
Assembly of God **Church Revival Begins July 9**





Car Insurance

Careless Texas drivers will pay more for their car insurance on policies written after July 31. They will be charged more because of their accidents or traffic law violations during the nine months which ended May 1.

Penalties which range from 15 to 90 per cent, depending on the number and importance of the law violation - will add up to \$6,439,362 during the year start-

These penalties, feding that much more money into the auto insurance "kitty," will present rate increases for most drivers.

State Board of Insurance held its annual auto insurance rate hearing and got a staff recommendation for a general rate reduction of one per cent in insurance rates. It varies from area to area, and from classification of cars and drivers.

If you receive tips over a certain amount in your work, they must be reported for social security. Ask your social security office for a leaflet explaining this


