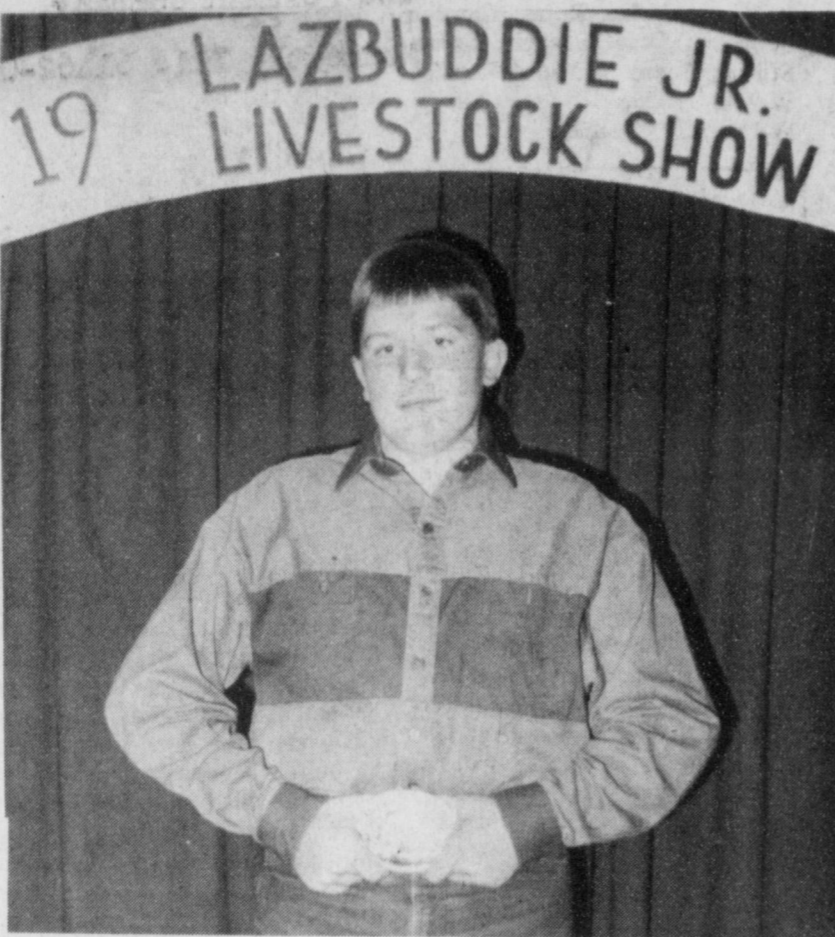

Gardening Can Save Money, Provide Exercise

(NU) - When times are tough, many families start to cut down on outside leisure activities. Instead of going out to the movies or for a bite to eat, numerous Americans choose inexpensive activities they can do at home.

One such activity — gardening — can help save a little money and take a step toward improving the environment at the same time. And planting a garden offers other benefits. It can provide good physical exercise and save money on the family food bill. Gardening also is one activity that the whole family can participate in.

With a little planning and care — and a small investment — a garden can provide months of enjoyment.

Having a successful garden does not require extensive knowledge — or a green thumb. Here are some simple tips beginner gardeners need to follow:

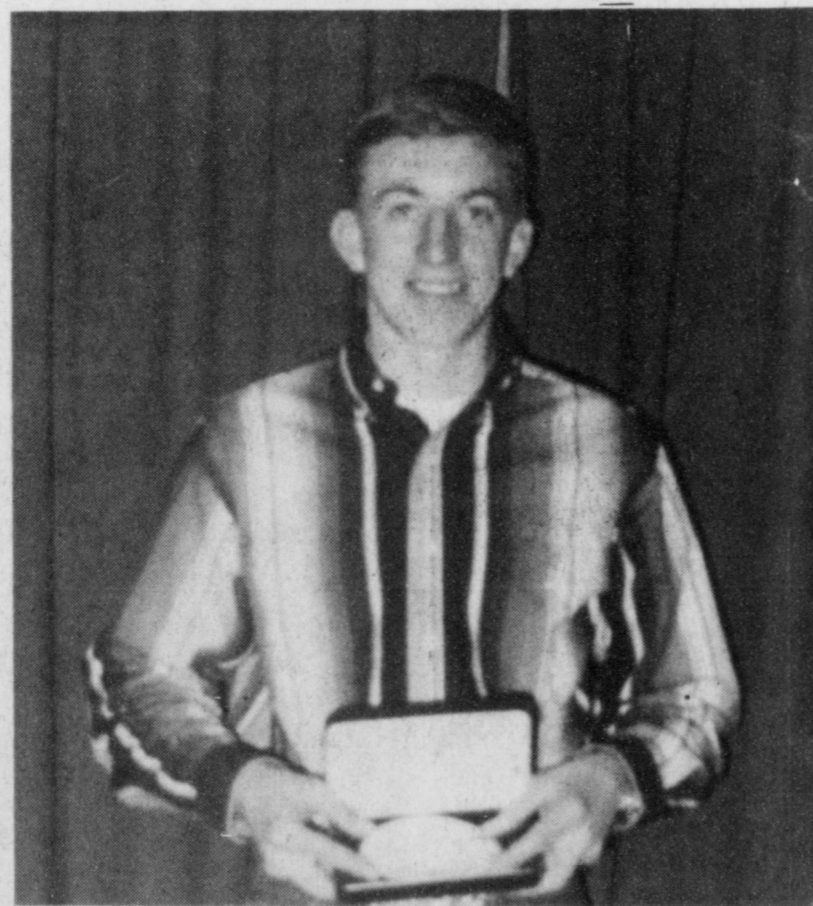
— Take Polaroid photos of your lawn and house and bring them to the nursery. It will help determine what types of greenery will look good and grow best in your yard.

