



A thorough study of basic military subjects, hygiene, first aid and sanitation, and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join the Marine combat forces.



Humble Oil & Refining Company's Rig 32 is shown here in the Gomez field of West Texas drilling the world's deepest producing well. The new ultradeep producer — the Henry Willbanks No. 11 — was completed in the Ellenberger formation at 21,883 to 22,610 feet. The well, located in Pecos, County about 10 miles northwest of Fort Stockton, flowed gas at a calculated open flow rate of 14 million cubic feet a day.



Thus, though the enterprise ended in failure and death, it strengthened France's claim to a greater part in the New World.







How many times have you looked at pictures of babies in magazines and thought your own baby has looked just as photogenic—but you've never been able to capture him in a picture the way you know he can be.

There are three rules to keep in mind when you want to get good pictures of your baby: 1. Photograph him when he's fresh and wide awake—not when he's fretful and needs a nap. 2. Put him in surroundings where he will feel secure and happy. 3. Make sure your camera is loaded and set to go. If you're using a tripod and lights, have them set up in

Have another person there to watch him so you can concentrate on the camera. He'll be content to splash in the water or play with a washcloth. And of course if the toy is large, it's apt to obscure his face. Always make picture taking time a fun time for baby, and you'll get those smiling pictures you're looking for.
