

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



Veterans' benefits are generally exempt from taxation and need not be reported as income on income tax returns, the Veterans Administration announced recent-

The on'y reportable item is the interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit with the VA officials in Washington pointed out. This is not considered a veterans' benefit and must be reported as earned income.

GI insurance dividends are not taxable, nor are proceeds from GI insurance policies.

Other major tax exempt benefits include compensation and pension payments, educational assistance allowances, subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees, and grants for "wheelchair" homes and automobile equipment for the severely disabled

Likewise, all benefits to surviving dependents of deceased veterans and compensation allowances authorized for dependents of certain disabled veterans are tax exempt.






