JUNE IS THE MONTH for weddings and Father's Day. Perhaps the reason for this is to get all those starry eyed little brides to consider what sort of fathers their prospective bridegrooms may turn out to be.

I'm partial to the fathers you never hear about. They're not on the evening news, the talk shows, or written up in the papers. They're not neglecting, abandoning, abusing or murdering their families. So you never hear about them.

Several years ago, our daughter did a lovely bit of cross-stitch needlework and gave it to Bill on Father's Day. It says "Any man can be a Father, but it takes someone special to be a Daddy."

We should change the name of Father's Day to Daddy's Day. Then we would be honoring all those special guys whom we never hear anything about. . . the ones who work hard all day and show up tired in the evenings. . . but not too tired to go back out and help with Little League or Little Drizzlers or Boy Scouts. . . not too tired to look over a homework paper or lend a hand with a science project.

He'll settle spats between siblings or take a cranky toddler on his lap and make him laugh. He'll cook a burger on the grill, help clean up the dishes or bathe the little tykes and get them ready for bed.

"Daddy's Day" would honor all those gentle fellows who go quietly about earning a living for their families, being responsible, paying the bills. He'll do without that new boat he wanted just because the roof needs repaired or little Janie needs braces on her teeth.

He'll fuss about the cost of their fancy sneakers and Nintendo games, not because he doesn't love those kids, but because he has to make the money last until the next pay check and he's trying to save up enough to take the family on a nice vacation trip, because his family is the most important thing in the world to him.

Talk shows don't have programs about the guy who teaches his kids to ride a bike, saddle a horse, bait a hook, change an irrigation pipe, throw a Frisbee, or fly a kite.

He'll read a bedtime story, or wait up for the teenager who is out on a date. He enjoys telling the kids about how far he had to walk to school as a boy, or how many sacks of cotton he had to pick every fall.

He says funny things like "If you fall out of that tree and break your leg, don't come running to me" or "Don't ask me, ask your mother."

Here's to the Daddy who sets a good example by practicing family values, Christian morals, and setting lofty goals of self-improvement for himself and his family!

He teaches his children by the example he sets. He's not embarrassed to show them that he loves their mother. He shows his sons that people of both genders deserve love and respect and he shows his daughters that gentleness and affection are more "macho" than aggressiveness and abuse.

This sort of fathering comes from the heart and can't be legislated. Our new administration has proposed a Family Preservation Act which will accomplish little except to provide pseudo-jobs for social workers. It probably won't persuade the flighty teeny bopper that she should not "sleep" with her street-wise, slack jawed boyfriend of the moment, or make the young fellow realize that if he fathers children, he is responsible for their upbringing and support. The babies who are the end result of these couplings will grow up to be the next generation of social misfits.

We'd like to see some welfare reform which would send a message to the young fathers who breed and then desert the young mothers and their babies. If they do not choose to work for a salary and support the family they started, then they should spend some time in jail thinking about it.

It takes more than testosterone to be a real "Daddy."

## KBH Runs Away With Senate Vote

To say that Republican candidate Kay Bailey Hutchison won the Parmer County vote in a runaway would almost be putting it mildly.

The winner of the special senate runoff race took Parmer County with 87.5 per cent of those voting, to 12.5 per cent for appointee Bob Krueger.

So much did Ms. Hutchison dominate the county race that she won five of the nine boxes by a 9-1 or better margin.

Ms. Hutchison won the biggest voting box, Friona 101 (Calvary Baptist), with an even 90 per cent of the vote, 241-28.

In two boxes, Friona 402 (Fire Station) and at Rhea, Krueger received only one vote. Ms. Hutchison won voting box 402 by 41-1, or 97.7 per cent, and the Rhea box, 31-1, or 93.1 per cent.

The state's newest senator also won voting box 202 (Friona Community Center), by 93.1 per cent, 81-6, and won at Oklahoma

Lane, 65-7, or 90.3 per cent.

Krueger got his highest percentage, if you can call it high, at Bovina, where he managed 18.5 per cent of the vote. He still trailed there, losing at the Bovina E.M.S. Center, 115-26, and at Bovina Ridgelea School, 13-3. Krueger received 18 per cent of the vote at Lazbuddie, but lost, 77-16, and 15.6 per cent at Farwell, where he also lost by better than 5-1, 172-32.

Ms. Hutchison even held an almost 9-1 edge in the early voting box, which she won in Parmer County, 963-138.

The county's turnout of 1101 voters compared to 1422 that voted in the election May 1 when voters also decided upon the fate of the constitutional school amendments. Saturday's turnout amounted to about 29 per cent of the registered voters, according to Bonnie Warren, County Clerk.

## MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR

Anyone who rings the doorbell at 501 Highway 86 in Bovina will be greeted with a friendly smile from one of the residents, Asa or Lois Smith, who have lived there about four years.

