In a report from council members this week, the consensus is that "we hope such a tax will help our financial problems."

"Merkel is not alone in needing additional revenue to meet rising operating costs," said Bill Button, City Council member and Mayor Pro Tem. "Over three thousand towns and cities in the United States have city sales tax, and hundreds more will vote this most equitable means of rev-

Derrell Farmer, council member, points out that with the HemisFair '68 at San Antonio, thousands more tourists will now be passing Merkel. "Some will stop for meals and lodging and this will add pennies to the sales Huffman.

"At present only property owners pay the tax," said Bobby Du-Bose, "but with the city sales tax, everyone pays their fair share for fire, police and other city conveniences."

Merkel's Mayor Johnny Cox explains that "higher operating expenses are made higher by many demands of additional services not made a few years gao.

"No budget can be balanced with past revenue and present - day operating expenses," said Cox. 'without the deferement of needed projects and the curtailment of many demanded services."

Speaking to delegates of the National Outlook Conference on Rural Youth held in W departmental auditorium Humphrey termed today's American youth as "marvelous, the best in the world." The Vice President saluted the many young people that have volunteered for such programs as the Peace Corps, VISTA, the Job Corps, and other worthy causes.

He said "the rural vouths of America have something to offer and are the great source of action, but sometimes their actions are completely wasted." He cited the recent demonstration at the Pentagon in Washington as one of the times when the actions of many fine American youths were wasted.

In 20 pages of questions and answers, the new osteoarthritis pamphlet describes the disease and how it differs from rheumatoid arthritis and explains how it causes trouble. Symptoms, diagnosis, treatment and current research are covered, with emphasis on the importance of prompt and proper treatment to prevent disability.

Osteoarthritis, A Handbook for Patients, has been approved by the Committee on Public Education of the Arthritis Foundation's Medical Council.