— Use composts, mulches and organic fertilizers to help soil stay healthy. Good soil is essential to the growth of any plant because it holds vegetation in place while retaining moisture and nutrients for it to use.

— Prune plants by removing dead stems and leaves. It is important to the development and maintenance of your garden. By cutting away diseased areas and thinning out sections to permit more sunlight, flowers will continue to blossom and provide plenty of opportunities for photos.

— Add to the look of the garden by using trellis or night lighting. Stone statues and strategically placed benches will also add to the design of your yard.

— Keep records of all your horticulture successes and failures. If a particular plant blooms well in your garden, snap a Polaroid instant photo of it and keep it in a journal for future reference. If a flower doesn't grow, keeping a photo of it will help keep you from repeating the mistake.

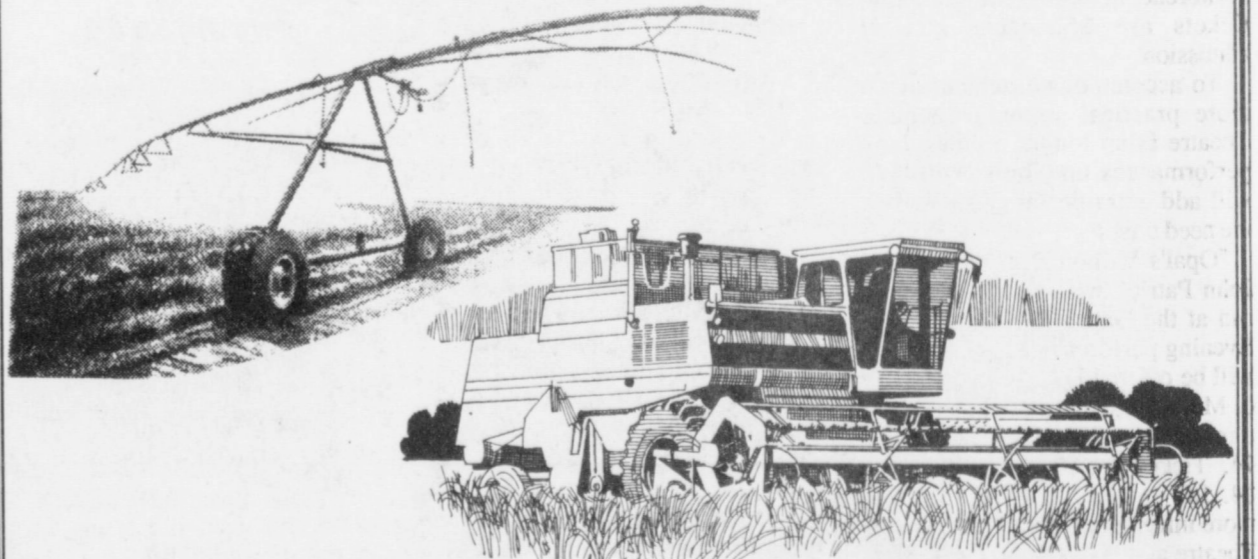

Management Development Program Offered Women

The Women in Agriculture: Management Development Program will be held February 18 and 19 at the Sheraton Inn in Lubbock. This seminar, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is intended for all women who are interested in learning more about farm and ranch management. The program will focus on developing business management skills.

The program will begin with registration at 9 a.m., on the 18th. Keynote speakers and workshop

The air quality permitting workload at the Texas Air Control Board (TACB) has grown tremendously during the past decade, but until quite recently, agency staffing patterns did not parallel that growth. This is one of the findings in a report released by the Texas Research League. The report, the second in a study requested by Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock, also notes that the understaffing created backlogs and time delays--both of which can have deleterious effects on economic development.

Permit engineers at one point were working on 40 permits each while 20 permits-per-engineer usually is considered optimum. According to the Austin-based public policy research organization, which an individual is assigned a workload twice the optimum, two things can happen. The work will not receive the attention it deserves, and a backlog of rather large proportions can develop. The TRL says that neither are satisfactory options.

In addition, the report says that the agency contends that it cannot retain a full staff because of the competing salary structure in the private sector. The TRL recommends that the TACB should conduct a study (or contract to have one undertaken) which compares the compensation of permit engineers with comparable positions in the private sector. The TRL says that if the analysis verifies a gross disparity in salaries as the agency believes, the TACB should take its case to the legislature.

The report also says that the legislature, as a part of an oversight function, should monitor the personnel needs of the TACB. If an examination of the agency's personnel requirements and salary structure indicate great variations with the private sector, the legislature should address the problem. Since the TACB's appropriations are financed from permit fees, increased funding for the agency should place no great burden on the state budget.

These problems were occurring at

the same time the agency began to comply with the federal Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 and began to prepare to merge with the Texas Water Commission into the Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Although the situation currently seems to be alleviated, the TRL warns that agency management, board policy, and legislative oversight should not allow such a situation to recur.

Participants will be able to attend four workshop sessions. Financial management, marketing crops and livestock, global thinking, basic ASCS information, environmental regulation, estate planning and labor laws are just a few of the thirteen different workshop sessions from which participants will be able to choose.

The cost of the Women in Agriculture: Management Development Program will be \$95. This will include three meals, refreshments and all conference materials.
