

Pineapple Pie

- 1 no-bake (9-inch) crumb
- 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/2 cup sugar Dash salt 1 cup water
- 1 (834-ounce) can crushed pineapple, drained
- 3 egg whites 1/3 cup chopped nuts

Combine corn starch, sugar and salt in small saucepan. Gradually add water, stirring until smooth. Stirring con stantly, bring to boil over medium heat and boil 1 minute. Cover with plastic film or waxed paper laid directly on surface of pudding. Cool. Stir in pineapple. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Gently fold cooled pineapple mixture. Pile into prepared crust. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Chill.