These two native Texans were born in Anderson County and spent most of their growing up years there.

Asa, the oldest of three children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. A.G. Smith, grew up in the Montalba Community and Lois, the fifth of six girls born to the late Mr. and Mrs. B.M. Huffman, grew up in the nearby rural community of Harmony.

Lois said, "Even though we grew up in the same area, we attended different rural schools and didn't meet until we were grown."

On of her school friends, who also knew Asa, introduced the couple. They were married October 28, 1933 in Palestine, Texas.

At that time, Asa and his father were farming and he was working at a sawmill. Their first home was on a farm in Anderson County. Their first two children, Shirley and Joy, were born there. In 1940 Joy developed asthma and a physician advised the young couple to move to a higher drier climate.

Upon his advice, the Smiths loaded as many possessions as possible on a 1932 truck and headed west. They kept driving until they got to Muleshoe. For several months, Asa did some farming, worked at a hardware store and did some trucking. He also spent some time working on the railroad.

During World War II, he was a member of the crash and rescue team at Cannon Air Force Base.

In 1948, Asa became associated with Henderson Grain Company and the couple moved to Lariat. A few years later, this company was sold to Sherley-Anderson Grain Company and he was employed as manager and worked there until his retirement in June, 1980.

After the Smiths moved to the Texas Panhandle, two more children, Larry and Sylvia, were born. All four of the children attended school in Farwell.

For a number of years, Lois was kept busy running her house, taking care of the children, sewing for the family and doing the usual homemaker's chores.

None of this was new to her since she had grown up in a farming family with no boys and gotten a lot of experience in milking cows, gathering eggs, taking care of baby chicks, feeding pigs and doing outside chores.

She says, "There were six girls in our family and my daddy used to tell everyone that all of his boys were girls."

She also served as postmaster from 1947 until her retirement in 1977.

Asa remembers, "One time my family moved away from Anderson County for awhile. I vividly remember when we drove down the Main Street of Houston in a covered wagon on our return trip."

Soon after Asa's retirement, the Smiths moved to High Rolls, which is near Cloudcroft, New Mexico.

Lois reports, "We thoroughly enjoyed our stay there. We loved the mountains, the wonderful people the exceptional climate and had a lovely little church."

The Smiths are Baptists and have always been active in the affairs of the church in the community they lived in.

In the fall of 1989, Asa became ill so the couple decided to move to Bovina to be near their children and grandchildren.

## Commodity Distribution Is Slated


Commodities will be distributed June 17 at the County Barn. If you have not registered for the free commodities, you may do so on that date.

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# Peaches Enhance Menu Any Time Of The Day

For breakfast almost every morning of the summer when we were growing up, my brother and I would have a big bowl of cereal topped with sliced fresh peaches. Sometimes we even had the "meal" for a mid-afternoon snack.

If the peaches were small, we'd just slice two. We never seemed to have the problem of running out of fruit as the raisin cereals predicted we would.

Of course, we also enjoyed eating peaches whole, preferring the biggest juiciest fruit we could find. As much of our family is from Weatherford, Texas, we prized the Parker County peaches that we bought from road-side vendors when we visited relatives.

One of our mother's best dishes is for peach cobbler (see recipe below). I prefer it very hot, with a lot of crust and vanilla ice cream.

As the supermarkets' strawberry supply begins to dwindle and peaches fill the bins, peach shortcake can likewise replace strawberry shortcake. Simply peel and slice peaches, sprinkle with a little sugar and pour on top of shortcake. Then, top with whipped cream. It's a delicious fresh peach dessert.

Also, try the following recipes this summer:

**PEACHES 'N' CREAM PIE**  
Pastry for one 9-inch or 10-inch pie

crust  
6 to 8 ripe peaches  
3/4 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour  
Dash of salt  
Dash of cinnamon  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Line a 9-inch or 10-inch pie plate with pastry. Slice peaches into the crust until level with top of plate. Stir together sugar, flour, salt and cinnamon. Gradually stir in whipping cream and vanilla until well mixed. Pour sauce over peaches. (If you are using a 9-inch pie plate, you may have a little sauce left over.) Bake the pie for 10 minutes at 425 degrees; reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for 30 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### PEACH COBBLER

Crust:  
2 cups all-purpose flour  
1 cup shortening  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup water  
Filling:  
1 quart fresh or canned peaches, sliced  
1/2 cup margarine  
2 cups sugar  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 cups water or juice from canned peaches

For crust, mix ingredients, divide dough into three equal pieces and roll out each like a pie crust. Line the bottom of a deep dish with



1 layer of the dough. Layer peaches on top of the bottom crust; sprinkle with 1 cup of sugar and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Cut the margarine into pats and spread half of the pats on top of the peaches. Pour 1 cup of the water over the peaches. Repeat with another layer of dough, peaches, sugar, cinnamon, margarine and water. Top with the third layer of dough. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour to 1 hour and 15 minutes or until the top is golden brown. Serve plain, with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream.

