MAIL FOR SERVICEMEN' BOOK AVAILABLE AT POST OFFICE

Mail For Servicemen - outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through Merkel Post Office window clerks, Postmaster Wrenn Durham announced today.

Postmaster Durham said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going cel wrapping instructions, inforto the military men and women mation on the time it takes parstationed abroad. We hope this cels to reach Vietnam and other guide will help more American overseas bases from major U.S.

services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the aveage family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personal messages. The guide also provides par-

way to address military mail.

A family sending a 10-pound package from Merkel to Vietnam, for example, pays only \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL" while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59, Postmaster Durham said.

On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail service, which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post from Merkel costs only \$1.10. On packages weighing under two pounds air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy" for through airlift service, the pamphlet sug-
