"I know that the Citizens of Merkel will agree that the sales tax election is a most important decision," said Mayor Johnny Cox, "and your city officials assure you that your help and cooperation will be greatly appreciated."

Cox pointed out that city officials fulfilled their obligations when they voted to call an election. "As individuals, each member of the council is free to express his desires."

Members of the council agreed they would not attempt to earmark any of the sales tax funds for specific purposes should it pass, but Cox said that there are many areas which need relief and attention, including streets, sewer improvement, street lighting, water drainage, parks and recreation, and traffic marking and

In their struggle to be the first and the best at every fire, firefighters as well as the "crackers-and-cheese boys" who ran alongside every truck were sometimes harder to con-

trol than the fires they fought. Two brigades in New York for example, were suspended after a free-for-all over the use of a fire hydrant. Two others got the same treatment when they fought over which would go first on a narrow street. They never did make it to the

Occasionally a water hose was sliced or a tire flattened, and one or two firemen rushing into a building to rescue a victim were knocked out by other volunteers with similar

The incidents made for good stories at the lavish Firemen's Ball, but in 1853 the city fathers of Cincinnati decided this type of rivalry was not the most effective way to fight fires. They established the first permanent, paid fire department, and most other major cities followed suit during the next 20 years.


