At the Monday evening meeting, Dr. Donald W. Warren was appointed as director to replace the vacancy created by the resignation of Bill Wood. Max Murrell was elected president of the board

On February 26 representatives of the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Fort Worth to submit an application for a federal loan to be secured by revenue bonds.

Murrell explained to members that "monies secured by the HUD means would be used in lieu of money raised through the sale of tax bonds. It was pointed out by the hospital board members that the current high interest rate precludes the sale of sufficient bonds to accomplish completion of this project.



Darrell Neal Ueckert, a 1963 graduate of Noodle High School, will be among the 421 seniors and graduate students who will receive degrees from Colorado




Mr. Doscher issued the following statement for the consideration of the voters in Taylor and Jones Counties
