Hospital Fate To Be Decided

Precinct Two voters will go to the polls this Saturady to vote for or against the Hospital District Bond Election.

The election will decide the fate of a hospital district in roughly the Merkel, Trent, Merkel - Tye and Butman area.

Voters will also vote for or against the issuance of up to \$525,000 in bonds for the construction of the building.

The election as sought would authorize a levy not to exceed 75 cents per one hundred dollars valuation of property in Precinct Two as assessed by Taylor Coun-

The two propositions on which voters will decide are:

Proposition No. 1 "For the creation of Merkel Hospital District, providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation."

"Against the creation of Merkel Hospital District, providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation."

Proposition No. 2 For the issuance of bonds."

"Against the issuance of Bonds." As to each of the foregoing propositions the voter shall mark out the statement FOR the propositions or the statement AGAINST the proposition so that the statement remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.
