

NOTICE EDITORIAL STATEMENT ON COTTON RESEARCH AND PROMOTION PROGRAM

Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, described the need for the Cotton Research and Promotion Program in his speech at the recent convention of Texas Farmers Union in Mineral Wells.

Congressman Poage said that "of all major crops, cotton is in the deepest trouble." He pointed out that the surplus is at an all time high and that synthetics, although higher priced, have moved into the cotton markets.

"I think it is perfectly clear," said Poage," that unless we, as cotton producers, are willing to make some substantial effort to promote our own product, that we are going to continue to lose more and more markets to synthetic fibers — and I greatly fear that if farmers should show, by rejecting the referendum, that they are unwilling to finance any serious effort in behalf of their own product, that we may well lose the government help which we are getting in connection with our cotton prices.

"The average cotton producer is getting almost half of his returns in the form of government payments of one kind or the other. I am afraid that if cotton farmers were to reject this referendum, that a great majority of the Members of Congress, who come from cities, not rural areas, will throw up their hands and say that cotton isn't worth saving. On the other hand, if farmers agree in the referendum to put up the dollar a bale, they will show by their votes that they are trying to help themselves, and I believe that the Congress will continue to provide substantial assistance over a reasonable period of time. With this much involved, I feel that sound business requires that we approve the referendum on cotton research and promotion by an overwhelming vote."

HS Grads May Now Enter OCS

High school graduates now have the same opportunity as college graduates to apply for Army Officer Candidate School (OCS) while processing at any U. S. Army reception station. Previously high school graduates had to wait until basic training before applying for OCS.

After a successful test period in the Third U S. Army area, the new program was inaugurated on Nov. 14 throughout the entire US. Continental Army Command, which includes Fourth Army's two reception stations at Fort Polk, La., and Fort Bliss, Texas.

Personnel entering the reception stations, as part of the routine testing and classification, are given the General Aptitude Technical Test (GT) and the Officer Candidate Test (OCT). If high school graduates or above achieve the necessary scores they are given the Officer Leadership Inventory Exam (OLI-1) and subsequently interviewed by the reception station's OCS procurement officer.



Big Debate at the Berlin Zoo



With some 12,600 specimens of 2,200 different species, the

With some 12,600 specimens of 2,200 different species, the West Berlin Zoo, home for the two argumentative beasts in the picture above, is the biggest in Europe and ranks second only to the zoo in San Diego, Calif. Its Aquarium collection of 9,500 tropical fish, amphibians, reptiles and invertebrates from 1,320 species is the largest in the world. The zoo's Aviary resembles a tropical forest where only the instinct of the free-flying birds keeps them apart from the visitors.

Also free of iron bars are the separated open areas where the beasts of prey include lions, tigers, pumas and jaguars as well as the rare Persian and Clouded leopards of South East Asia that are now threatened with extinction.

The Berlin Zoo has successfully bred many species now fast vanishing from their natural habitat, thus helping to prevent their disappearance. Among them: the first orangutan ever raised in captivity; the crested Kagus or flying lemurs from New Caledonia; the three-toed Great Bustards; the first North American White Pelican bred in Europe; and the first Spectacled Bears of the Peruvian Andes to be reared in Germany. The rare Snow Owls in the Zoo's collection of birds of prey have raised several young each year since 1962. Also had in Borlin are the scarce owl faced. tion of birds of prey have raised several young each year since 1962. Also bred in Berlin are the scarce owl-faced Hamlyn's monkeys from the Congo and the black-and-white Guereza monkeys. Similarly thriving are the Zoo's East Indian Gaur oxen and the wild Banteng oxen from Java. The Berlin Zoo was founded in 1841.