### PEACHES WITH TART CREAM

2 pounds ripe peaches, blanched, peeled, cut in half lengthwise, and stoned  
1/4 cup packed light brown sugar  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
Dash of ground cloves  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 tablespoon granulated sugar  
1/2 cup whipping cream, chilled

Butter a 9-inch pie plate. Start at the outer edge of the pie plate and make a circle of peach halves, seed side facing the center of the pie plate. Continue to make circles with the fruit, pushing the fruit in one circle against the fruit in the preceding circle so that the circles are compact and the peaches are almost standing upright. Fill the small center space with one or two peach halves. Mix the 1/4 cup brown sugar and 1/4 cup granulated sugar with the cinnamon and cloves; sprinkle evenly over the peaches. Place the pie plate on a baking sheet and bake on the center oven rack at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes or until the peaches can be easily pierced with a knife and the juices are bubbling. Remove the plate from the oven. In a medium bowl, whisk the sour cream and the tablespoon of sugar together. Whip the cream with a mixer just until it holds soft peaks. Stir a spoonful of whipped cream gently with a spatula. About 15 minutes after you take the fruit from the oven, spoon the peaches into serving bowls and top with the cream. This dessert also can be served at room temperature or chilled. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### PICKLED PEACHES

12 pounds peaches  
7 pounds sugar  
2 quarts vinegar  
4 cinnamon sticks  
Whole cloves

Tie the cinnamon sticks and 2 tablespoons of whole cloves in a

cheesecloth bag. Combine the sugar, vinegar and spice bag in a large kettle and bring to a boil. Scald the peaches in boiling water just long enough to loosen the skins; then, dip in cold water and peel. Put 4 whole cloves into each peach. Drop the peaches, a few at a time, into the boiling syrup. Cook until tender and translucent; put the peaches into sterilized canning jars. When the jars are full, add enough boiling syrup to cover the peaches, leaving 1/2-inch headroom. Wipe the rims carefully, put seals and rings in place. Process in a boiling water bath for 5 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 quarts.

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
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# Bovina's First Baptist Church To Celebrate 90th Anniversary

"Kansas City star, that's what I are!" As you're reading this on Friday evening or Saturday, I will be in downtown Kansas City, Missouri, with fourteen other doctrinal students and Dr. Don Hammer, professor of missions at Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, at "Restart, Inc."

"Restart, Inc." is an interfaith, inner-city ministry to the homeless. It is a step-up from the "skid-row bum" in that these folks are going through a process to help get them assimilated back into society.

We will be checking in to spend the night here, will help serve meals, then will be given intensive orientation into inner-city ministries and a tour of the area by Dr. Dan Bonner, Director of education for operation Restart. It should prove to be quite an interesting weekend!

According to Robert C. Linticum, director of the Office of Urban Advance for World Vision International ministries, the cities of the world are exploding with people! "Cities all over the world are facing an unprecedented growth explosion. . . .sometime close to the turn of the century there will be more people living in cities than will be living in towns, villages, on farms, in tribes, or in any other human habitation.

Linticum goes on to point out that by about the year 2000, 94% of the populations of both the United States and Canada will live in cities, as well as 82% of Europeans, 74% of Latin Americans, and 36% of Asians.

However, the Asia figure may be misleading because it seems low, but the author points out that numerically, there will be more Asians in cities than the total populations of all the developed countries of the world!

The increase in urban population since 1975 has jumped 216% in South America, 302% in the Middle East, and 347% in Africa. In 1950 there were only seven cities on earth that had a population exceeding 5 million. Only two were located in third world nations. Forty-three years later there are 34!

If this trend continues, by the year 2020 there will be 95! Of these 95, eighty of them will be third-world cities!

The problems that go with large cities are staggering. And rapid growth only adds to the misery. Mexico City gains half a million new people annually! There is no way that the city can keep up with needs for water, sewage disposal, etc.

In Sao Paulo Brazil, 700,000 children have been abandoned by their parents to live by their wits on the streets! In Guayaquil, Ecuador, more than half of the people "live in shantytowns amid garbage-strewn mud flats and polluted water" (p. 19).

Over one million people in Calcutta, India, will never have a roof over their heads (that's where Mother Teresa has ministered for years.) In the same country, one million inhabitants of Bombay live on a slum built on a colossal garbage dump.

In the United States, the situation is better, but still there are many homeless, many jobless, and many in sub-human housing. And in every town and city, there are people in need of help.

The challenge of ministering to the cities with basic physical, social, and spiritual needs is staggering! How do you help so many, and how do you reach them with the message of Christ?

Jesus wept over the city of Jerusalem. He died for the sins of the people in all the cities and in all the countries of our world. We must take His love and His message of salvation and hope to them!
