HOSPITAL BOARD REVIEWS PROGRESS

"It is most important that area Health Department." is being done toward securing a hospital for this area, and that progress is noted," said Max Murrell, president of the Hospital Board.

Murrell explained that "the delay in getting something started on our hospital has been caused as a result of our efforts to secure additional financing to supplement those funds which would be available through the sale of our general obligation bonds, authorized at the time the hospital district was created."

Although \$525,000.00 in bonds were authorized, the hospital district evaluation coupled with the current interest rate, "has limited these available funds to approximately \$350,000.00."

The first hospital plans called for a medical facility of thirty beds, which had an estimated cost of \$480,000.00, plus a cost of equipment.
