New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that day as provided in legislation signed intolaw by President Johnson on Sept. 20, 1966, the postmaster pointed

The rate increase will average about 10 cents a parcel, postmaster Durham said.

Use of the ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender of a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country. Durham said.

By consulting a simple chart, offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers on the ZIP Code repre-

Use of ZIP Code will make it sent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each o f the nation's 33,000 post offices.

> 'The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800 miles," said Durham. "The new zone method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs and to publishers who pay the zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals."

Postmaster Durham noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Abilene sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 55 post offices within the Abilene Section

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post Office Depart-



CREAMED CHICKEN WITH CORN WAFFLES

1/4 cup butter or margarine



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MERKEL SCHOOL STUDENTS SHOW SCORES ABOVE NATIONAL PAR







The business meeting concerned the discussion of demonstrations, public speaking and the appointing of a money raising com-



Marvelous Mincemeat by Betty Crocker

Of course, use mincemeat for pies. That's traditional. But branch out. Put mincemeat into puddings and cakes and coffee cake, too. Use it for sauces and toppings. To personalize prepared mince-meat, add a little grated orange peel or the juice, or a freshly chopped apple. And try it sometime served hot over ice cream. For another mincemeat marvel, fold this fruity mixture into whipped cream and spoon over warm gingerbread. (½ cup mincemeat and ½ cup sifted confectioners' sugar to 1 cup whipped cream.) And for the holiday cookie platter, here are two quick cookie recipes . . . combining the talents of mincemeat and

MINCEMEAT COOKIES

11/2 cups mincemeat 34 cup undiluted evaporated milk

2 cups Bisquick 1 cup brown sugar (packed) 1/2 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to 400°. Place mincemeat and milk in saucepan and slowly heat to simmering, stirring frequently. Continue cooking slowly about 10 min-utes or until mixture is thickened. Immediately stir in re-maining ingredients. Dough should be soft. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls about 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Bake about 10 minutes. Makes about 31/2 dozen cookies.

To pretty up the cookie plate, lace paper doilies are festive. Sprigs of holly, too . . . or a fat candle in the center. For a solid gold setting, spray-paint

BANBURY COOKIE BARS

21/2 cups Bisquick 1 cup sugar

1 egg 3 tablespoons butter 1/4 cup milk

11/2 cups mincemeat

Heat oven to 375°. Grease oblong pan, 13x9x2 inches. Mix thoroughly all ingredients except mincemeat. Pat half of mixture into prepared pan to within ½ inch of edge Spread with mincemeat. Pat other half of mixture on waxed paper to same size. Place on mincemeat; remove waxed paper. Bake 30 minutes. While warm, cut into bars. Makes 4 dozen bars. . . Very nice served with eggnog ice cream. Also, cinnamon coffee: ¼ teaspoon cinnamon added to 8-cup pot before perking. And that's what I call making merry with

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
