Merkel voters did not vote in line with the majority, either in the nation nor in Taylor County. Merkel voters voted 354 for Humphrey, 178 for Nixon and

111 for Wallace. National news media reported that Humphrey and Nixon each received 43 per cent of the votes with Nixon slightly out in front in the popular vote and winning with the electoral vote - where
