

The United Community Campaigns, frequently called United Fund or Community Chest drives, deserve the support of everyone.


Many worthy activities benefit from this unified approach, and the contributor has the added satisfaction of knowing that whatever he or she gives will be used for the greatest possible good.



1½ cups soft whole w bread crumbs	2 pounds ground beet
1/2 cup water	1 tablespoon shortening
1 tablespoon French Worcestershire	's 2 tablespoons flour Sauce 1 can (6 oz.) tomato
1 tablespoon French Prepared Yellow Mustard	r 1 envelope (1½ oz.) French's Meatloaf
2 teaspoons French' Celery Salt	s Sauce Mix 2 cups water
1/4 cup grated raw	carrot

Thoroughly mix together the bread crumbs, water. Worces-tershire sauce, mustard, salt, carrots, and eggs. Add ground beef; mix well. Form mixture into 16 meat balls. Brown in a skillet, in the tablespoon of shortening, over moderate heat. Remove. Pour off all but 2 to 3 tablespoons shorten-ing. Blend flour into remaining shortening. Add tomato paste, meatloaf sauce mix and water. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Return meat balls to sauce; cover. Cook over low heat about 30 minutes. (Add a little water if sauce becomes too thick.) Stir occasionally as needed. Mound macaroni in center of platter. Circle with meat balls. Spoon over sauce, 8 servings. over sauce. 8 servings.

> What is reputed to be the "sea-son in the sun" is, alas, the wet season, too. Soaring temperatures and humidity are all part of the national scene.

> And, wet weather, heat and humidity are the spawners of mil-dew—that thin whitish spore which attacks and destroys all types of clothing, shoes, paper, wood, and even plastic.

To prevent mildew from form-ing, keep your things clean and eliminate dampness as much as possible. When temperatures and humidity rise, as they have been doing this summer, soiled clothing and other articles supply the nu-trients needed for mildew organ-

isms to grow. And remember, ill-lighted and poorly ventilated places such as cellars, clothing closets, storage bins, etc., are particularly condu-cive to the formation of mildew.

In addition to the above pre-cautions, it is advisable to use a strong chemical preventive such as naphthalene flakes or moth balls to protect clothing and other stored articles from mildew attack.

Naphthalene is most effective against mildew fungi when the vapors are concentrated, so store vapors are concentrated, so store your belongings in closets, bureau drawers, and trunks that are opened infrequently. Generally, two pounds of moth balls will protect 100 cubic feet of storage space. Check occasionally to see how much of the original amount his vaporized. Replace when perhas vaporized. 



Applications for four and twoyear Army ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps) scholarships for the next school year must be made between Dec. 1, 1966 and Jan. 15, 1967, Col. William J. Stover, deputy chief of staff for reserved forces at Headquarters, Fourth U. S. Army, Fort Sam Houston, Tex., announced today. ROTC scholarships provide free tuition, all books and laboratory expenses, uniforms and equipment required for military courses, and \$50 a month subsistance, allowance for the duration of the scholarship. Depending on the tuition at various colleges, the four year scholarship benefits are between \$5,000 and \$9,000.
